Three killed, 51 missing after lake collapses at Phakant jade mine

THREE people were killed and 51 people were feared dead after a lake collapsed, triggering a mudslide that buried workers and machinery from two mining companies at a jade mining block in Phakant yesterday.

About 20 minutes after midnight yesterday, a five-acre wide and 100-foot deep lake, located in a block owned by Unity Company, collapsed, pouring mud into a jade block, where more than 50 miners from two mining companies were working the night shift. The landslide created a ‘mud lake’, burying workers and mining equipment.

“We recovered two bodies in the morning and one more body in the evening. Fifty-one miners are still missing. We are also carrying out preventive measures in possible areas where the mine walls can breach,” said U Phone Garein, the Deputy Head of the Phakant Township General Administration Department.

According to the authorities, 26 workers and five backhoes from the Golden Nine Dragons Company, and 28 workers, 11 backhoes, 10 tracks, and five mining machines from the Myanmar Thura Company were buried in the mudslide.

ICC approves personal interview with foreigners for PR

Swe, ICC for PR members and officials.

Prior to the personal interview Chairman of ICC for PR Union Minister U Thein Swe met with officials conducting the personal interview and explained

about the types and granting of permanent residencies and urged all to suggest on whether to permit or not the people who were being interviewed.

Next, an official explained about the personal interview

process and ICC for PR Chairman and members conducted personal interviews.

Since the work process of allowing permanent residency was started in 29 January 2015 to date, a total of 480 out of 598 applicants for permanent residency were being granted permission for permanent residency and relevant documents and cards were issued.

In the day's interview 27 persons whose applications for permanent residency were reviewed and approved by ICC for Permanent Residency were interviewed and when approved, submissions will be made to relevant upper levels and relevant documents and cards will be issued it is learnt. — MNA

Coord meeting on establishing firm market, exporting quality rice held in Nay Pyi Taw

A coordination meeting on establishing a firm international market and to export quality rice was held at Ministry of Commerce meeting hall in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday morning.

In addressing the meeting Union Minister for Commerce Dr. Than Myint spoke of 83 companies exporting 1.2 million tons of rice worth US\$ 381 million in fiscal year 2017-2018 and 70 companies exporting 850,000 tons of rice worth \$ 288 million in fiscal year 2018-2019 by sea.

As for export from the border 155 companies exported 1.7 million tons of rice worth \$ 595 million in fiscal year 2017-2018 and 103 companies exported 1.07 million tons of rice worth \$ 359 million said the Union Minister.

Although rice was produced in Africa, consumption exceeds productions and the excess requirements were imported from countries in the Asia region. Myanmar was among the countries exporting rice to countries in Africa.

The highest exporter of rice in the world were India, Thailand, US, Pakistan, Viet Nam, Italy, China, Uruguay, Cambodia and Myanmar while the highest importer of rice in the world were China, Benin, Saudi Arabia, Iran, Bangladesh, US, United Arab Emirates, England, South Africa and Iraq.

Myanmar was a country highly dependent on agriculture production and had been facing challenges and competitions in the developing global economic system. Myanmar agriculture sector was facing numerous challenges and competitions and farmers and merchants need to strive toward seeking and establishing new and firm markets for the benefit of the country.

Rice trade sector in Myanmar was wide in scope with numerous difficulties, constraints and challenges and all of these needs to be overcome.

Rice destroyed in Cote d’Ivoire was bought under FOB system by Olam International Co., Ltd. of Singapore from three Myanmar companies to be sold to Guinea in Africa. The vessel loaded 22,000 tons of rice from Myanmar and left Yangon Port on October 2018 and reached Guinea at end December 2018. After 4,000 tons of rice was discharged, problem arises as the rice bags were said to be underweight.

Due to this problem, no country in Africa accepted the rice. The rice was rejected because rice bags supposed to weigh 50 kg only weigh 45 kg. This problem arises due to the weaknesses of the local rice purchasing and exporting company, Inspection Agency and buyers. Systematic management of the whole process is required to insure that this does not happen again. Therefore organizations, departments, rice exporting companies and inspection agencies

attending the meeting were requested to provide suggestions and advices.

