Pyidaungsu Hluttaw donates aid to disaster affected Mon, Kayin, Taninthayi

AT the eleventh-day meeting of the Second Pyidaungsu Hluttaw's 13th regular session held yesterday morning at the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw meeting hall Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker said Hluttaw representatives will donate their one-day daily allowance of K 22.5 million for ethnic brethren in Taninthayi Region, Mon and Kayin states.

Motion to donate daily allowance to natural disaster affected ethnic brethren

As a first agenda of the meeting Dr Hla Moe of Aungmyethazan constituency tabled a motion expressing Hluttaw representatives' sympathy and sorrow toward ethnic brethren from Mon State, Kayin State and Taninthayi Region affected by natural disasters of heavy rains, flooding and landslides in August 2019 and to donate Hluttaw representatives' one-day daily allowance. Dr Hla Moe also explained in detail on the reason for tabling the motion and U Soe Myint (a) U Aung Zaw Myint of Amarapura constituency discussed in support of the motion.

After obtaining Pyidaungsu Hluttaw consensus on the motion Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker announced the Hluttaw's approval of the motion and observed a one minute silence in memory of all those affected by the natural disaster.

A total of K 22.5 million were made by Pyithu Hluttaw representatives (K 8,640,000), Pyithu Hluttaw Speaker (K 6,360,000), Amyotha Hluttaw representatives (K 4,480,000) and Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker (K 3,020,000).

MIC greenlights two projects to create over 200 jobs

THE Myanmar Investment Commission yesterday approved two projects, worth US\$1.265 million and K18 million, which are expected to create nearly 270 jobs for locals.

The decision was reached at the Meeting 13/2019 of the MIC held at its office in Yangon. U Thaung Tun, the Chairman of the MIC, Dr Than Myint, the Vice Chairman, and 10 members attended the meeting.

According to an announcement by the MIC, the commission has approved the two projects in the industry sector.

From 1998 to the end of June this year, the commis-

sion has approved proposals of 1,752 foreign enterprises from 49 countries in 12 sectors, with the total pledged amount pegged at \$80.9 billion.

Of the 49 countries, Singapore, the People's Republic of China, and Thailand have emerged as the leading investors.

The sector with the largest share of investment has been oil and gas, accounting for 27.72 per cent of the total permitted foreign investment, following by the power sector (26.18 per cent), and the manufacturing sector (13.82 per cent).—MNA

THE coordination meeting on basic education teacher appointment was held at the Ministry of Education in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

Two-year education colleges are being upgraded to four-year education degree colleges. The promotion of competent and experienced primary teachers hinders the move towards quality education. There are to fulfil the continual needs of education sector regarding teaching staff, classrooms, libraries, teaching facilities, dormitories and playing grounds, employee housing complex—Hence, State budgets will be used to fulfill them. There will be transparency in managing the

budget, and wrongdoing of any sort will not be tolerated. Ministry of Education always gives heed to teachers of basic and higher education, teachers' unions and students' unions.

He urged to discuss appointing competent teachers and producing accomplished students for development of schools, universities and the country.

Then, representatives of teachers' unions and student union discussed the current status of basic education teacher appointment and the Union Minister and the officials coordinated.

Present at the meeting were officials of Departments of Higher Education and Basic Education and representatives of teachers' unions and students' unions from basic education schools and education collages.—MNA ■

Ministries discuss early rehabilitation works for disaster-torn areas

THE Government is preparing for rehabilitation tasks to be carried out in the disaster-affected areas of the country, with holding a coordination meeting among the ministries yesterday afternoon.

Torrential rainfalls and landslides in some regions of Myanmar destroyed residential areas and caused the deadly landslides, forcing tens of thousands of people from their homes to temporary rescue camps.

Union Minister for Social Welfare, Relief and Resettlement Dr Win Myat Aye, as the Chairman of Coordinating Body for Rehabilitating Disaster-Affected Region, presided over the meeting, with suggestions to collect the data of devastations.

