Over 560 Myanmar nationals return from Thailand in three days under bilateral cooperation mechanism

MYANMAR authorities have repatriated over 560 Myanmar nationals who want to return home on their own volition from Thailand in three days.

The first batch of 133 verified Myanmar nationals from Maela IDP Camp returned to Kyauk Lone Gyi, Myawady, through the Thailand-Myanmar Friendship Bridge No. 1.

A ceremony to officially accept the returnees was held at 3 pm on the same day at the presence of Myanmar Ambassador to Thailand U Myo Myint Than, Kayin State Security and Border Affairs Minister Col. Myo Min Naung and members of the verification and repatriation committee.

Eleventh regular session of Second Pyithu Hluttaw holds 16th-day meeting

A 16th day meeting of the eleventh regular session of Second Pyithu Hluttaw was held yesterday morning at Pyithu Hluttaw building in Nay Pyi Taw. At the meeting questions raised were answered and a motion discussed and decided upon.

Question and Answer session

U Win Win of Minbu constituency raised the first question on when and at what rate cash support will be provided for crops damaged by natural disaster in Minbu (Saku) Township. Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw first replied that Ministry of Planning and Finance had already agreed on using emergency fund for this matter. Of the 19,703 acres of crops damaged by natural disaster during 2018 June in Minbu (Saku) Township cash support will be K5,000 per acre for sesame, mung bean and winter peanut, K 10,000 for vegetable and corn, K 50,000 per acre for summer sesame, K 30,000 per acre for raining season peanut, K 100,000 per acre for paddy nursery and K 250,000 per acre for summer rice. Cash support will be provided in coordination with the Magway Region Government, said the Deputy Minister.

U Kyaw Aung Lwin of Sedoktara constituency questioned how silting inside Mone Dam in Sedoktara Township will be handled. Deputy Minister U Hla Kyaw replied that the dam had a storage capacity of 114,100 acre-ft and when silting was measured in 2015 February there were only 21,600 acre-ft of silt consisting of about 19 per cent of the storage capacity. This is within the design capacity for a dam that was already 12 years old when the measurements were taken. The silting is within the design limit and is not affecting the discharge and distribution of water as well as generating of hydro-electricity explained the Deputy Minister.

Replying to a question raised by Daw Ni Ni Dun of Paukkaung constituency on measures tak-

en for the top earthen portion of South Nawin Dam subsiding due to an earthquake Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw said repair works will be conducted before the raining season. At the moment Japanese technicians from Technical Institute of Rural Development Committee are conducting surveys and inspections and measures will be taken so that there is no effect to the livelihood and properties of the people said the Deputy Minister.

U Myint Ngwe of Kyaukkyi constituency raised a question on whether there is a plan to conduct embankment protection in Kyaukkyi Township, Thaungle Village tract, Doetan and Nwetan Villages before the start of 2019 raining season. Deputy Minister

for Transport and Communications, U Kyaw Myo replied that Nwetan Village is on the outer rim of the bend in the Sittoung River and due to silting in the opposite bank, about 800 metre. of river bank on the village side was found to have eroded. Total cost of the embankment protection work was estimated to be about K 530 million. As the embankment protection work for this particular place was not included in the 2018-2019 budget permitted for Bago Region Government, funding request will be made to Bago Region Government's general excess fund and work conducted accordingly said the Deputy Minister.

Similarly, questions raised by Daw Ni Ni May Myint of Taungup constituency, Daw Khin Than Nu of Mindon constituency and U Aung Sein of Dawei constituency were answered by Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw and Deputy Minister for Transport and Communications U Kyaw Myo. **Motion discussed and decided**

After the question and answer session a motion tabled by U Sein Win of Maubin constituency urging the government to retain reserve crops, paddy, rice and food in storage to resolve

and counter the effects of climate change were discussed and supported by Tatmadaw representatives Maj. San Win Naing and Maj. Min Min.

Deputy Minister for Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation U Hla Kyaw responded to the motion and discussion by explaining that the government had already kept reserve rice in store with the aims of providing emergency food supply in time of natural disaster for the people and to stabilize the rice price for the farmer.

It was conducted under the signed agreement of ASEAN member countries plus three (ASEAN+3). As the government was already conducting what the motion proposer had proposed, the Deputy Minister explained to the Hluttaw to put the motion on record only.

As the motion proposer still wanted the Hluttaw to approve the motion the matter was put up for voting and there were 150 for, 201 against and 3 abstaining. Announcement was then made for the Hluttaw to put the motion on record only.

The 17th-day meeting of eleventh regular session of the Second Pyithu Hluttaw will be held on 25 February.

Money spent by the government and development partners and investment made by private sectors will be a vote of confidence in the resilience and potential of Rakhine and its people said the State Counsellor.

At the Invest Myanmar Summit 2019 held late last month in Nay Pyi Taw, a wide range of new and exciting investment projects to be implemented in Rakhine State, from road and airport construction to the development of industrial estates and new cities, were shared with some 1,600 participants. These are included within the Project Bank and transparent and competitive tender processes for the implementation of these projects will soon begin added the State Counsellor.

While Myanmar has benefited to a large extent from the opening up of our economy, much of Rakhine's economic potential still remains untapped

Following is the full-text of the key note speech delivered by State Counsellor Daw Aung San Suu Kyi at the opening ceremony of Rakhine State Investment Fair on 22 February 2019.

