# Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approves forming a Joint Committee to Implement Steps to Amend Constitution while bill to amend the Constitution for the second time accepted

THE eighth-day meeting of the eleventh regular session of the Second Pyidaungsu Hluttaw was held at the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw meeting hall in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

At the meeting Pyidaungsu Hluttaw approves the forming of a Joint Committee to Implement Steps to Amend Constitution, a bill to amend the Constitution for the second time accepted, reports on bills read, approved the Joint Public Accounts Committee report 3/2019, signing the Instrument of Ratification on an agreement related to ASEAN Framework Agreement on the Facilitation of Goods in Transit and sending it to ASEAN Secretariat.

## Hluttaw approves forming a Joint Committee to Implement Steps to Amend Constitution

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Deputy Speaker U Tun Tun Hein first explained about works conducted on forming a Joint Committee to Implement Steps to Amend Constitution.

During the first Pyidaungsu Hluttaw term a joint committee formed with 109 members to study the Constitution was too big while an implementation committee to amend the Constitution was formed with 31 members was too small causing delays in its work and took more than 22 months to conduct its job said the Deputy Speaker.

The joint committee will be formed with 45 members and meetings were held with representatives of 14 political parties in the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw, responsible persons from Tatmadaw Hluttaw representatives, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker and Amyotha Hluttaw Speaker toward forming of this joint committee. Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Office had informed by letters to the meeting attendees to submit group wise member lists to be included in the joint committee to the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker by 4 p.m. 14 February 2019.

When the 45 member joint committee is formed Deputy Speaker is assigned as the joint committee Chairman as per his

official position and therefore Deputy Speaker will not be considered as representing Pyithu Hluttaw. In the joint committee there'll be 22 members from Pyithu Hluttaw, Amyotha Hluttaw Deputy Speaker who'll be the Deputy Chairman of the joint committee as per his official position and 21 members from Amyotha Hluttaw totaling 44.

In the Second Pyidaungsu Hluttaw there were 486 Hluttaw representatives from 14 political parties, 5 independents and 166 Tatmadaw representatives making up a total of 657.

Political parties with more than 10 representatives and Tatmadaw representatives will be included in the joint committee proportionately. For political parties with 1 to 5 representatives, there'll be one representative from each party in the joint committee so that all parties are represented in the joint committee and participate in the process of drafting a bill to amend the Constitution.

Of the 44 members to be selected for the joint committee, 10 will be provided by 10 political parties that had between one to five Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representatives. One will be representing the five independents. Including the Amyotha Hluttaw Deputy Speaker who'll be in the joint committee due to his position, there remain 32 members of the joint committee to be filled.

These 32 members will be proportionally allocated to political parties with more than 10 representatives in the Hluttaw and the Tatmadaw representatives. As there were decimal

numbers when proportion was calculated, there remains one member to be filled and this will be from Shan Nationalities League for Democracy (SNLD). Therefore, SNLD will have two members in the joint committee. As Amyotha Hluttaw Deputy Speaker (from Arakan National Party) is in the joint committee due to his position, Arakan National Party (ANP) nominated one member each from its Pyithu Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw representatives as members of the joint committee. Due to this National League for Democracy (NLD) that was allocated 19 members proportionately is instead nominating 18 members for the joint committee.

As it is a joint committee, parties that have the right to propose more than one member and Tatmadaw representatives will have an equal number of joint committee members from Pyithu Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw.

Amyotha Hluttaw representative Dr. Myat Nyana Soe of Yangon Region constituency 3 and Pyithu Hluttaw representative U Htay Win Aung @ U Pyone Cho of Dawbon constituency were being assigned as joint committee secretary and joint secretary respectively.

The joint committee has five aims, 14 duties, 6 mandates, 4 procedures and 4 rights and the term of the joint committee will start from the formation of the joint committee and include submission of a report, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representatives discussing the report, obtaining the decision of the Pyidaungsu

Hluttaw and ends when a bill to amend the Constitution is drafted for submission to the Hluttaw.

Once Hluttaw's approval of the report is obtained after discussion, the joint committee is to prepare a draft bill to amend the Constitution based on the approval of the Hluttaw. The joint committee will prepare a draft bill to amend the Constitution without violating the Constitution, Pyidaungsu Hluttaw law, rules and procedures. The joint committee will strive toward the drawing up a draft bill to amend the Constitution and will not work for any party or group and all are urged to participate in this explained the Deputy Speaker.

At the moment NLD nominated 18 members, ANP nominated two members, SNLD nominated two members, Ta'Ang (Palaung) National Party, Zomi Congress for Democracy, Pa-O National Organisation, Lisu National Development Party (cross-bow party), Kachin State Democracy Party, Kokang Democracy and Unity Party, National Unity Party, Mon National Party, Wa Democratic Party and National United Democratic Party nominated one member each and one member representing the independents was nominated to the joint committee.

Union Solidarity and Development Party and Tatmadaw Hluttaw representatives hadn't sent its member list for the joint committee and thus names were not included in the draft announcement which had been distributed to the Hluttaw representatives said the Deputy Speaker.