While the water levels have receded in some regions, a total of 79,389 flood victims are still taking shelters at 166 rescue camps in Bago, Kayin, Mon, Yangon and Thaninthayi areas.

Dr Win Myat Aye also said that the Department of Disaster Management under his ministry has provided over K344 million for relief assistance and water treatment chemicals, while more humanitarian aid will be distributed to the inundated areas.

He also urged to make preparations for data collection on the damages of road networks, bridges, monsoon paddy and other crops.

The deputy ministers from Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation, the Transport and Communications, the Electricity and Energy, the Border Affairs, together with the senior officers from the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, the Ministry of Information, the Ministry of Health and Sports, the Ministry of Planning and Finance, the Ministry of Education and the Ministry of Home Affairs presented their works on the ongoing prelimi-

nary data collection and repairing works, the possible supply of machinery from their departments, the healthcare services for flood victims, the recovery of electricity distribution, the fuel supply and the school books for children.

The committee chairman then requested for the reports on allocated budgets and the additional budgets of the relevant departments for the rehabilitation works.

After the meeting, Union Minister Dr Win Myat Aye accepted cash donations of K5 million from the family of U Than Win Hlaing and Daw Nilar Aung (Thein Tha Yar Gold Shop), K10 million from the Diocesan Social Action Center (DISAC), AFA, Myanmar social community groups and migrant workers in Phuket, Thailand, for the flood victims in Myanmar.— MNA

Kyaikmaraw flooded, 11 relief camps opened

A TOTAL of 11 relief camps have been opened for 45,839 flood victims from 8,568 households in Kyaikmaraw Township in Mon State.

The water level in the Ataran River in Kyaikmaraw Township exceeded its danger mark on the morning of 13 August, flooding the town and affecting residents. Currently, more than 20,000 flood victims

are living in relief camps, according to an official from the Township Flood Relief Operations Office.

Currently, the water level is rising, and donors from across the country are assisting victims, providing them necessary items. The fire services department and charity organizations are providing aids for the safety of the donors' cars in flooded

areas.

Kyaikmaraw is a flood-prone township, and experiences floods every year. The township did not face floods for four or five years after more than 20 channels were dug. But, since last year, the township has started experiencing floods again.—Cho Myat Myat Htway (Kyaikmaraw) (Translated by Hay Mar)

In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.

3. Out of the information sent to the Ministry of Home Affairs, a total of 724 cases have been opened as of 10 August 2019. A total of 1130 people, including 950 men and 180 women had been arrested with seizures of 6559.7784 g of heroin, 1318.72 g of ICE, 39776.95 g of opium, 329.6 g of low-quality opium, 19609.27 g of speciosa powder, 7833.19 g of speciosa, 2.5 liters of liquid speciosa, 334472 stimulant tablets, 8363.22 g of marijuana, 0.1 liters of opium tincture, 513.26 g of opium blocks, 60 g of poppy seeds, 29.15 g of crushed stimulant tablet, 0.001 g of crushed ecstasy, 18 firearms, different kinds of 257 cartridges and a grenade. Efforts for fighting the drug trafficking has been stepped up and the ministry will report on further exposed cases.
4. In addition to the investigations and arrests conducted on drug related complaints mentioned above, the Tatmadaw and Myanmar Police Force have also carried out separate investigations on drug complaints, search and arrests at border gates, and searches of vehicles acting upon given information.

During the previous week, multiple arrests were made in the border regions and joint-surveillance gates.

There has been one arrest together with 2893546 stimulant tablets, 36 grenades, handmade 2 visses of mines, 20 visses of gun powder and 52 walkie talkies. There has been one shooting; the suspect tried to fight against the police. Then the police fired him and he was dead together with 7 g of heroin.