It is a great pleasure to welcome you to the Rakhine State Investment Fair. This event provides us with an opportunity to bring together a vital cross-section of peoples and organisations committed to make a significant contribution to the sustainable development of Rakhine against the backdrop of the natural beauty of this region.

My deep appreciation goes to the organizers of this investment forum: the Ministry of Investment and Foreign Economic Relations, the Rakhine State Government, the Japan International Cooperation Agency (JICA), and the Japan External Trade Organization (JETRO) who have worked so hard to make this possible.

Today's Rakhine State Investment Fair may be the first of its kind but it certainly won't be the last. I anticipate that it will evolve into an annual event. I am particularly happy to see here today many participants from countries with which we have strong investment and trade ties such as China, India, Japan, the Republic of Korea and Thailand. This Fair will not only strengthen these ties, it will also create strong bonds of friendship between us, not merely in the business sector but across the whole spectrum of positive people to people relations.

Myanmar has opened up its economy to the world. We have been constantly adjusting our policies, rules and regulations to be in line with international best practices and to make the investment climate more favourable, predictable, facilitative and friendly. In short, we want to establish a welcoming economic environment for all. Among our notable reforms are a new Investment Law, a new Companies Law, expansion of the allowable activities of Foreign Banks, opening up the education sector to full foreign investment, increased Government expenditure on health and education, an online company registration system, the expansion of range of currencies allowable for the settlement of border trade and rigorous measures to fight corruption. And weaving all these into a strong, durable fabric is the Myanmar Sustainable Development Plan which, in turn, is linked to the SDGs to which the world aspires.

As a result of the bold, dynamic approach to economic reforms, we have achieved healthy growth, by which I mean not just that Myanmar's economy is estimated to grow by 6.2% in 2018/2019 but that growth has been spread across all sectors and is to a large extent due to the energy and enterprise of the private sector.

While Myanmar has benefited to a large extent from the opening up of our economy, much of Rakhine's economic potential still remains untapped. For too long the international community's attention has been focused narrowly on negative aspects related to problems in North Rakhine rather than on the larger picture that shows the immense potential of this State for peace and development.

We recognize the grave challenges we have to face and overcome. From the very beginning of its term in office, our Government identified as a national priority the imperative need for rule of law and sustainable development in Rakhine. With a view to ensuring long term peace and harmony for all who live within this State, we have been doing our utmost to meet security and humanitarian needs, in line with the recommendations of the Commission led by the late Dr. Kofi Annan. At the same time, we have to address economic issues

in Rakhine, that we may achieve the progress and development needed to sustain stability and prosperity. All of us here can play a role in the endeavour to lay strong foundations for the sustainable development of Myanmar by investing in the sustainable development of our Rakhine State.

Today we would like to focus on foreign and domestic investment which, when made with imagination and foresight and implemented with responsibility and dedication, could play a crucial role in putting Rakhine's development trajectory on track. The Rakhine State Investment Fair is thus intended to present to you a yet barely explored side of Rakhine State — brimming opportunities and warm and friendly people, all eager to be part of the development adventure. Every kyat spent by this government, every dollar disbursed by our development partners and every dollar invested by the private sector is a vote of confidence in the resilience and potential of Rakhine and its people.

At the Invest Myanmar Summit held late last month in Nay Pyi Taw, a wide range of new and exciting investment projects to be implemented in Rakhine State, from road and airport construction to the development of industrial estates and new cities, were shared with some 1,600 participants. These are included within the Project Bank and transparent and competitive tender processes for the implementation of these projects will soon begin.

Special Economic Zones managed with efficiency and probity, in line with best practices can be a dynamic source of economic growth, generating jobs and renewing hope for communities, and creating opportunities for a variety of related off-shoot industries. Such enterprises will also open the way for the active participation of home-grown Rakhine firms and SMEs in investment supply chains. They offer investors and communities a 'win-win' outcome as more jobs are created and greater good-will is generated, while related cost reduction brings in companies from further afield.

Most important of all, we must ensure that the benefits obtained from these and other projects are shared equitably amongst all communities. It is the foremost responsibility of a sovereign, democratically elected government to provide for the needs of their people in ways that nurture unity and harmony, particularly in a

Union such as ours, with its vast richness of diversity. Development for one should contribute towards development for all. And there is a role for all to play in working for responsible, visionary development grounded in goodwill, good sense, expertise, industry and creativity.

Our foreign and domestic private sector partners and young entrepreneurs bring an invigorating blend of urgency and pragmatism, a 'can do attitude', and a willingness to roll up their sleeves and get things moving. Their energy and enthusiasm, and their innovative approach that discovers what other have overlooked, are what this region has been waiting for.

A sector scintillating with potential is tourism. Pristine beaches in Gwa Township and Man Aung Island are ripe for transformation into eco-tourism destinations. On the cultural side, we are preparing to put up Mrauk-U for consideration as a UNESCO World Heritage Site. This little known religious complex of astounding beauty and exquisite architectural detail is a gem that has yet to be revealed to the world. It will provide an insight into the rich cultural and technical achievements of the ancient Rakhine Kingdom.