As everyone was striving competitively toward gaining a market, relevant departments, associations, merchants, business persons and inspection agencies’ cooperation and participation was urged for Myanmar to export quality rice and establish a firm market, said the Union Minister.

Next, Deputy Minister for Commerce U Aung Htoo said Myanmar had increased rice export up to 3.6 million tons last year.

The highest amount was exported to China and the second highest amount was exported to Africa and there weren’t any major problems. All need to participate and find a solution in order for this problem at Cote d’Ivoire from affecting the image of Myanmar rice, to have a sustainable rice export system, have correct weigh, have quality milling of rice, having appropriate system and entities in place, said the Deputy Minister.

Afterwards, on behalf of the Republic of the Union of

Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry (UMFCCI) Myanmar Rice Federation Vice Chairman U Aung Than Oo explained about concerns and worries on Myanmar rice from local and international consumers due to the incident in Cote d’Ivoire, status of explaining to the consumers about the matter via the media, status of exporting rice by sea, status of reviewing the entire process of milling and exporting rice, systematic works conducted to ensure weigh and works conducted on affecting the image of Myanmar rice.

Meeting attendees then discussed about rice export by sea, inspection at loading onto ships, transport and storage of rice and Union Minister coordinated on the discussions and conclude the meeting after delivering a closing speech.

The meeting was attended by representatives from UMFCCI, Myanmar Rice Federation, rice exporting companies and inspection agencies, experts on rice, invited guest and officials. — MNA

Rice exports fell by 1.2 mln tons in Apr-Mar: MRF

THE volume of Myanmar’s rice and broken rice exports from 1 April, 2018 to 29 March, 2019 is estimated to have crossed 2.38 million metrics tons, worth US\$778.76 million, according to an announcement of the Myanmar Rice Federation.

The volume of exports has shown a decline of 1.2 million tons compared with the year-ago period, when 3.6 million tons of rice and broken rice, worth \$1.13 billion, were exported, according to the MRF.

In the past twelve months, Myanmar has shipped over 1.9 million metric tons of rice, worth \$648.7 million, to 52 countries. Meanwhile, it has exported over 451,000 metric tons of broken rice to 27 countries to earn \$130 million.

Unlike previously, maritime trade this year is relatively high compared to border trade when it comes to rice exports, accounting for 52.4 per cent of the total export. Exports of rice through the border checkpoints has fetched an estimated \$376.9 million, while income from maritime trade has reached \$401.7 million.

The drop in trade through the border channel has been attributed to China’s tight confiscation of some agro products, including rice, since the second week of October, 2018. The capacity of trade through the maritime channel is limited owing to shipping problems, port logistics, and financial constraints, coupled with currency fluctuations. — Htet Myat

First ever Myanmar Animal Quarantine Station opens in Kutkai, Shan State north

LIVESTOCK Breeding and Veterinary Department of Ministry of Agriculture, Livestock and Irrigation opened an Animal Quarantine Station, an essential requirement in export of animals and animal products, in Kutkai, Shan State (north) on the morning of 22 April. This was the first station of such kind to be opened in Myanmar.

At first Union Minister Dr. Aung Thu and officials unveiled the signboard of the station by pressing a button and cut a ceremonial ribbon to open it. In a speech delivered at the event Union Minister Dr. Aung Thu said the government allowed official export of livestock in 2017 to benefit the livestock breeding farmers. While permission and arrangements were made for official exports of livestock based on supply and demand on one side, there were requirements to inspect and quarantine livestock

according to international norms when livestock was traded across countries. The Union Minister explained in detail about the reasons for opening the Animal Quarantine Station.

Next officials from Bliss Myanmar International Co., Ltd. transferred documents on Animal Quarantine Station to Livestock Breeding and Veterinary Department Director General Dr. Ye Tun Win. After providing additional explanations to matters raised by the public attending the event, the Union Minister and party inspected the Animal Quarantine Station. The Animal Quarantine Station in Kutkai, Shan State (North) was constructed under the department's capital expenditure from fiscal year 2018-2019 Mini Budget. In the coming fiscal year another Animal Quarantine Station will be constructed in Kawkareik, Kayin State, it is learnt. — MNA

IED, parts for mine found near site of ARSA attack

A Tatmadaw column conducting proper security operation at the area where a police vehicle was attacked with landmines and small arms by the ARSA in Maungtaw Township on 22 April found an improvised explosive device (IED) and bullet casings near the site of the ambush.