A Geographer's Perspective on the Issues of Climate Change and Global Warming

Introduction

The main aim of this article is to succinctly present the 'Climate Change and Global Warming' from geographic point-of-view. First, the top ten worst environmental issues of the world will be mentioned, and it will be followed by presenting two worst environmental issues: (i) Climate Change, and (ii) Global Warming based upon geographical perspectives. Finally, the most remarkable changing climatic events that have taken place in Myanmar will be briefly highlighted.

Today it is commonly agreed upon the fact that there are the world's top 10 worst environmental issues such as:

1. Climate change
2. Global warming
3. Over development
4. Overfishing
5. Clear cutting
6. Acid rain
7. Smog
8. Salinity
9. Driftnet fishing
10. Coral bleaching

Out of these ten worst issues of the world, only the first two issues of climate change and global warming are to be briefly presented here, from the view-point of Climatic Geography, to the readers of the Global New Light of Myanmar Daily Newspaper.

Climate Change

What is meant by the term 'Climate Change'?

Climate change in general refers to any long term change in local or global weather pattern when measured over a number of years. Climate also includes temperature, precipitation, days of sunlight, and other indicators. When climate change is used in an environmentalist sense it is usually meant to indicate negative changes in the climate such as global warming.

The difference between Climate and Weather

To many people the words climate and weather seem interchangeable, but in truth they are two distinct terms. When we refer to weather we mean the day to day changes in temperature, precipitation, and winds that is chaotic and generally unpredictable. We may have weather forecasts, but we

can never truly pin down the exact weather pattern for any given day or week. Climate on the other hand refers to the long term trends in weather patterns globally. While weather changes from day to day, climate change takes place over thousands or millions of years, and helps shape the environment around us.

Factors Influencing Climate Change: The Natural

Many factors, both man-made and natural influence climate change. Natural factors include volcanic activity, solar variations, orbital variations, and plate tectonics. Volcanic activity can contribute to the carbon dioxide (CO₂) buildup in the atmosphere, but also cause cooling trends. CO₂ emitted by volcanoes is actually very little when compared to that emitted by human beings. Variations in the sun's rays can also cause warming or cooling trends, as can slight deviations in the orbit of the Earth around the sun. Climate change is also a very interdependent process, meaning that one small climate change, such as glacier retreat, affects many other aspects of the global climate as well.

Factors influencing Climate Change: The Man-Made

Though our planet has seen warm periods and ice ages before the Industrial Age, it was nothing compared to the rapid climate change we are seeing now. This is mostly due to the greenhouse gas (GHG) effect, a phenomena where the CO₂ released into the air helps trap heat on the Earth's

surface, warming the planet up. Without some CO₂ in the atmosphere the Earth would be uninhabitable, but too much creates a steamy situation.

According to research that tests CO₂ levels by studying fossils and glaciers, the CO₂ levels in our atmosphere are higher now than at any other point in the last 750,000 years. As more heat becomes trapped on the Earth's surface glaciers melt, sea levels rise, and weather patterns become more extreme.

But it's not only industry that creates so much CO₂ in the atmosphere. Deforestation and land use may have begun human-influenced climate change thousands of years ago. As more and more trees are cut down and cleared for farming, the Earth's capacity to turn CO₂ into oxygen through plant life is diminished. Halting global warming and climate change not only relies on clean manufacturing, but also respect for the vital role of flora in our global ecosystem.

Methane and aerosols in the atmosphere are also byproducts of human activity. Aerosols cause ozone depletion, but also block some of the sun's rays, while methane contributes to the greenhouse gas effect.

Effects of Climate Change

Climate change has a huge impact on the flora and fauna of the planet. Mass species extinction could be a result of global warming. Take the example of the polar bear: Glaciers are already melting due to global warming. As arctic

threat to the health of our planet has emerged: global warming. Whether or not you believe in the phenomena, scientific fact has proven that global temperatures have risen roughly one degree Fahrenheit (0.74 degrees Celsius) since 1950, and are projected to rise by much more than that in the future. So what if it gets warmer, right? We can all wear shorts and sip fruity drinks by the pool. Or, may be not. With global warming comes a host of problems to plague or planet, from mass species extinction to rising sea levels. Global warming is a problem, and unless we act fast, the consequences could be permanent.