Other sectors that offer great potential for investors include agriculture, livestock breeding, aquaculture and forestry, manufacturing, textiles and garment manufacturing, power generation and distribution, education, health services, infrastructure and real estate. The potential for the development of the oil and gas sector is one of the shining assets of Rakhine State. We hope to see more offshore gas fields developed over the coming years, partly for use in supporting greater electrification in Rakhine, as well as to create industries that can produce value-added agriculture and fishery products for export. As you can see the list of possibilities in Rakhine is long and it could go on expanding.

I am confident that all of you understand well the necessity to ensure that investments do not aggravate a fragile environment already vulnerable to natural disasters and climate change. As an example: I mentioned earlier the potential for aquaculture in Rakhine. But we would wish to avoid the unchecked expansion of commercial fishery projects that could degrade our precious mangrove stock. And I am sure all of us would wish to preserve the natural beauty and serenity of Ngapali that you see before you today. So let us work together towards, responsible investment that will protect ecosystems that are the foundation of our material wealth and the well-being of our people.

As a late comer to the development scene, Rakhine stands poised to reap the advantages of astute late comers: learning from the success stories as well as the mistakes of those who went ahead, offering fresh openings and new horizons. I would like to invite all of you to join in this Rakhine Investment Fair which can be seen as the launching of a great economic venture. We will champion all those who invest responsibly, who respect Rakhine's pristine environment and who have at least the achievement of peace and prosperity for its people.

I look forward to a time when we can look back on this Forum not just as the dawning of a splendid new era in the history of sustainable development for Rakhine, but also as one of the landmarks of economic progress in Myanmar.

VP U Myint Swe calls for bringing balance to Myanmar's trade volume

“THE Private Sector Development Committee promptly carries out matters that can be dealt with immediately. For example, the committee announced during its 23rd regular meeting that the Ministry of Planning and Finance will submit a proposal to amend a provision in the 2019 Union Taxation Law that reads ‘milk, condensed milk, fresh milk and various kinds of milk powder’ into ‘milk and other dairy products’, after the Myanmar Livestock Federation made the request, citing that the absence of the word ‘yogurt’ means commercial tax is levied from this dairy product,” said Vice President U Myint Swe.

The Vice President made the remark during his speech at the 24th regular meeting of the Private Sector Development Committee – PSDC, of which he is the Chairperson, held at the UMFCCI (Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce & Industry) building in Lanmadaw Township, Yangon yesterday.

Current trade volume reaches 65% of previous mini-budget period within first four months

The Vice President also said they have directed the UMFCCI to relay the suggestions and submissions by businesspeople made at PSDC's last monthly meeting to other relevant businesspersons. He

said the five working committees under PSDC regularly holds public-private dialogue with relevant ministries and private businesspersons to discuss solutions to issues that require long-term planning.

The Vice President said the public and private sector regularly work together to increase the national trade volume every year. He said the trade volume for the 2018 mini-budget period (from April to September) reached US\$18.3 billion while the first four months of the 2018-2019 FY reached US\$12.02 billion on 8 February. He urged everyone to work together to increase the number of local exports and import substitutions to bring balance to the trade volume.

Illegal border trade countered, two-month window before World Bank report

The PSDC has formed special groups in nine states and regions to combat illegal border trade that negatively affects micro, small and medium enterprises – MSMEs and has made 306 arrests concerning the issue from September 2018 to 5 January 2019, said the Vice President.

On the topic of attracting foreign investment, the Vice President said the Myanmar Investment Commission – MIC sent delegations to Hong Kong, Macau, Thailand, Japan and South Korea last year to meet and welcome prospective investors into Myanmar.

The Vice President also reminded the relevant ministries

that the World Bank's 'Doing Business 2020 Report' will be collecting data until April 2019, and therefore, the ministries must use the remaining two months to swiftly implement their designated reforms on time. He urged the association representatives present at the meeting to voice their opinions and suggestions as relevant officials are present to address them.

Officials provide updates on relevant sector performances

Next, Union Minister for Transport and Communications, U Thant Sin Maung, explained processes for upgrading roads, infrastructure and airports and implementing cross border transport with neighboring countries.

Union Minister for Industry, U Khin Maung Cho, also explained on organizing MSME exhibitions and competitions, providing MSMEs with loans, conducting capacity-building trainings, setting standards and guidelines for the iron and steel industry, and efforts to manufacture electric vehicles.

Yangon Region Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein then explained his region's current implementations and UMFCCI Chairperson U Zaw Min Win explained the implementation process on the meeting's decisions, organizing private-public partnership dialogues, and increasing export volume.

Following this, General Secretary U Win Kyaing from Myanmar Fisheries Federation, Vice-Chairperson U Tin Hlaing from Myanmar Iron & Steel Association, Chairperson Dr. Soe Tun from Myanmar Automobile Manufacturers and Distributors Association, U Ko Ko Gyi from the Border Trade Development Working Committee (UMFCCI), and Joint General-Secretary Daw Khine Khine Nwe and General-Secretary U Aung Kyi Soe from UMFCCI responded to the various submissions and suggestions. The Vice President, Union Ministers and other officials provided input into the discussions as necessary, after which, the Vice President concluded the meeting with a closing speech. —MNA ■ (Translated by Zaw Htet Oo)

On 21 February, 2019, a total 201 Myanmar nationals from Ohnpyan IDP Camp returned to Myanmar and they were officially accepted at the Kyauk Lone Gyi by the Minister Counsellor from the Myanmar Embassy in Thailand and officials of the Immigration and Population Department.