When the Hluttaw voted on the matter, there were 389 for, 192 against and 3 abstaining and Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker U T Khun Myat announced the Hluttaw's approval to form a Joint Committee to Implement Steps to Amend Constitution. Pyidaungsu Hluttaw announced further that an order to form the Joint Committee will be published once the full list of nominated members is obtained.

## Bill to amend the Constitution for the second time

Next an announcement was made of Pyidaungsu Hluttaw receiving on 11 February 2019

a bill to amend the Constitution for the second time signed and submitted by U Thein Tun of Kyaunggon constituency and 143 Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representatives. As the 143 Pyidaungsu Hluttaw representatives consisting of 38 elected Hluttaw representatives and 105 Tatmadaw Hluttaw representatives which is more than 20 percent of the total 657 Hluttaw representatives, it will be discussed in the Hluttaw according to Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Rule section 133. And as per Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Rule section 135 a Joint Committee to Study the Bill to amend the Constitution for the second time was formed with all committee members of Pyithu Hluttaw and Amyotha Hluttaw Bill Committees with Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Office Notification 14/2019 on 19 February 2019.

An announcement was made that the notification and a copy of the draft bill had been distributed to the Hluttaw representatives.

## Joint Bill Committee reports read

Following this reports of Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Joint Bill Committee on Literary and Artistic Copyrights Bill and 2018 Gambling Bill were read by joint bill committee members and Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker announced for Hluttaw representatives who want to discuss the bills to register their names.

## Joint Public Accounts Committee report 3/2019

Union Auditor General U Maw Than and Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Development Works Central Committee secretary U Khin Maung Than explained about Joint Public Accounts Committee report 3/2019 and responded to discussions made by the Hluttaw representatives.

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Joint Bill Committee Deputy Chairman U Saw Than Htut then tabled a motion for the Hluttaw to agree and accept the report 3/2019.

After Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker obtained the unanimous decision of the Hluttaw an announcement was made of the Hluttaw agreeing and accepting the report 3/2019.

where a decision was made to change from an administrative system ruled by Chieftains to a democratic administrative system. Also on 9<sup>th</sup> October 1950, at the 7<sup>th</sup> Chin Traditional Council meeting held in Yangon and it designated 20<sup>th</sup> February, the date on which this people's conference was held as "Chin National Day". Chin National Day which has been celebrated since 1948 is now in the 71<sup>st</sup> year. This Chin National Day is an auspicious day in the sense that this day brings together all the Chin tribes which have the same language, culture, history and traditions.

Chin State is a place with mountain ranges stretching from north to south and rare plants. Besides, the state is rich in natural resources including the Mt. Khaw-nu-soum teeming with rare plants, the beautiful Reed Lake, the Kaladan River, the Manipur River, the Bwenu River and the Nontalar waterfalls. By the time the transport access to the state has improved, the state would see booming of its tourism sector.

Hence, our government has been building and upgrading roads giving it as a priority as part of efforts for making the transportation smooth in the hills of Chin State which was not easily accessible by road.

Similarly, our government has been working for the ethnic people living in the Chin State, for their future so-

cial-economic development. In order to do this, we have been opening new basic education schools, upgrading schools, repairing new education buildings and building new ones, and appointing new teachers; in the health care area we have been opening new hospitals and health clinics, and appointing new doctors as needed.

Besides, our government has been making efforts to provide electricity to all places in the Chin State from the national grid, to build the first ever airport for the state and to bring about the Kaladan River Basic development in Palatwa and the Chin State has seen visible and significant developments in each sector. In undertaking regional development works, it is important for the ethnic people to join hands with the Union government and the State government.

Chin ethnic leaders such as Boh Khaing Baik and Boh Khaing Kam who led the Chin ethnic people in our revolutionary struggle against colonialists, Chin representatives such as U Hlur Hmone, U Htaung Zar Khoke and U Ki Yo Manh who signed the Panglong Agreement, Chin ethnic man U Vum Thu Maung, later Thado Maha Thayay Sithu title and Independence Mawgunwin (First Class) title was conferred on him, who tabled the motion on the Independence of Myanmar at the Naythurein Conference at Kandawgyi in Yangon and demanded the independence without discrimination between the central plains and the hilly regions at the

Pha-Sa-Pa-La Conference on behalf of the Pha-Sa-Pa-La and Capt. Thura Aung San Thuriya Taik Chun who was conferred the country's highest bravery title of Aung San Thuriya for his excellence sacrifice and performance for the country are leaders whom Chin ethnic people can be proud of them.

Taking lessons from bitter experiences we faced throughout our history, our government has been holding political dialogues at the Union Peace Conference-21<sup>st</sup> Century Panglong with the strength of the peoples as part of efforts for achieving internal peace and building a democratic federal Union inspired by the peoples from different nationalities of the Union. It is a matter of pride for the Union that we held a national-level political dialogue with Chin ethnic representatives and secured their cooperation in the peace conference.

In conclusion, as I send this Message of Greetings, let me solemnly urge all Chin ethnic people to continue to cooperate with us with firm Union spirit, in building a future democratic federal Union which can guarantee the democracy, equality and self-determination inspired by all the peoples from different nationalities of the Union.