Causes of Global Warming

There are many sources of global warming, and not all of them stem from human causes. For example, both solar variation and volcanic activity have both played a role in global warming in the past history of our planet. But the sharp increases seen in the last few centuries have been linked by the vast majority of scientists to human behavior, specifically CO₂ emissions.

These CO₂ emissions contribute to the greenhouse gas effect, which was discovered in 1824 by Joseph Fourier. The Earth actually

truth, it is actually underdeveloped nations like Africa, who have not contributed to the massive emissions of greenhouse gases, who will pay the most.

What can you do About Climate Change?

Climate change is a problem we can all band together to fix. We need to call for greater accountability in our leaders, and support environmentally conscious companies and countries with our purchasing decisions.

Global Warming

want to lower our greenhouse gas emissions, we need to find new sources of energy and replant our forests.

Consequences of Global Warming

Obviously the warming of our planet is going to have global repercussions. Current climate projections estimate that by the end of the 21st century we could have global warming of 1.1 to 6.4 degrees Celsius (2 to 11 degrees Fahrenheit). With these warmer temperatures a variety of changes would happen. Glacier retreat (which is already happening) would speed up, and the Arctic landmass would also be subject to melting. This in turn would raise sea levels up to 0.46 metre (a foot and a half).

Global warming will also have an increasingly large effect on the patterns of extreme weather on our planet such as hurricanes, cyclones, typhoon tornadoes, floods, and drought. Hurricanes (Cyclones & Typhoons) will become less frequent but far more intense, and areas currently experiencing drought will widen. Many locations that rely on a flow of summer streams will lose water during the warmer months as well.

Any species who cannot adapt to the climate change and resulting effects on locations around the world will become extinct. It is thought that this number could reach the hundreds of thousands, including both flora and fauna.

While plants and animals decline, certain diseases will thrive in the increasingly warmer climate. Both malaria and dengue fever will spread as new areas become warm enough to support the mosquitoes that carry the diseases. This will dramatically affect human life, especially in developing countries which lack basic health care.

What can we do?

Sadly many scientists think that global warming has not even leveled out yet, because of the massive temperature holding abilities of our oceans. That means that even if we were to halt our CO₂ producing industries this second, global warming would still increase for a while before declining. However, we can still make a difference for the future.

Death toll in Paung landslide rises to 66

WITH the recovery of six more bodies and the death of one man undergoing treatment at a hospital yesterday, the death toll in the landslide in Paung, Mon State, has reached 66, according to the Paung Township General Administration Department.

The deadly landslide occurred around 7 a.m. on 9 August following torrential rain.

Rescue teams are conducting operations and aid has been flowing into landslide and flood-hit areas in the state, according to the department.

"One victim receiving treatment at the Yangon General Hospital died yesterday," said U Zaw Moe Aung, the head of the Paung Township General Administration Department.

Experts from the Irrigation Department are carrying out surveys in six areas, where landslides can potentially occur in Paung. The results of the survey will be released soon, said U Zaw Moe Aung.

The landslide has affected 179 persons from 27 households and over 30 persons are receiving

treatment at the Mawlamyine and Thaton hospitals.

Special rescue teams from the Myanmar Fire Services Department (Central) are carrying out rescue operations at the landslide site with the use of modern machinery and help from Tatmadaw members and volunteers.

Aid from private donors and the government has reached landslide victims in Thae Byu Gon Village in the state. — Ko Hein (Paung) (Translated by GNLM)

Truck overturns in Wundwin; one killed

ONE MAN was killed after a 22-wheel vehicle overturned on 12 August near Kine Village, Wundwin Township, Mandalay Region.