Meanwhile, 59 Myanmar nationals from Mae Hong Son IDP Camp returned home accompanied by Counsel General U Thein Tin and officials of Thailand on 21 February and they were officially accepted by Kayah State Chief Minister U L Phaung Sho, Kayah State Agriculture and Irrigation Minister U Bos Ko, Kayah State Development and Social Affairs Minister Dr. Aung Kyaw htay at the BP 13 Gate at noon.

The returnees were transported to Me Se Reception Cen-

tre, and authorities arranged to send them to areas where they will settle down.

A total of 260 Myanmar nationals were repatriated from Thailand on 21 February.

On 22 February, 45 Myanmar nationals from Bandonran IDP Camp and 129 from Nopoe IDP Camp totaling 174 were repatriated and they were accepted in Myawady by Myanmar Minister Counsellor and officials of the Immigration and Population Ministry. Following the repatriation, region and state authorities concerned provided aid including cash assistance and transported them to their homes. The authorities will issue the citizenship scrutiny cards, provide accommodation, education and health care access to the returnees, according to the Ministry of Foreign Affairs. —MNA ■ (Translated by GNLM)

spoke of all becoming a Union through Panglong Agreement but instead of the country developing and progressing in the past 70 years it had lagged behind other countries due to many reasons. The main point was the lack of trust among the nationals and the incompleteness and weaknesses of the national reconciliation works and it was understood that lessons from these past experiences were to be learnt so that no more mistakes are made in the future.

SSPP was not against the NCA path but were only point out and demanding inclusiveness in the NCA. SSPP was not against the NCA and not signing the NCA does not mean against the NCA. An understanding was

requested as the reason was for all-inclusiveness, said the Vice Chairman. SSPP consider the present situation as very good because an opportunity to sit and discuss as equal were being given to SSPP, said the Vice Chairman.

At the moment trust was being built up from the bottom up and efforts were being made with a belief of establishing a federal union once a certain situation is reached and a certain time is taken.

Some criticize SSPP for conducting regional development as in a time of conflict arms and ammunitions need to be stocked rather than conducting regional development. But SSPP and SSA were in an armed conflict for 60 years and people

had suffered during this period together with SSPP and SSA and thus were giving back what it can to the people. Looking at this point alone could be obvious that SSPP/SSA no longer wanted wars and conflicts. The reason for coming now is to show what SSPP/SSA had done for regional development. A request had been made for a separate meeting with the Tatmadaw to report about military matters and spoke of his appreciation for being granted the opportunity, said the Vice Chairman.

Next, the meeting discussed status of meeting between the government and SSPP, Wanhai region development matters, future works of peace process and general matters.

In his concluding speech,

SSPP Vice Chairman thanked the government officials, Hluttaw and Tatmadaw leaders and officials for holding the meeting and spoke of his belief on successfully establishing a federal union.

In return NRPC member Union Attorney General said open discussions were held in the meeting and much benefit was being obtained from learning of the works and status of SSPP. The government had kept opened the path for all to participate in the NCA and is striving toward it. Some are believed to be participating in it soon and SSPP is urged to participate in it and matters raised by SSPP will be submitted to the NRPC meeting said the Union Attorney General.

Afterward, the Union Attorney General and SSPP Vice Chairman exchanged gifts.

The meeting was attended by NRPC members Union Attorney General U Tun Tun Oo, Lt-Gen Yar Pyae, Lt-Gen Min Naung, Deputy Minister U Khin Maung Tin, Peace Commission Vice Chairman U Thein Zaw, Secretary Lt-Gen Khin Zaw Oo (Retired), member U Hla Maung Shwe, Director-General U Zaw Htay, SSPP Vice Chairman Sao Khun Hsai and central committee members.


We urge everyone to cooperate in implementing reforms as they are necessary for establishing a democratic federal Union that will bring uniform development to every state and region of our country.

In fact, we Myanmar people participate in protecting against the threat of severe climate change. In addition to this, the Dry Zone Greening Department, under Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation, is undertaking the Special Region Nine district Project in Dry Zone of Central Myanmar. It laid down its objectives as follows;

Objectives

- The objectives of the Dry Zone Greening Department are:
- (a) To make the arid region lush, green and beautiful
 - (b) To maintain its eco-system
 - (c) To fulfill basic forest produce requirements of the rural people
 - (d) To contribute socio-economic development of the rural people
 - (e) To make the local residents aware the value and essence of forest and trees
 - (f) To enhance public knowledge on conservation and promotion of natural environment, and escalate its participation
 - (g) To maintain climatic balance in order to support cultivation and

- (h) To prevent desertification

The target areas of the project included Meikhtila, Myingyan, Yamethin, Sagaing, Monywa, Pakokku, Magway, Thayet and Minbu Districts which are in Mandalay, Magway and Sagaing Regions in Myanmar. The Dry Zone Greening Department has been implementing the project in line with its objectives to date.

Myanmar and other countries around the world make effort to mitigate the impact of climate change by replanting trees as a part of treatment to the injured Earth. The following countries are the examples in doing their best to create equilibrium of ecosystem in their countries.