## Tatmadaw captures Assam, Kathe insurgents' camp, arms

TROOPS of the Tatmadaw carried out security operations near Takar Village in the Naga Self-administered Zone, Sagaing Region, from 8 to 19 February, and captured a camp, arrested four insurgents, and recovered 53 weapons and ammunition, according to news released by the Office of the Commander-in-Chief yesterday.

According to recent reports, the troops of the Tatmadaw also carried out security operations in the NSCN(K) camp and area near Takar Village in the Naga Self-administered Zone on 29 January, acting on information that Assam and Kathe insurgents were moving there.



## Additional statistical bulletin on drug seizures, acting on information

1. In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.
2. With orders from the Office of the President, the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department relayed information on reports on drug-related offenses up to 16 February 2019 to the Ministry of Home Affairs to take action, as displayed below:

3. Out of the information sent to the Ministry of Home Affairs, so far a total of 512 cases have been opened files as of 16-2-2019. A total of 804 people, including 673 men and 131 women had been arrested with seizures of 5701.32 g of heroin, 67.14 g of ICE, 38,607.94 g of opium, 329.6 g of low-quality opium, 18,795.28 g of speciosa powder, 7,273.99 g of speciosa, 214,684 stimulant tablets, 4,668.27 g of marijuana, 0.1 liters of opium tincture, 378.06 g of opium blocks, 60 g of poppy seeds, 3.45 g of crushed stimulant tablet powder, 0.001 g of crushed ecstasy powder, 16 firearms, different kinds of 257 bullets and 1 grenade. Efforts for fighting the drug trafficking has been stepped up and the ministry will report on further exposed cases.

Two men were seized with 5 stimulant tablets and one motorbike in Minkanyoe Village, PyuTsp, Bago Region. Two women were seized with 38 stimulant tablets, 48.9 g of marijuana there. Two men were seized with 556 stimulant tablets in Chanmyathayar Ward, PyigyidagunTsp, Mandalay Region. A man was seized with 1305 g of heroin on the bus driving from Muse to Mandalay. One Thai national was seized with 0.8 g of ICE, two Thai women were seized with 5 stimulant tablets and 5 g of ICE in TachilekTsp, Shan State. A Thai national was seized with 105 stimulant tablets together with 6080 stimulant tablets, 776 Ecstasy tablets at the house he rented. It was learnt that a parcel sending to the General Post office from abroad included illegal drugs and, upon investigation a man who took the parcel was seized with 26,189 Ecstasy tablets from the parcel.

There have been six seizures of ammunitions. A man from Mienar Village, Waingmaw Tsp, Kachin State was seized with 0.9 g of heroin, one pistol, 16 9mm bullets, one bullet casket, 11 M-20 cartridges and 1 91-handgrenade. A man was seized with 3 stimulant tablets, one air rifle and one percussion

lock firearm in Tsp, Shan State. Two men were seized with 740 stimulant tablets, 10 g of heroin, one air rifle, one motorbike in Lawa Village, Mabein Tsp. A Thai national was seized with 2 stimulant tablets, 0.7 g of ICE, one pistol, one bullet casket, 7 38-mm cartridges, 8.45-mm cartridges and one motorbike. Three men were seized with 190 stimulant tablets, one percussion lock firearm and one motorbike in PulawTsp, Taninthayi Region. A man was seized with 10 stimulant tablets, one air rifle and 15 steel ball in Latkuu Village.

There have been 317 cases being opened between 10-2-2019 and 16-2-2019. A total of 439 people, including 386 men and 53 women, were seized with 3438 g of heroin, 50171 g of ICE, 102 g of low-quality opium, 3555.63 g of opium, 38,6065 stimulant tablets, 677.78 g of marijuana, 16.33 opium blocks, 0.05 liters of Toluene, 1920 g of speciosa powder, 16329.3 g of speciosa, 5 Buprenorphine Tablets, 26965 Ecstasy Tablets, 7 different types of ammunition, 42 cartridges, two bullet caskets, one 91-handgrenade and 15 steel ball.

People in urban cities, at least, have access to healthcare, but rural areas are not so fortunate. Therefore, the Ministry of Health and Sports is prioritizing efforts in those areas. It's heartening to see progress being made in that respect.

Among the initiatives spearheaded by the MoHS are the hypertension and diabetes clinics opened on Wednesdays in rural areas. This is a welcome step forward in reducing the mortality rate of our people from noncontagious diseases.

If we can provide quality healthcare to all families and people in our nation, then we will not only prevent premature deaths, but empower our citizens to lead healthy lives. A healthy life leads to a healthy mind, and will bring prosperity and development to Myanmar.

In the past, humanity was threatened by contagious diseases. But now, we face a new threat — noncontagious diseases, that can just as easily afflict our lives. These noncommunicable diseases include cardiovascular ailments, hypertension, and diabetes. According to a health survey conducted in 2016-2017, 75 per cent of deaths in Myanmar can be attributed to hypertension, diabetes, or some form of noncontagious disease.