The IED and 5.56 mm and 7.62 mm bullet casings were found on a hilltop, about 50 meters from the attack site. The security forces also found a 3-foot-long iron pipe filled with steel balls and gunpowder attached to about 50 yards of wire, along with three old car batteries.

On another hill, about 100 meters northeast of the attack site, some rice packets, empty drinking water bottles, a sweater, an iron pick, and bullet casings were found.

A case has been registered against the ARSA at the Kyeinchuang Police Station, according to a statement released by the Myanmar Police Force. — MNA

Good sales of watermelons after Thingyan, say traders

WATERMELONS and muskmelons are selling well after the Thingyan Festival, according to the Myanmar Watermelon and Muskmelon Exporters and Producers Association.

At present, there is a large supply of watermelons in Muse, Shan State. On 23 April, a truck carrying 15 tons of watermelons was fetching 25,000 to 50,000 Yuan, depending on the quality of the fruit, according to Khwar Nyo Trading Co. Ltd.

"This year, the prices of watermelons and muskmelons have remained on the higher side, even after Thingyan. The fruits fetched a good price at the time of harvest and at the end of the fruit season," said traders from Muse.

"Market exploration and maintaining market share is necessary. Growers and merchants can reap more benefits in groups, rather than individ-

ually. The related department is providing technical assistance and supplying seeds to boost production, reduce input costs, and produce high-quality fruits," Daw Tin Soe Soe Hlaing, the Assistant Director of the Trade Department of the Ministry of Commerce, had said at a workshop for promoting exports of watermelons and muskmelons. The workshop was held at the fruit depot meeting hall of the Muse trade zone on 15 December, 2018.

China accounts for 95 per cent of Myanmar's fruit exports. Watermelons top the list of fruits exported to China, followed by mangoes and muskmelons. Mangosteen, rambutan, lychee, watermelon, and muskmelon grown in Myanmar have been certified by China's food safety inspection mechanism, the General Administration of Quality

Supervision, Inspection, and Quarantine (AQSIQ), for legitimate export.

Myanmar's watermelon exports crossed 170,000 tons in the last mini-budget period (from April to September, 2018), and were estimated at over 560,000 tons in the 2015-2016 FY, and 500,000 tons in the 2014-2015 fiscal year.

Meanwhile, the country's muskmelon exports were pegged at over 40,000 tons in the last mini-budget period, over 100,000 tons in the 2015-2016 FY, and over 110,000 tons in the 2014-2015 FY, according to data from the Ministry of Commerce.

Watermelons and muskmelons are primarily grown in Mandalay and Sagaing regions and Shan State. Myanmar's watermelons and muskmelons have grabbed a large share of the Chinese market. — Ko Htet (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

High crude oil price drives up domestic fuel prices

THE spike in crude oil price in the global market has pushed up domestic fuel prices in the post-Thingyan period, according to oil dealers.

Oil prices have reached their highest level in four months tracking global cues, in spite of the Kyat gaining against the US dollar in the currency market. On 22 April, Octane 92 was priced at K860 per litre, Octane 95 at K935, diesel at K995, and premium diesel at K1,005 in the domestic market. On 1 January, the prices stood at K695 for Octane 92, K760 for Octane 95, K870 for diesel, and K875 for premium diesel, according to local dealers.

Oil prices surged last Monday after the US announced the termination of sanctions waivers for Iranian oil imports.

Yesterday, the price of Brent crude oil increased to \$74.67 per barrel in the global market.

In June last year, domestic oil prices rose on account of an increase in global crude oil price coupled with the weakening of the Kyat against the dollar. On 10 October, 2018, oil prices stood at K1,065 for Octane 92, K1,115 for Octane 95, K1,085 for diesel, and K1,105 for premium diesel.

Ninety per cent of fuel oil in Myanmar is imported, while 10 per cent is locally produced.