Pakistan;

In 2014, A billion Trees Planting Project was adopted for the province of Khyber Pakhtunkhwa to transform the country's barren landscapes into forests known as 'Green Gold'. The project will restore 3,500 square kilometers of land and the new trees help mitigate the effect of climate change. The 900,000 fast-growing eucalyptus trees

and more than 42 tree species have been planted. The project has already exceeded its target of one billion trees. As a result, the new trees will help protect against erosion. In addition, they will strengthen riverbanks and decrease the risks of floods in that area. Furthermore, the upcoming growth of forests will increase the chances of rain and create a huge new habitat for wildlife.

China

China's "Green Great Wall" or "Three-North Shelter Forest Program" is a series of human-planted wind breaking forest strips in China which is to hold back the expansion of the Gobi desert. The project targets three of the northern regions: the North, the Northeast and the Northwest of China. The program started in 1978. It is planned to be completed around 2050. The aerial seeding method is used to cover long strips of land and the offering of cash incentives to farmers to plant trees and shrubs in areas that are more arid. China aims to raise China's forest cover from 5 to 15 percent, thereby reducing desertification. The trees will serve as windbreak from dust storms of the Gobi desert. As of 2009, China planted forest covered more than 5000,000 square kilometers - the largest artificial forest in the world.

Obviously, we have learnt that most of the countries including Myanmar are striving to mitigate the impact of climate change by means of planting trees in their countries as much as they can. They all have common aim and object i.e. to ameliorate the bad situations on earth caused by the effects of climate change. Man should wisely use natural resources or mineral resources such as trees, water, habitable land and fossilized fuel. It is an obligation to protect natural habitat as well. Therefore, we sensible human beings ought to preserve or conserve the balance ecosystem so that our world can be healthy. Unless our world is healthy, we all living things might become extinct indeed!

99 dead, 136 injured in 350 rail mishaps in 2017-2018FY

THERE were a total of 350 rail accidents recorded in the 2017-2018 Financial Year, equivalent to one accident per day on average, according to the Myanmar Railways (Transport Division) under the Ministry of Transport and Communications.

The accidents left 99 people dead and 136 injured, according to official data of the MR.

U Kyaw Kyaw Myo, the general manager of the MR (Transport Division), said the figure showed that the MR needs to take more preventive measures against train accidents.

"There are 365 days in a year. On average, one train accident is reported a day. It shows that the MR needs to make more efforts to control railway accidents," he said.

The total rail accidents in the previous FY included three crashes involving two trains, 88 collisions involving cars and trains, and 177 mishaps where trains overturned due to uncontrolled wheel slips.

At a press conference held on 22 February in Yangon, U Kyaw Kyaw Myo said the MR has nothing to do with the incidence of accidents at pedestrian bridges.

"Such accidents occur due to careless use of railroads.

Last FY, the number of such accidents reached 88. It was the highest figure in the last 20 years. It accounts for 25 per cent of the total accidents," he said.

"On average, one accident occurs every five days. An accident between a train and any vehicle can be devastating, resulting in serious injury, or even, death for the victims involved. Action will be taken against reckless persons under the existing railway laws," he added.

To reduce rail accidents, the MR is making continuous efforts to raise public awareness by conducting educational seminars at schools and com-

munity talks in regions and states, distributing pamphlets, and broadcasting public information through the Myanmar Radio and Television, according to the MR.

The MR's data indicated that the country saw 651 rail accidents in the 2011-2012FY, 605 in the 2012-2013FY, 537 in the 2013-2014FY, 474 in the 2014-2015FY, 393 in the 2015-2016FY, 363 in the 2016-2017FY.

A total of 163 rail accidents occurred between April and September 2018, according to the MR. ■

452 illegal timber logs confiscated in Katha Township

AUTHORITIES on Wednesday seized 452 logs of illegal teak hidden under the bamboo raft inside the raft in the Ayeyawady River, Katha Township.

Led by U MyintNaingOo, assistant director of Katha Township Forest Department, a combined team comprising police and officials from the township administrative office,

Singaporean fined over Skype forum with Hong Kong activist

SINGAPORE — A Singaporean activist was on Thursday fined for organizing an illegal public discussion in the tightly-controlled city-state that featured a prominent Hong Kong democracy campaigner speaking via Skype.

Jolovan Wham was convicted last month of breaking public order laws after he failed to apply for a police permit before inviting activist Joshua Wong to speak via video call to an audience.

The 39-year-old was also found guilty of refusing to sign a written statement to police. On Thursday he was handed a fine of Sg\$3,200 (\$2,300).

Wham, who is currently out on bail, said he will appeal the sentence, but if that fails he said he will choose to serve a 16-day jail term rather than pay the fine.

The activist, who is also an advocate for migrant workers' rights, had described the gathering in November 2016 as "a harmless and straightforward discussion about social movements".

Wong, who was among the leaders of massive pro-democracy protests in Hong Kong in 2014,

spoke to the audience about the role of civil disobedience and democracy in building social movements.

Organizing a public assembly without a permit in Singapore is punishable by a fine of up to Sg\$5,000. Repeat offenders can be fined up to Sg\$10,000 or jailed for a maximum of six months or both.

Wealthy Singapore is regularly criticised by rights groups for its heavy-handed response to political dissent and freedom

of expression.

In December, the editor of a Singaporean website was charged with defamation for publishing a letter alleging corruption among the country's leaders.