According to witnesses, the vehicle carrying Myanmar beer flipped over between mileposts 379/5 and 379/6 on the Yangon-Mandalay highway in Wundwin Township after the driver lost control. The driver has been identified as Aung Ko Hteik, 29, from Insein Township. There was one passenger travelling with him who has been identified as Wai Yan Tun, 25. While the latter was heavily injured and died on the spot, the driver sustained minor injuries.

The police have filed a case of reckless driving against Aung Ko Hteik under Sections 304(A) and 337 of the Penal Code.—Htay Hlaing (Wundwin) (Translated by Hay Mar)

Domestic gold price soars tracking global cues, but market cools

WITH gold prices touching a record high in the global market, the price of gold in the domestic market is on the rise, but the market has cooled, according to U Ohn Myaing, the general secretary of the Myanmar Gold Entrepreneurs Association.

“The market has been cool. The global gold price has maintained an upward trend on the back of a risky geopolitical environment and political instability. North Korea’s missile tests, Hong Kong’s city-wide strike and street protest, and other global cues are contributing factors to the sharp rise in the gold market. The domestic gold price is positively linked to global gold prices,” said U Ohn Myaing. Earlier, when the global gold prices had dipped below US\$1,500 per ounce, the domestic price had dropped to K1,210,000 per tical (0.578 ounce or 0.016 kilogram), according to the domestic gold market.

Gold prices were pegged at \$1,525 per ounce in the global market yesterday afternoon, while the domestic price remained above K1.2 million per tical.

To stabilize the gold price and govern the gold market, the Myanmar Gold Entrepreneurs Association held a discussion on 9 August with regional and state gold entrepreneur associations. The associations pointed out that the local gold price will continue to rise, tracking global gold prices.

On 22 June, the price of pure gold crossed K1.1 million per tical, and it reached a new peak of over K1.2 million on 7 August.

With prices on the rise, the YGEA has already warned its members of legal action if any fraudulent case is detected against them. Furthermore, traders have been asked to make payments at once, according to the YGEA.

With global gold prices on

the uptick, the domestic price has hit fresh highs this year.

According to gold traders, in the month of January, the domestic gold price reached its lowest level of K1,043,400 on 1 January, and the highest level of K1,061,000 on 31 January. It touched a low of K1,058,400 on 2 February and a high of K1,087,300 on 20 February. In March, the lowest price recorded was K1,048,600 (30 March) and the highest was K1,069,000 (21 March). In April, gold prices registered a low of K1,037,200 on 24 April and a high of K1,054,700 on 11 April. The lowest price for gold in May was K1,035,200 (2 May) and the highest was K1,059,200 (14 May). In June, gold prices touched the lowest level of K1,055,000 on 1 June and the highest level of K1,125,500 on 25 June. Last month, the prices moved in the range of K1,099,000 (1 July) and 1,149,400 (31 July).

Sagaing Region to host first gem expo

SAGAING REGION will hold its first-ever gem expo from 28 August to 1 September at the Htet Kyaw private high school in the region, according to the Sagaing Gem and Jewellery Association.

The five-day expo is aimed at making jade raw materials available in the region, generating employment for local residents, and creating revenue for the regional government, according to the as-

sociation.

“Payments will be made in the local currency, Kyat. Normally, Sagaing jade traders go to Mandalay and Nay Pyi Taw to buy gems, adding to costs. Now, they can buy around 1,000 jade lots in the region,” said U Aung Gyi, the chair of the association.

“Visitors will be able to observe and evaluate jade on 28 and 29 August, and on the remaining three days, tenders

will be invited for the gems. Enthusiasts can also visit the expo. As it will be the first-ever expo, there will be no entrance fee. There will be a lucky draw for bidders,” said U Aung Gyi.

Moreover, the Sagaing Region will hold its second gem expo in December. The expo will be held biannually, according to the Sagaing Gem and Jewellery Association. — Khine Zeya

YRIC clears one domestic, eight foreign proposals for manufacturing sector

THE YANGON Region Investment Committee, at a meeting held yesterday, gave the green light to eight foreign projects from China, Hong Kong, and Malaysia and one domestic proposal, with an estimated capital of US\$10.23 million and K1.67 billion.