Myanmar imports 200,000 tons of gasoline and 400,000 tons of diesel every month, primarily through Singapore. There are 2,000 fuel stations and 50 oil importer companies in Myanmar. — GNLM

3. Out of the information sent to the Ministry of Home Affairs, so far a total of 601 cases have been opened files as of 20-4-2019. A total of 947 people, including 793 men and 154 women had been arrested with seizures of 5872.42 g of heroin, 73.67 g of ICE, 38704.74 g of opium, 329.6 g of low-quality opium, 18879.27 g of speciosa powder, 7833.19 g of speciosa, 1.5 liters of opium tincture, 230,912 stimulant tablets, 6424.22 g of marijuana, 0.1 liters of opium tincture, 513.26 g of opium blocks, 60 g of poppy seeds, 23.45 g of crushed stimulant tablet powder, 0.001 g of crushed ecstasy powder, 16 firearms, different kinds of 257 bullets and 1 grenade. Efforts for fighting the drug trafficking has been stepped up and the ministry will report on further exposed cases.
4. In addition to the investigations and arrests conducted on drug related complaints mentioned above, the Tatmadaw and Myanmar Police Force have also carried out separate investigations on drug complaints, search and arrests at border gates, and searches of vehicles acting upon given information.

21 killed in road mishaps in Kyaukse District in 3 months

ROAD accidents claimed the lives of 17 men and 4 women in Kyaukse District of Mandalay Region between 1 January and 31 March, according to the Kyaukse Traffic Police Force.

In January, 13 people, including 10 men and 3 women, were killed, while 33 people - 23 men and 10 women - were injured in 26 accidents. Action was initiated against 36 men and three women, according to the police.

Twenty accidents were recorded in February, in which, 7 people, 6 men and 1 woman, died, while 19

people - 17 men and 2 women - were injured. Action was initiated against 24 men and three women, said police.

A total of 13 accidents were reported in March, which left one man dead, and 16 men and three women injured. Action was taken against 16 women in the cases, said police.

Most fatalities were the result of motorcyclists and pillion riders not wearing helmets, said police who are now conducting helmet checks in the district. — Ko Min (Indaw)

Drinking water frequently can prevent heatstroke

WITH record high temperatures seen in some areas over the last few days, the Ministry of Health has issued an advisory for people, urging them to drink water frequently and take measures against heatstroke.

At the same time, the Fisheries Department has released an 'extreme heat' warning for fish farmers, urging them to be on the alert to prevent any losses arising from the soaring temperatures.

The high temperature, which has persisted for weeks, poses a risk to aged people and children in the country.

We are in the middle of the hottest period of the year. Heat waves are common in Myanmar during the months of March, April, and May, in the daytime as well as at night.

With mercury levels rising to a record 41.5 degrees centigrade, the highest in 12 years, on 22 April in Patheingyi, there is a need to take precautions against heat waves.

Extreme heat can lead to heatstroke and exhaustion, which can result in increased mortality rates. It can also exacerbate existing health conditions. Heat stress occurs when the body absorbs more heat than is tolerable.

In southern Asia, mortality is likely to rise with the temperature. Researchers have established a direct link between global warming and deaths from killer heat waves.

A slight increase of 0.5°C in mean summer temperatures in India, or another comparable tropical developing nation, could result in a 146-per cent rise in the death toll.

Heat in the summer months can be fatal. In 2016, the world experienced its hottest year since the 1880s, when modern records began to be kept. 2016 also marked the third consecutive year of record-high temperatures. Less than four months into 2017, parts of Myanmar, India, and Australia were already in the throes of heat waves.

It is estimated that between 15,000 and 19,000 people died during the 2003 heat wave in France, while according to the United States' Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), around 600 Americans have died every year from exposure to extreme heat between 1999 and 2010.

Therefore, it is important that people pay attention to the daily weather forecasts released by the Meteorology and Hydrology Department. They must also be alerted about adverse weather conditions.

MINISTRY of Religious Affairs and Culture has stepped up efforts for reforms in the third one-year term by laying down eight policies, 13 objectives and 32 tasks.

Measures taken for Religious Affairs

In Myanmar, the population of Buddhists 45,185,449, the population of Christians 3172479, Hindu 252763, Muslims 1147495, spirit worshippers 408045, others 82825 and 30,844 follow no religions.

According to the census on Buddhist monks in 2018, there are 291,806 monks, 234,567 novices and 67,521 nuns are staying in monasteries and nunneries for annual rain retreat in 2018.