The same month, Prime Minister Lee Hsien Loong sued a blogger for defamation after he shared an article on Facebook linking the leader to a corruption scandal in neighbouring Malaysia. Lee said the article was false and without basis.— AFP ■

Bones from 500 people found at Tokyo skeletal model company

TOKYO — Bones from around 500 people have been found on the premises of a skeletal model company in Tokyo, police said on Friday, with the company quoted as saying they were imported from India decades ago.

"We had been keeping the bones after importing (them from India) about 20 to 30 years ago. We were considering moving them to another location," said a senior official of the company in Tokyo's Adachi Ward.

Many of the skulls and bones appeared to be from individuals who died decades earlier and police do not believe there was any foul play.

The bones were discovered when a man related to the company was found dead on the premises last fall. Police do not believe his death was suspicious.

The company was founded in March 1971 to import and produce models of human and animal skeletons.—Kyodo News ■

'Tinnie terrorists' jailed in Australia for Philippines boat plot

SYDNEY (Australia)—Four Australians with almost no seafaring experience were jailed on Friday for hatching a "foredoomed" plot to sail a boat to the southern Philippines and overthrow the local government.

The four men — and two other Australians who have yet to be sentenced — were arrested in 2016 by police after buying a seven-metre (23-foot) boat and moving it overland 2,840 kilometres (1,765 miles) from the southern city of Melbourne to the northeastern tip of Australia.

Despite having almost zero sailing experience, the "Tinnie Terrorists", as the Australian media have dubbed them, planned to reach the southern Philippines and join up with Muslim separatists. "The whole venture was poorly planned and, I fear, foredoomed to failure," Justice Michael Croucher wrote in his

judgement. "Given the ill-suited vessel they had and their lack of serious boating experience, it is hard to imagine that they would have made it very far past the breakers off far north of Queensland."

Paul James Dacre, Antonino Granata and Kadir Kaya were sentenced to four years' imprisonment in the Supreme Court of Victoria, while Murat Kaya was sentenced to three years and eight months behind bars.

The two other men, Shayden Thorne and notorious Australian Islamic preacher Musa Cerantonio, have pleaded guilty to the charges but have yet to be sentenced. In handing down his sentence in Melbourne, Justice Michael Croucher said the four men would not have been involved in the plot if not for the "charismatic and persuasive Mr Cerantonio".— AFP ■

Hokkaido quake leaves four injured, temporarily strands hundreds

SAPPORO — Four people were injured and hundreds of others left stranded in train carriages and at an airport early Friday after a magnitude 5.8 quake hit Japan's northernmost main island of Hokkaido the previous night.

While no major damage has been reported from the quake which struck at 9:22 pm on Thursday, more than 100 households suffered a temporary water outage in the hardest-hit town of Atsuma, already pounded by a major quake last September. Transportation services were disrupted elsewhere and there were reports of small-scale avalanches.

Two women and two men in Tomakomai and Sapporo sustained minor injuries after falling during the quake.

Some 680 people were temporarily stranded in train carriages on the JR Chitose Line and about 170 people were forced to spend the night at the New Chitose Airport, the region's main air gateway.

"I was anxious be-

cause I didn't know when I can return home," said Takahiro Shibuya, 17, who was waiting for his mother to pick him up at Shimamatsu Station in the city of Eniwa.

The high school student from Chitose said he was on his way home from a cram school in Sapporo when the trains stopped, leaving he and his fellow passengers stranded for about four hours.

Hokkaido Railway Co canceled 58 train services on Friday as it carried out

track safety checks.

At New Chitose Airport, people huddled under blankets distributed by airport staff.

"Bus services from the airport to Sapporo had ended, and I could not wait for taxi for hours in the sub-zero temperatures," said Manami Imano, 35, who was on a business trip from Tokyo.

In September, Hokkaido was hit by a magnitude 6.7 quake, which claimed more than 40 lives and injured about 760 people as

well as cutting power to millions of homes across the region. The town of Atsuma was hit by deadly landslides triggered by the quake. Chief Cabinet Secretary Yoshihide Suga said the government has yet to confirm any major landslides or avalanches caused by the latest quake.

"I could not stop shaking thinking about the previous quake," said Atsuma resident Eiko Nakaya, 71, as she received food and water from local authorities.—Kyodo News ■

Indonesians clean up the beach one sandal at a time

BANDAR LAMPUNG (Indonesia) — Hundreds of people sifted through a vast wasteland of rubbish strewn across a beach in Indonesia on Thursday, underscoring the Southeast Asian archipelago's mammoth marine waste problem

Some 200 students, military personnel and locals scoured a beach on the southern tip of Sumatra island, picking up rubbish as they waded through heaps of plastic, discarded flip flops and other debris.

In just over three hours, the group collected an eye-watering 30 tonnes of rubbish from the coast in Lampung province.

The yearly campaign first kicked into action in 2010 after huge amounts of rubbish were getting

trapped in the fishing nets of locals who made their living off the sea. Most of the detritus had flowed in from the provincial capital.

Other rubbish clearing campaigns have popped up across Indonesia, the world's second biggest contributor to marine debris after China.

In holiday hotspot Bali, the problem has become so bad that officials declared a "garbage emergency" two years ago after a stretch of coast was swamped with rubbish. Last year, a sperm whale was found dead in a marine park off Sulawesi island with 115 plastic cups and 25 plastic bags in its stomach. The archipelago of some 17,000 islands has pledged to reduce marine plastic waste by 70 per cent by 2025.—AFP ■

The Oscar-winning hip hop artiste took to social media to protest the 18 February cancellation of the Jon Bernthal-led vigilante series.