Noncommunicable diseases have become widespread during the last decade. The main causes for their proliferation is the increase in global population and the change in living standards, including changes in our environment and the food we consume. The people of Myanmar are still not equipped for leading a high-quality life, which is why they are still being threatened by these diseases.

Myanmar is still not developed enough to provide health protection to all its citizens. However, the country's healthcare authorities are treading out of the former norm and working towards providing healthcare as

## Collaborative Efforts of University of Yangon in the Asian Universities Forum (2019)

### “Building of Capacities for Inclusive and Sustainable Growth in Asia”

UNIVERSITY of Yangon is a leading academic institution in Myanmar and its leading role is keen to bolster capacity in all areas including regional and international collaboration. In order to extend its collaborative efforts, it is actively taking part in some regional universities networks such as ASEAN University Network, Asian Universities Alliance, Asian Universities Forum, Silk Road Universities Forum and etc. The aims of being a member of these networks are to strengthen collaboration among universities by exchanging faculties and students, to cooperate for joint degree programme, to conduct joint research programme and to exchange view on higher education system. This article would like to highlight how University of Yangon has participated in the 8<sup>th</sup> Asian Universities Forum (2019) that was held in Manila, the Philippines.

The Asian Universities Forum (AUF) was an initiative of the Seoul National University (SNU) in 2011. With the initiative of SNU, the AUF was first convened in 2011. It is an annual forum that is held rotationally by member universities for extending network. Under this network, there are twenty-two universities representing twelve countries including Myanmar. The University of Yangon and the Monywa University represent Myanmar as members of AUF. From 2011 to 2018, the forum has been held for seven times. In this year 2019, Ateneo de Manila University and Seoul National University jointly

organized the AUF. It was a two-day forum held from 9<sup>th</sup> to 10<sup>th</sup> February 2019. The aim of AUF (2019) is to render a setting for exchange of views on sustainable development in the global educational arena. The Forum was held with two sessions under the theme “The Building of Capacities for Inclusive and Sustainable Growth in Asia”. The first session focused on “Sustainable growth in Asia” and second session dealt with “Gender equality.” The participants of the AUF (2019) are chancellors, rectors, presidents, professors and scholars of the member universities. It is an opportunity for

University of Yangon to participate in this forum by sharing how Myanmar is implementing in the area of sustainable development and gender equality.

Both sessions were very interesting as they shared their country's policy and implementation in sustainable development and gender equality. There were four speakers and four discussants in the second session. A professor from National University of Malaysia (UKM) discussed “Empowering Women for 4<sup>th</sup> Industrial Revolution” and discussed the nature and situation of Malaysian women in decision-making. She highlighted the limited role of women in taking the position of Director General level and Rector level in their universities. This is quite different from the situation of Myanmar women position in administration and universities because women occupied nearly eighty percent in the teaching profession and also taking key positions as Professors, Heads, Pro Rectors, Rectors and Deputy Director Generals. The topic I shared in this forum was “Gender Equality: Empowering Myanmar Women in Peace Process”. I discussed this topic by

comparing the role of Myanmar women in peace process under two administrations (2011-2016) and (2016-present).

The political transition that began in 2011 open space for women and women groups to become more active in taking part of politics such as forming political parties, participating in election and peace process. These groups play important role in democratic transition and peace building. Women make up more than half of Myanmar's population of 51.4 million, and they can be the nation's strength, if they actively participate in the peace process. Myanmar Hluttaw, which came into force in 2011, plays important role for making peace process and composed of several committees including Peace Process Committees. Only two women representatives from ethnic political parties: Kachin and Mon are included in the Peace Process Committee. Although women's role in peace building, initiated by the government and Hluttaw is limited in scope, the role of women in taking part of peace process can be observed in women networks and women NGOs. There are more

both Pyuthu Hluttaw and Amyothar Hluttaw but women inclusion can be found with only few numbers. As peace is given as high priority, three rounds of peace conference were held in the name of 21<sup>st</sup> Century Panglong Peace Conference. The participation of women in the conference has increased from eight percent to twenty percent. But women participation is still under limitation in order to run important mechanism such as in the Union Peace Dialogue Joint Committee, women making only eight out of 75 members. Therefore, it is necessary to consider meaningful participation of women in the peace process and to draw attention for the women leadership and decision-making, their negotiation skill and their capacity at the table.

As Myanmar as a peace-loving member of the United Nations, it is recommended that Myanmar government needs to enhance the capacity and expand the space for women in participating the peace process. “Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan (2018-2030)” which is the strategy for sustainable development was issued in August 2018. Peace and stability is listed as pillar one and inclusion of women for thirty percent has been identified. With these commitments, it is hope that Myanmar women representing more than half of the total population will be a promising force in the state building, nation building and peace building for the transitional country Myanmar. These are the salient points that I shared my view and presented at the 8<sup>th</sup> AUF (2019). I would like to encourage Myanmar women to take part in politics and peace building efforts by highlighting this article.