The enterprises will be engaged in the manufacturing sector and they are expected to create over 5,900 jobs, according to a press release issued by the YRIC.

The manufacturing sector has attracted the most foreign investments in Yangon Region, with enterprises engaging in the production of pharmaceuticals, vehicles, container boxes, and garments on a Cutting, Making, and Packing (CMP) basis.

Since its establishment, the YRIC has approved a total of 204 domestic and foreign projects in the sectors of manufacturing, hotel services, and other services from China, Singapore, Japan, Hong Kong, the Republic of Korea, Viet Nam, India, China (Taipei), Malaysia, British Virgin Islands, and Seychelles.

During the 2017-2018 (August-March) fiscal year, the YRIC had permitted 39 foreign and 9 domestic enterprises to invest in Yangon Region, with a capital of \$56.6 million and K23 billion,

creating 22,481 jobs.

From April to September, 2018, the YRIC permitted 44 projects from 34 foreign and 10 domestic enterprises, with a total pledged amount of \$72.5 million and K21.26 billion. A total of 21,173 jobs were created through those permitted enterprises.

Between 1 October and 26 June in the current 2018-2019 FY, the YRIC endorsed 113 foreign and 17 domestic projects, with capitals of \$190.48 million and K33.97 billion, creating over 67,542 jobs. In the current fiscal year, the manufacturing sector received capital expansion of \$7 million, whereas domestic investment of K479.98 million by Myanmar citizens was registered in that sector.

According to statistics released by the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration,

Yangon Region absorbs 60 per cent of all investments in Myanmar; Mandalay attracts 30 per cent, while the other regions and states get only a small share of investments.

To simplify the verification of investment projects, the Myanmar Investment Law allows the Region and State Investment Committees to grant permissions to local and foreign proposals, where the initial investment does not exceed K6 billion, or \$5 million.

Imports fall by \$900 mln in current fiscal year

THE value of imports between 1 October and 2 August in the current fiscal year stood at US\$15.27 billion, a decrease of \$900 million from the corresponding period in the previous FY, according to data released by the Ministry of Commerce.

The value of imports of consumer, capital, and intermediate goods fell significantly in the current fiscal year as against the 2017-2018FY.

Capital goods, such as auto parts, vehicles, machines, steel, and airplane parts were brought into the country, with an estimated import value of \$4.8 billion. The figure was down \$722 million compared to the same period in the previous FY.

Meanwhile, Myanmar imported consumer products worth

\$2.76 billion, including pharmaceuticals, cosmetics, and palm oil. Both private and public sector imports of consumer products fell by \$315 million compared with the corresponding period of last year.

Intermediate goods make up a large share of Myanmar’s imports, with petroleum products and plastic raw materials being the main import items. In the current fiscal, imports of raw materials declined by \$164.5 million compared to the year-ago period to reach \$5.7 billion.

During the same period, raw materials worth \$1.99 billion were also imported for the Cut-Make-Pack (CMP) garment sector. — Ko Khant

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FDI worth nearly US\$ 600 million channeled into Myotha Industrial Park

SOME foreign companies became operational in twelve sectors in Myotha Industrial Park in Ngazun Township, Mandalay Region, said a senior official from the Directorate of Investment and Company Administration (DICA) under the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations.

Foreign investments are entering into the Myotha Industrial Park where land plots are easily available for the foreign investors, she said. The DICA has given the green light to the foreign companies wishing to make investments in the Myotha Industrial Park City which is jointly developed by the Mandalay Regional Government and the Mandalay Myotha Industrial Development (MMID) with the aim of constructing more than 100 factories in the industrial zone within three years. Foreign investment inflows from China, Singapore, the Netherlands, Hong Kong and Japan mostly came to automotive industry, food processing, CMP industry, animal feed industry and services sector.