"Dear Netflix, Regarding

your cancellation of "The Punisher", you are blowing it!! Sincerely, Marshall," Eminem wrote in all caps on Twitter.

Netflix had already cancelled "Iron Fist", "Luke Cage", and "Daredevil" after the release of their most recent seasons. The still-upcoming third season of "Jessica Jones" will mark Marvel's last release on the streaming giant. The decision comes as Disney prepares to launch its own streaming service, Disney+ later this year.—PTI ■

Folk musician Peter Tork of Monkees fame dies at 77

NEW YORK (United States)—Peter Tork, the offbeat folk artist who found fame with 1960s pop band the Monkees, has died, his team announced on Thursday. He was 77 years old. "It is with beyond-heavy and broken hearts that we share the devastating news that our friend, mentor, teacher, and amazing soul, Peter Tork, has passed from this world," the team posted on his official Facebook page, without specifying a cause of death. The musician in 2009 had been diagnosed with adenoid cystic carcinoma, a rare form of cancer that affected his tongue.

"There are no words right now...heart broken over the loss of my Monkee brother," tweeted drummer-singer Micky Dolenz, one of the band's two surviving members. A classic teeny-bopper band, the Monkees were the original reality TV stars, whose four-piece group was first conceived as a show in 1965 that went on to win two Emmy awards and in 1967 outsell the Beatles and the Rolling Stones.

Songs like "Daydream Believer," "I'm a Believer" and "Last Train to Clarksville" all topped

the charts—but the wisecracking foursome drew criticism by some who considered them a rip-off of the Beatles, who had rushed onto the American pop culture scene a few years prior. The band released nine albums between 1966 and 1970, after which they disbanded, but they have come back together in various combinations over the years. "As I write this my tears are awash, and my heart is broken," wrote band member Michael Nesmith. "I can only pray his songs reach the heights that can lift us and that our childhood lives forever—that special sparkle that was the Monkees." Tork, the group's keyboardist and bass guitarist, crafted a persona as the Monkees' lovable "dummy"—but later began to resent the band as his musical ambitions grew. Born in Washington on 13 February, 1942, Tork took piano lessons and studied French horn. Having cut his teeth in the free-wheeling folk scene of New York's Greenwich Village, Tork was a multi-instrumentalist who became the first member to leave the Monkees, feeling restricted artistically.—AFP ■

Scientists offer new technology to absorb liquid radioactive waste

MURMANSK—Scientists at the Academy of Sciences' Kola Scientific Centre offer new nanomaterials to purify liquid radioactive waste. The Centre's representative Anatoly Vinogradov told TASS the new unique materials are similar to natural minerals.

"The most important part of work is to make synthetic titanosilicates, similar to Kola minerals from the Ivanyukit and Lintisit Group, which are used as sorbents, they are highly effective in processing of gained liquid radioactive waste," the scientist said. This work followed research at the Kola school of crystal and mineral studies, led by the Kola Scientific Centre. In 2018 only, the school's experts across the world opened 18 new rare minerals. More than half five dozen new

minerals have been discovered over recent years.

Some of the minerals have unique characteristics to be used for the industry's advance sectors.

"By using the natural analogues, our scientists have succeeded in getting analogues of natural minerals from available resources and industrial waste," he continued.

Among most interesting new materials are the sorbents, which contain radionuclides. They can "extract" radioactive substances from waste, and further storage would not harm the environment. Heating turns the sorbents into ceramic materials, which are resistant to water, acids, alkalis, high temperatures.

"It takes millenniums to de-

compose such ceramic materials, as they consist of analogues to natural minerals, which are hard to decompose,—Rutile, Purochlore, Hollandide and others," the expert continued. "Our tests have confirmed the new sorbents

are effective and promising."

The scientists now face a task of making test consignments of new sorbents. For that, they make a facility jointly with the Kola Mining and Metallurgical Plant and the Apatit plant. The

facility will go operational within 2019. "Thus, we shall begin big tests of the new materials to purify radioactive wastes, industrial waste from non-ferrous metals, and in other spheres," the expert said.—Tass ■

Israel's first Moon mission blasts off from Florida

WASHINGTON (United States)—An unmanned rocket took off from Cape Canaveral in Florida on Thursday night carrying Israel's Beresheet spacecraft, aiming to make history twice: as the first private-sector landing on the Moon, and the first from the Jewish state. The 585-kilogram (1,290-pound) Beresheet, which means "Genesis" in Hebrew, lifted off at 8:45 pm (0145 GMT Friday) atop a Falcon 9 rocket from the private US-based SpaceX company of entrepreneur Elon Musk. Take-off was followed live back in Israel, with Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu watching alongside engineers from the control center of Israel Aerospace Industries (IAI).

The Israeli craft was placed in Earth orbit, from where it will use its own engine to undertake a seven-week trip to reach the Moon and touch down on 11 April in a large plain. The rocket also contains an Indonesian satellite and a satellite of the US Air Force Research Laboratory. The mission is part of renewed global interest in the Moon, sometimes called the "eighth continent" of the Earth, and comes 50 years after American astronauts first walked on the lunar surface.