## Undocumented migrant workers return via Kawthoung

A TOTAL of 81 Myanmar migrant workers — 70 men and 11 women — were sent back from Thailand through the Kawthoung border gate on Monday evening for not holding proper documentation.

Myanmar labour attaché U Zaw Min Aung brought the Myanmar migrant workers to Kawthoung via the sea route and handed them over to the authorities.

The Thai government had

arrested them as they did not have work permits, and were found holding expired border passes. Currently, the Township General Administration Department, Immigration and Population Department, Anti-trafficking in Persons Division of Myanmar Police Force, Labour Department, and Disaster Management Department are discussing arrangements for the safe return of the illegal migrant workers to their homes.

## Seven Ayeyawady dolphins died in one year

SEVEN Ayeyawady dolphins have died within the last one year, according to the Ayeyawady dolphin conservation team. A survey conducted this month in waterway from Mandalay to Bhamo townships along the Ayeyawady River found 72 dolphins, said the conservation team.

"The number of dolphins declined this year compared to last year. Seven dolphins were found dead during the period from February 2018 to February 2019. Four of them were young dolphins, as stated in this year's survey," said U Han Win, the person in charge of the Ayeyawady dolphin conservation team.

The survey of the Ayeyawady dolphin population is usually con-

ducted in February every year in waterway between Mandalay and Bhamo townships. This year, the survey was conducted for 10 days from 6 February to 16 February. There are three zones of Ayeyawady dolphin conservation. According to statistics re-

corded in February 2018, there were a total of 76 dolphins living in their natural habitat along the Ayeyawady River, including 26 dolphins recorded in the area from Mandalay to Kyaukmyaung townships, 37 dolphins in the area from Malae Village to Shwegu

township, and 13 in the area from the Ayeyawady Hsin kan bridge to Bhamo Town.

According to statistics recorded this month, a total of 72 Ayeyawady dolphins were found along the Ayeyawady river, including 24 dolphins in the area from Mandalay to Kyaukmyaung townships, 34 dolphins in the area from Malae village to Shwegu township, and 14 in the area from Ayeyawady Hsin kan bridge to Bhamo Town.

As per records, seven dolphins were found dead, six in 2018 and one in 2019, along the Ayeyawady river in the course of one year. The deaths were attributed to means of illegal fishing and electrofishing.—GNLM

## Korean varsity donates learning aids to Dagon University

## Muse trade falls by \$585 mln

THE value of Sino-Myanmar border trade through the Muse checkpoint as of 8 February in the current financial year (Oct 2018-Sep 2019) showed a decline of US\$585 million compared to the year-ago period, according to data released by the Ministry of Commerce.

Between 1 October and 8 February, trade at Muse gate plunged to \$1.79 billion from \$2.38 billion recorded in the corresponding period of the previous FY.

Muse is a major border

gate in Myanmar and performs the largest volume of trade. It has witnessed a steep drop in trade owing to tight confiscation and trade suspension by China coupled with a market holiday during the Chinese New Year.

Over the four-month period in the current FY, exports through Muse gate totalled \$1.14 billion, while imports were valued at \$649 million. Exports fell by \$600 million, whereas imports showed a slight increase compared with the same period in the previous fiscal.

Myanmar conducts border trade with China through the Muse, Lwejel, Chinshwehaw, Kanpiketee, and Kengtung gates.

Myanmar exports rice, sugar, pulses, sesame seeds, corn, dried tea leaves, fishery products, minerals, and animal products to China, while it imports agriculture machinery, electrical appliances, iron and steel-related materials, raw industrial goods, and consumer goods. — GNLM

## METRO to help meet food safety norms

## Rent for serviced apartments in Yangon declines 3-7%

RENTAL costs for serviced apartments in Yangon region have declined by three to seven per cent, according to the 2018 fourth quarter (October-December) market report issued by Collier International (Myanmar), a Canada-based real estate service agency.

The Kantharyar Serviced Residences located in Mingalar Taungnyunt Township, Yangon, entered the market in the fourth quarter of 2018. Therefore, the number of serviced apartments increased to 14 per cent. Currently, there are 2,240 serviced apartments in the Yangon Region.

The agency expects the number of apartments to increase to 16 per cent in the

next three years. Around 10 projects with 2,400 apartments are being implemented from 2019 to 2021.

The market for serviced apartments is a high-end user market. So, most of the people want to rent affordable serviced apartments. People prefer to rent small apartments with one or two bedrooms. Additionally, penthouses have been more marketable recently.

The number of serviced apartments is expected to increase in Yangon Region. The real estate agency forecasts that there will be around 3,000 apartments by 2020 and 4,800 apartments by 2022. — GNLM


## J&M Steel Structure Fabrication Plant fulfilling both local and foreign requirements

RECENTLY opened Myaungmya Bridge as well as many bridges under construction by Ministry of Construction had been constructed with steel structure products of J&M Steel Structure Fabrication Plant, said Ministry of Construction Deputy Director General U Kyaw Kaung Cho.