Foreign direct investments worth nearly US\$ 600 million have been channeled into Myotha In-

dustrial Park since its establishment, according to the figures from the DICA. "Myotha Industrial Park was first developed in time of the previous government and now the project is being implemented under the supervision of the regional government. Presently, foreign investments are flowing to the industrial park," she explained. Construction of the project commenced in 2013 on 260,000 acres of land and around 12,000 acres, or 4.6 per cent of land space is used by factories. As

the industrial park is adjacent to Semeikhon Port which can load up to 50 tonnes of cargo, it is convenient for waterway transportation of commodities.

In addition, a new concrete road that can reach the Myotha Industrial Park within half an hour is under construction, she added. Recently, a Chinese automaker set up a car assembly plant in the Myotha Industrial Park with an investment amount of US\$ 30 million. The factory aims to manufacture ten mod-

els of seven types of high quality vehicles to be sold not only in local market but also foreign market at reasonable prices. It is capable of producing 5,000 cars annually and employs 130 staff including 110 Myanmar citizens. According to the DICA director, foreign direct investments in Mandalay Region from January to late July this year amounted to more than US\$ 80 million and countries such as China, Japan, France and Republic of Korea invested in the five projects during this period.

Investments from foreign countries in the Mandalay Region saw US\$ 445 million while Myanmar citizen's investments in the region were valued at K172 billion in the fiscal year 2018-2019. "We gave the green light to local companies for making investments which are valued at some K126297 million in the region and the majority of foreign investment in the seven month of this year flowed to industry, electricity generation, servicing, transportation, communications

EUR 8 million to support inclusive and sustainable trade growth in Myanmar

With 8 million euros, ARISE Plus Myanmar supports micro, small and medium sized enter-

prises (MSMEs) to explore business opportunities in ASEAN, the EU and global markets. It also addresses compliance with Sanitary and Phytosanitary (SPS) standards in line with international commitments. The project helps Myanmar formulate its trade policy and assists the country in meeting its regional (ASEAN) and international (World Trade Organisation - WTO, EU) commitments and addresses non-tariff barriers (NTBs) along value chains. ARISE Plus Myanmar is expected to contribute to equitable and inclusive growth and job creation in export-ori-

ented sectors, and in line with government strategy, it will help diversify the economy to develop more added value and productive industries. This should result in new opportunities for women to enter the labour market and access better paid jobs. and manufacturing sectors,” she said. The investment projects were approved by the Mandalay Regional Investment Committee with the permission of the Myanmar Investment Commission. The DICA has been cooperating with the local government to attract foreign direct investments into the region and organizing seminars, investment forum and business forum.

The director highlighted that FDI inflows contribute to the creation of job opportunities for local people, help their income increase and promote their socioeconomic status. Most of the investments came from China, followed by Singapore and Hong Kong. A total of 16 countries including Thailand, Singapore, Hong Kong, Japan, Netherlands and France made investments in Mandalay Region.

The Myanmar Investment Commission (MIC) expects that the region will receive more foreign direct investment (FDI) in the next year. Foreign investments in Mandalay Region so far totaled more than US\$ 3.9 billion while Myanmar citizen investment volume reached over K5,060 billion. The MIC also permitted 21 FDI projects worth US\$ 1,146 million in the region during the period from April 2017 to March 2018.



IFC Supports Yangon’s New Construction Permit System to Help Improve the Ease of Doing Business in Myanmar

IFC, a member of the World Bank Group, has been supporting the Building Control Authority (BCA) of the Yangon City Development Committee (YCDC) to reform the city’s construction permit system and create a business and investor-friendly environment in Myanmar. The Yangon Building Permit System (YBPS) went online on 1 July and will be piloted until the end of the year.