"This is history in the making—and it's live! Israel is aiming for the #moon and you're all invited

to watch," said a Twitter message from SpaceIL, the non-profit organization that designed the Israeli craft. It was backed notably by businessman and philanthropist Morris Kahn, who financed the development of a craft. "Make us proud," he said on Thursday.

Entrepreneurs, not government space agencies, financed the mission, which was initially projected at \$10 million but eventually grew to \$100 million. Other partners are IAI, Israel's space agency its Ministry of Science and Technology. So far, only Russia, the United States and China have made the 384,000-kilometre (239,000-mile) journey and landed spacecraft on the Moon.

China's Chang'e-4 made the first-ever soft landing on the far side of the Moon on 3 January, af-

ter a probe sent by Beijing made a Lunar landing elsewhere in 2013.

Americans are the only ones to have walked on the lunar surface, but have not been there since 1972.

For Israel, the landing itself is the main mission, but the spacecraft also carries a scientific instrument to measure the lunar magnetic field, which will help understanding of the Moon's formation. Technically, it is far from a trivial mission.

After its initial boost from the Falcon 9, the Beresheet's British engine will have to make several ignitions to place the spacecraft on the correct trajectory to the Moon. When it arrives, its landing gear must cushion the descent onto the lunar surface to prevent Beresheet from crashing.—AFP ■

Japan's Hayabusa2 probe believed to have landed on asteroid

TOKYO—Japan's Hayabusa2 space probe is believed to have successfully landed on an asteroid 340 million kilometers from Earth, the nation's space agency said on Friday. The Japan Aerospace Exploration Agency said it received data suggesting that the probe has landed. The feat is a sign of progress in the mission that those involved hope could provide new insights into the origin of life. The Hayabusa2, which arrived into the vicinity of the Ryugu asteroid in June after a more than three-year, 3.2-billion km journey, touched down on the rocky asteroid where it will collect samples. The approach required precise control of the probe, JAXA said.

The probe is due to return to Earth at the end of 2020 after making multiple landings on the asteroid, which is believed to contain water and raw materials for life. JAXA had postponed the operation from on October due to difficulty in finding a good landing site on the asteroid, which turned out to be rougher than expected.

The diamond-shaped Ryugu asteroid, with an estimated diameter of about 900 metres, travels around the Sun once every 16

months, passing near the orbits of Earth and Mars. The asteroid is named after an undersea dragon palace in a Japanese fairy tale, where the mythical fisherman Urashima Taro found a treasure chest. Hayabusa, meanwhile, means peregrine falcon in Japanese.

Launched in December 2014 from the Tanegashima Space Centre in southwestern Japan, the roughly 600-kilogram Hayabusa2 has had a trouble-free journey to its destination. The spacecraft can drop a 2-kg copper lump, known as an impactor, onto the surface of the asteroid to make an artificial crater and obtain unexposed materials, according to JAXA. The agency is hoping to produce an outcome surpassing that of the original Hayabusa asteroid probe, which collected the first-ever samples from an asteroid in space. The first Hayabusa was launched in 2003 and delivered the materials it collected back to Earth in 2010.

Last year, Hayabusa2 successfully released three tiny rovers, each of which is designed to roam the surface of Ryugu to conduct probes.—Kyodo News ■

The winners and runners-up in the group stage will advance to the finals. The four teams will join the top three teams from the 2017 edition — DPR Korea, Korea Republic, and Japan — along with Thailand, the host of the 2019 finals, in September.—

Man Utd seek to derail Liverpool title bid as Spurs lurk

LONDON (United Kingdom)— Liverpool travel to Manchester United on Sunday facing the toughest assignment of their Premier League run-in on paper as Tottenham seek to sneak back into the heart of the title race.

The trip to Old Trafford is effectively Jurgen Klopp's team's game in hand as they bid to open up a three-point lead over Manchester City, who play Chelsea in the League Cup final on the same day. Liverpool thumped United 3-1 at Anfield in the last match of Jose Mourinho's reign on December but they are transformed under interim boss Ole Gunnar Solskjaer and are back in the top four. If Spurs beat Burnley and Liverpool slip up, Mauricio Pochettino's men will be just two points behind City and Liverpool, with all three clubs having played 27 matches. AFP Sport picks out some of the main talking points ahead of this weekend's Premier League fixtures.

Wary Liverpool face Old Trafford litmus test

Liverpool know that a win at Old Trafford—where they have won just twice in the league since 2004—would be a huge statement of intent as they hunt their first English top-flight title

since 1990.

Klopp's men are 14 points clear of United but they will be facing a different team from the one they demolished in December, courtesy of a goal from Sadio Mane and two from Xherdan Shaqiri. "Since the new manager came in there is a new flow, they played good games and have won a lot and that is building confidence in the team," said Liverpool midfielder Georginio Wijnaldum. "It's also a home game for them so they will have a lot of confidence as they don't have the problems they had before."

Solskjaer's tough side

Solskjaer has lifted his side into the Champions League places and knows any chance he has of becoming the next permanent manager probably hinges on staying there. But defender Luke Shaw says the interim boss, known for his sunny demeanour, is capable of showing some steel. "You know, Ole does it at the right time (shows another side)," Shaw told MUTV. "He knows how good we can be and, if we're not up to his standards or the standards of Manchester United, he will certainly let you know.—AFP ■