To fulfill the steel structure products requirement of Myanmar J&M Steel Construction Co., Ltd's Steel Structure Fabrication Plant was established with the permission Myanmar Investment Commission in 2014 July on a 16 acres land in Thakayta Township, Yangon Region. It was a joint venture between Ministry of Construction and JFE Engineering Cooperation

of Japan with 40 percent investment from Myanmar and 60 percent investment from Japan and has been providing steel structure products to the market since fiscal year 2015-2016.

“In the past, steel structure products, especially for bridges had to be imported by using foreign currency. Much time needs to be given and now it can be easily obtained in the country with local currency. At the least, there is a saving in transportation expenses. Required parts are obtained at required time. For example Myaungmya Bridge was an urgent task. The original design had to be changed and experts and designers from the factory were consulted and a new design was produced and

as the requirement was to finish it within a year, the bridge was reconstructed in eight months” said Deputy Director General U Kyaw Kaung Cho.

When the plant was

started ten thousand tons per year was produced and to date had produced 80,000 tons. The target is to produce 30,000 tons per year. U Kyaw Kaung Cho added that around a

hundred bridges had been constructed of which more than 70 bridges were with Plate Girder, more than 15 Steel Truss type bridges and 13 Box Girder Type bridges.

In addition to bridges undertaken by Ministry of Construction, Kokkine overpass and harbor structure in Yangon were constructed with steel structures from J&M Steel Solution Co, Ltd. plant.

For overseas markets, 200 tons to Laos in 2014, ten thousand tons to Bangladesh in 2017-2018 and 300 tons to Sri Lanka in 2016 were exported. Arrangements are being made to export 8,000 tons to India in 2018-2019.

The plant employs close to 600 Myanmar personnel including engineers and training courses to raise the capacity of the personnel were conducted by experts from Japan in the country as well as in Japan it is learnt.— Khin Win Maw

# Fire outbreak in War Tayar plywood factory kills one, injures 13

A major fire outbreak occurred in Plywood factory, War Tayar Industrial zone, Shwepyitha Township on Monday, killing one and leaving 13 male workers injured, said U Thwin Yu Naing, head of Shwepyitha Township Fire Service Department.

The fire started at 7.10 pm on 18 February and it was under control about 8.15 pm and was totally extinguished at 8.30 pm.

Over 400 firefighters and 161 auxiliary firefighters battled the fire with 44 fire engines and five supportive vehicles.

“A wrong news that six people were killed in fire outbreak is spreading. At present, an in-

jured person, Nyein Chan Oo, 32 died at 4.40 am on 19 February at Insein Hospital and the two injured out of 13 are in critical condition at the Yangon General Hospital. With the cooperation of Fire Service Department and other relative departments, there was not any difficulties in extinguishing the fire”, said U Thwin Yu Naing.

Among 14 injured people in this fire outbreak, 12 persons were taken to Insein Hospital while the remaining two to the Yangon General Hospital.

The cause of fire outbreak is under investigation. —Pwint Thitsar/(Translated by La Wonn)

# Fighting between Tatmadaw troops, AA insurgents occurred

ABOUT a hundred AA insurgents were reported to be active in hills near Paungtote Village, Mrauk-U town, Rakhine State to establish a training camp and operation area about 31 km north from where Rakhine State Chief Minister’s convoy was attacked by remote controlled improvised explosive devices on 1 January 2019 and 6 km. north east from a place where another vehicle was attacked by a mine on 17 February. During the operations two engagements with about a hundred AA insurgents occurred at about 15 km east of Kyauktaw Town and the insurgents retreated toward the south while the Tatmadaw columns were in hot pursuit.

During the engagement some Tatmadaw personnel were hurt and 9 bodies of AA insurgents were found with one RPG. Tatmadaw columns are continuing security operations

# Australians mark anniversary of Japan’s WWII air raid on Darwin

DARWIN (Australia) — The northern Australian city of Darwin marked on Tuesday the 77th anniversary of a Japanese air raid that killed hundreds during World War II.

The Bombing of Darwin, which occurred on 19 February, 1942, was the first attack by Japanese forces on the Australian mainland and is estimated to have killed around 250 people, as well as destroying 30 aircraft and nine ships.

Administrator of the Northern Territory Vicki O’Halloran, the Queen’s representative in the territory, said in her remarks at a service that the arrival of the war in Darwin was responsible for “fundamentally changing Australia.”

Darwin’s close proximity to present-day Indonesia and its build-up of military infrastructure made the port city a prime target for the Japanese. In addition to Australian ships, there were a number of US Navy

vessels in the harbour at the time of the attack.

At 9:58 am, an air raid siren sounded and members of the Australian Defence Force re-enacted the exact moment 188 Japanese aircraft flew over Darwin Harbour.

As the siren blared, fighter aircraft flew over the site of the service and army personnel simulated the Australian response to the bombing, using ceremonial howitzers to return fire using blanks.

Brian Winspear, a former flight lieutenant in the Royal Australian Air Force, was in Darwin the day Japanese forces attacked and was involved in the defense of the city.

The 99-year-old told Kyodo News that during the war “we were supposed to hate the Japanese,” but his feelings toward the former wartime enemy have long since changed.