Following a year-long partnership between IFC and YCDC, the automated, paper-free system is estimated to reduce the processing time, from an average of 95 days to 49 days, of about 90 per cent of the 4,000 construction permits submitted annually. The new online building permit system, available in English and, Myanmar languages, was custom-built for YCDC. Pro-

fessionally certified architects and construction engineers are participating in the pilot testing phase.

“We are pleased to pilot the Yangon Building Permit System, which was developed in response to the business community’s appeal for more efficiency in processing permits,” said Daw Hlaing Maw Oo, YCDC Secretary. “The pilot phase will test the waters, and by the time the system is rolled out in December, we will have an efficient, transparent, and cost-effective system in place.”

IFC’s support in developing the YBPS is part of a broader programme to improve the ease of doing business in Myanmar. In the 2019 Doing Business Index, the country ranks 171 out of 190 economies. ‘Dealing with con-

struction permits’ is one of the 10 indicators used to determine the index. “Compared to other sectors, Myanmar’s construction sector has the highest earning potential. An efficient, transparent, and affordable permit system will enable a conducive business environment in Myanmar,” said Vikram Kumar, IFC Country Manager for Myanmar. “This reform, in sync with the government’s efforts, will help build investors’ confidence and ensure a competitive and sustainable construction sector, helping to create jobs and drive Myanmar’s economy.” In May 2018, IFC and YCDC conducted a detailed assessment and process mapping of the construction permit system in Yangon. While supporting YCDC with capacity building exercises, IFC also en-

gaged with end-users to ensure a customized system to address the needs of Yangon’s construction sector.

Other recent Doing Business reforms in Myanmar include establishing Myanmar’s first credit bureau, and the approval of the revised Import and Export Negative lists which exempted about 70 per cent of exported products and about 57 per cent of imported products from needing a license. IFC, in partnership with Australia, the United Kingdom and Japan, has been supporting the government’s Doing Business Reform Working Group, which is chaired by the Deputy Minister of Commerce, to make it easier to do business in Myanmar and promote development of the private sector as a key driver of economic growth. — GNLM

Team Myanmar left for Thailand in the morning on 13 August from Yangon, and they were seen off at the Yangon International Airport by Myanmar Football Federation general secretary

Ko Ko Thein.

The tour, which includes 33 players and coach members, is led by U Win Moe Thu, the chief coach of the women's national team.

The 2019 AFF Women's Championship will be held from 15 to 27 August in Chonburi, Thailand. A total of nine teams divided into two groups will participate in the tourney.

Myanmar is in Group B with Viet Nam, Cambodia, and

Indonesia for the tourney, while defending champions Thailand, Malaysia, Philippines, Singapore, and Timor-Leste are in Group A.

Myanmar will play against Indonesia on 16 August, Cambodia on 18 August, and Viet Nam on 20 August in the group stage at the IPE Chonburi Stadium in Chonburi.

Costa to pay 1.7 million euros to settle Spain tax fraud case

MADRID (Spain)— Atletico Madrid striker Diego Costa has agreed to pay 1.7 million euros (\$1.9 million) to Spain's tax agency which was investigating him for non-payment of taxes on image rights, a Spanish newspaper reported Tuesday.

The agency said the 30-year-old hid income earned in 2014 from a sponsorship deal signed with Adidas shortly before he joined Chelsea from Atletico that year. Costa, who has both Brazilian and Spanish citizenship, returned to Atletico in 2018.

Under a deal with Spain's tax office, Costa will plead guilty to tax evasion and pay 1.1 million euros in back taxes, daily newspa-

per El Mundo, reported. He will also be sentenced to six months in jail but will not serve time and instead pay a fine of 600,000 euros, the paper said. The agreement will be made official at a Madrid court on October 4, El Mundo reported.

Contacted by AFP, a spokesman for the tax office, said he could not comment on individual tax files. Costa is the latest famous footballer to have fallen foul of Spain's tax authorities.

A Spanish court in January handed Portuguese striker Cristiano Ronaldo a suspended two-year prison sentence for committing tax fraud when he was at Real Madrid.—AFP ■