“We’ve got enough problems in the world without hat-

ing anyone,” he said, proudly pointing out that he has owned 15 Japanese-made cars in his lifetime.

Chief Minister of the Northern Territory Michael Gunner, the top elected official of the

territory government, said in his remarks that with Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe’s visit to the northern Australian city in November, Darwin and its people “are now symbols of peace.” Abe’s visit, which in-

cluded his laying a wreath at a memorial to victims of the Japanese bombing together with Australian Prime Minister Scott Morrison, marked the first visit to the city by a Japanese premier. —Kyodo News ■





## ‘Killer’ cells raise hope of universal flu vaccine

PARIS (France) — Scientists said on Monday they had discovered immune cells that can fight all known flu viruses in what was hailed as an “extraordinary breakthrough” that could lead to a universal, one-shot vaccine against the killer disease.

Influenza epidemics, largely seasonal, kill hundreds of thousands of people each year, according to the World Health Organization.

Due to its mutating strains, vaccine formulas must be regularly updated and only offer limited protection currently.

Researchers in Australia said that “killer T cells” — found in over half the world’s population — had shown in testing to be effective in fighting all common flu varieties.

This means the cells could potentially be used to develop an all-encompassing flu shot that did not need to be changed annually, and even be effective in people who don’t naturally possess them.

“Influenza viruses continuously mutate to evade recognition by our immune system, and they are vastly diverse, making it nearly impossible to predict and vaccinate against the strain that will cause the next influenza pandemic,” said Marios Koutsakos, a researcher at the University of Melbourne’s Doherty Institute.

T cells are a type of white blood cell that roams the body scanning for abnormalities and infections. They are essential for human immunity against a host of invading bacteria and viruses.

So-called “killer” T cells are unique in that they can directly target and kill other infected cells.

Koutsakos and his colleagues used mass spectrometry — a scanning technique that helps separate molecules based on their mass — to identify parts of the virus that are shared across all flu strains, and realised that killer T cells could effectively fight variations of influenza A, B and C.— AFP ■

## Scientists decode white shark genome, finding cancer-protective mechanism

WASHINGTON — An international team of scientists have decoded the entire genome of white shark and identified their superior cancer-protective abilities.

The study published on Monday in the journal *Proceedings of the National Academy of Sciences* showed that a plethora of genetic changes might be behind the evolutionary success of large-bodied and long-lived sharks.

The researchers found that the massive vertebrate’s molecular adaptation in numerous genes helped maintain the genome stability and counteract the accumulation of damage to a species’ DNA, thereby preserving the integrity of the genome.

The opposite phenomenon called genome instability, which results from accumulated DNA damage, is well known to expose

humans to numerous cancers and age-related diseases, according to the study.

“Not only were there a surprisingly high number of genome stability genes that contained these adaptive changes, but there was also an enrichment of several of these genes, highlighting the importance of this genetic fine-tuning in the white shark,” said Mahmood Shivji with Nova Southeastern University, who led the study.

Previously, scientists supposed that the risk of developing cancer should increase with both the number of cells (large bodies) and an organism’s lifespan. The white shark has a huge size of genome, one-and-a-half times the size the the human genome.

But contrary to the expectation, the new study found that very large-bodied animals did

not get cancer more often than humans.

The study showed that the white shark genome contained a very high number of “jumping genes” or transposons, which could represent a strong selective agent for the evolution of efficient DNA repair mechanisms.

Shivji’s group also found evolutionary adaptations were linked to the white shark’s rapid wound healing ability.

“Genome instability is a very important issue in many serious human diseases. Now we find that nature has developed clever strategies to maintain the stability of genomes in these large-bodied, long-lived sharks,” said Shivji.

Shivji said the findings might be useful to fight cancer and age-related diseases, and improve wound healing treatments in humans.—Xinhua ■

## Israel’s first lunar mission to launch this week

TEL AVIV (Israel) — Israel is to launch its first moon mission this week, sending an unmanned spacecraft to collect data to be shared with NASA, organisers said on Monday.

The 585-kilogram (1,290-pound) Beresheet (Genesis) spacecraft is to lift off atop a Falcon 9 rocket from Cape Canaveral, Florida at around 0145 GMT on Friday.

Israel Aerospace Industries (IAI) and technology NGO SpaceIL announced the date at a press conference.

Mission control will be in Yehud, near Tel Aviv.

“We are entering history and are proud to belong to a group that has dreamed and fulfilled the vision shared by many countries in the world but that so far only three of them have accomplished,” SpaceIL president Morris Kahn said.

So far only Russia, the United States and China have sent spacecraft to the moon.

The Chinese craft made the first ever soft landing on the far side of the moon on 3 January.

NASA, which has installed equipment on Genesis to upload its signals from the moon, said last week it aims to land an unmanned vehicle there by 2024, and it is inviting private sector bids to build the US probe.

NASA plans to build a small space station, dubbed Gateway, in the moon’s orbit by 2026.

It will serve as a way-station for trips to and from the lunar surface, but will not be permanently crewed.

Genesis will make its 6.5-million kilometre (one million-mile) journey at a maximum speed of 10 kilometres per second (36,000 kilometres per hour), according to an IAI statement.

It will carry a “time capsule” loaded with digital files containing a Bible, children’s drawings, Israeli songs, memories of a Holocaust survivor and the blue-and-white Israeli flag.

The \$100-million project will measure the lunar magnetic field to help understanding of the moon’s formation.

“This is the lowest-budget

spacecraft to ever undertake such a mission. The superpowers who managed to land a spacecraft on the moon have spent hundreds of millions of dollars in government funding,” the IAI statement said.

“Beresheet is the first spacecraft to land on the moon as a result of a private initiative, rather than a government.”

The project started as a potential entry for the Google Lunar XPrize, which in 2010 offered a \$30-million reward to encourage scientists and entrepreneurs to offer relatively inexpensive lunar missions.

The contest closed without a winner in March 2018 but SpaceIL decided to keep working on the challenge.— AFP ■

## Ronaldo poses main threat to Atletico's European ambitions

MADRID — Atletico Madrid will face Juventus in the first leg of their Champions League last 16 clash on Wednesday in their Wanda Metropolitano Stadium, and Cristiano Ronaldo is no doubt a major threat.

To say the former Real Madrid striker has a good record against Atletico is putting it mildly: Ronaldo scored 22 goals in 31 appearances during his time in Spain and only Leo Messi with 25 goals has done more damage to Atletico in their career.

Only Sevilla (27) and Getafe (23) have suffered more at Ronaldo's hands than Atletico, but the Spanish side will take heart from one thing: he has actually

failed to hit the target in 17 of those 31 games, with three hat-tricks and two doubles in the 14 matches where he has scored against them.

Ronaldo travels to Madrid following his summer move from Real Madrid to Juventus and he has maintained his scoring form with the Italians, with 19 league goals in 24 appearances in Serie A.

However, he hasn't been quite as effective in Europe with just one goal in his five Champions League appearances to date and he missed one game in the group stage after being sent off for two yellow cards in September.—Xinhua ■

## We were confused': Sarri frustrated as Chelsea woes mount

LONDON (United Kingdom) — Under-fire Maurizio Sarri admitted his Chelsea flops played "confused" football as they crashed out of the FA Cup with a tame 2-0 defeat against Manchester United on Monday.

Sarri was subjected to calls for his sacking from angry Chelsea fans during the troubled team's fifth defeat in their last 10 games.

Booed off at the final whistle, the beleaguered Blues manager felt Chelsea deserved better after the FA Cup holders started the fifth round clash on top.

But he conceded they lacked direction and focus in a tepid second half surrender.

"Tonight we were unlucky because we played a very good first half and at the end of the half the score was 2-0," Sarri said.

"We gave them a few opportunities. We played confusing football in the second half.

"After the first half it wasn't easy to play with that score."

Toothless Chelsea managed only two shots on target all night and the limp second half display suggested the players are hardly doing everything in their power to save Sarri.

Sarri has publicly criticised his squad on several occasions in his first season in charge, questioning their mentality and motivation.

The former Napoli is now in danger of being axed by ruthless owner Roman Abramovich, with Thursday's Europa League tie against Malmo and Sunday's League Cup final against Manchester City looming as must-win matches if Sarri is to save his job.

"I feel the pressure for results of course, not about something else," he said when asked if he was concerned about being sacked.

"We have to work, we have


to speak, we have to find more aggression and determination in both boxes." United's commanding display was the perfect way to bounce back after last week's disappointing Champions League last 16 first leg loss to Paris Saint Germain.

Ole Gunnar Solskjaer was delighted with the way his players responded to that setback and United's interim manager was especially impressed with their work-rate. "The performance tonight was fantastic, our tactics worked. We asked our midfielders to press higher and get into the box and it worked," Solskjaer said. "Chelsea are a good team, they have their way of playing but Juan Mata did a fantastic job on Jorginho and we were absolutely perfect defensively. We kept a clean sheet. "It is a massive result. We had criticism after the PSG game and everyone did what we asked them tonight."—AFP ■

## Serena Williams back to top 10 in WTA rankings

WASHINGTON — Women's tennis great Serena Williams returned to the top 10 in the WTA tennis rankings for the first time since having her baby.

Williams ranks No 10 on the latest list released by the WTA on Monday.

The 23-time major champion won the Australian Open in January 2017 while still in the early stages of her pregnancy

before giving birth to daughter Alexis Olympia in September of that year.

Williams, 37, returned at Indian Wells in March 2018, having dropped as low as 491<sup>st</sup> in the rankings.

The American has not played since a quarterfinal loss to Karolina Pliskova at the Australian Open this season but has moved up in the rankings because some of her rivals'

failures to defend their points.

Japanese star Naomi Osaka, who won at Melbourne Park in January after defeating Williams at the 2018 US Open final, remains at No 1, while Simona Halep of Romania and American Sloane Stephens each move up one place to second and third respectively.

Petra Kvitova of the Czech Republic drops to fourth on the list.—Xinhua ■