State-level ceremonies for donating Kathina robes and Waso robes are held at the Uppatasanti Pagoda in Nay Pyi Taw in July and November every year.

Besides, religious titles are conferred on outstanding Buddhist monks, nuns and lay persons at home and abroad on 4th January on the Independence Day every year.

For 2019, the titles were conferred on 254 monks, 14 nuns and 93 lay persons on 20 March 2019.

The Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture is building a pagoda namely the Eternal Peace Pagoda in Dakkhina Thiri Township in Nay Pyi Taw and religious objects will be fixed atop the pagoda this year to complete the pagoda. The Eternal Peace Pagoda will be built on the 1.3 acres of land and it will be 54 ft high when completed.

Meanwhile, the Myanmar delegation led by State Sangha Maha Nayaka Committee Chairman Sayadaw Dr. Bhaddanta Kumara Bhivamsa and Union Minister for Religious Affairs and Culture Thura U Aung Ko attended the New Year's Eve Recitation and Vipassana Meditation Ceremony held in Bangkok from 28th December, 2018 to 2nd January 2019.

Buddhists from twelve coun-

tries attended a New Year prayer ceremony held at Sanam Luang in Bangkok, Thailand, from 2 December, 2018, to 2nd January, 2019.

During the visit, the Myanmar religious delegation presented the replicas of the relics, tooth relics and three strings of hairs of the Buddha to the Wat Sa Kat Monastery.

Renovation of gold plates on the Shwedagon Pagoda

The ministry launched the project to renew the gold plates on the Shwedagon Pagoda and opened the machinery for making gold plates at the pagoda on 13 December, 2018.

The pagoda will be covered in scaffolding during the six-month project and about 3,000 gold plates will be screwed on it.

For 2018-2019 Shwedagon Pagoda gold plate renovation works, a central committee, work committee and ten sub-committees were formed and assigned different duties and responsibilities. The gold surface of the pagoda is refurbished every four years to counteract weather damage.

Besides, the ministry arranged to construct new shelters and rest rooms for pilgrims and establish a modern garbage cleaning system and upgrade the roads.

Efforts for Unity of all faiths

As part of efforts for unity of all interfaith in Myanmar, the Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture formed the Interfaith Friendship and Unity Group (Myanmar) with representatives from different religions in Myanmar. There are 130 township-level committees under the group. The interfaith group carried out 32 activities for unity and friendship of the interfaith in Myanmar in three years.

Besides, the ministry is working together with religious organizations. At the invitation of the Cardinal Charles Maung Bo, the delegation of the Religions for Peace led by Bishop Gunnar visited Myanmar from 22 to 28 May last year.

During the visit, the delegation accompanied by the officials of the ministry and Cardinal Charles Maung Bo, went to Sitway (Maungtau) from 26 to 28 May, 2018.

Union Minister Thura U Aung Ko and officials of the ministry visited the Rakhine from 29 to 30 September last year and handed over K1.33 billion equivalent to US\$100,000 donated by His Holiness Pope Francis through Cardinal Charles Maung Bo.

The Religions for Peace also conducted activities for peaceful coexistence and friendship of interfaith people in Meikhtila, Patheingyi, Mawlamyint and Myitkyi in June, July and August, 2018.

The forum of all interfaith was held in Yangon in the third year term of the incumbent government.

UN Human Rights Council's UPR Review

The ministry formed the national level committee to review the human rights situation in Myanmar under the Universal Periodic Review of the UN Human Rights Council.

At the first meeting the committee, the Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture was tasked

to implement the friendship of all interfaith and freedom of expression, which is suggestion No. 10 of the 166 suggestions of the UN Human Rights Council.

Missionary activities

Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture conducted the 11th robes offering ceremony in Buddha Gaya in India, donating robes and cash to 888 Members of the Sangha from Myanmar on 18 November 2018.

Besides, the ministry sent two Buddhist monks and one official of the ministry to supervise the Golden Monastery in Lumbini in Nepal. The ministry sent workers to Nepal to paint the Lawka Mani Sula Pagoda at the Golden Monastery in Lumbini.

Honorary degrees were conferred on Members of the Sangha at home and abroad at 24th Taxila Graduation Ceremony in Mandalay by the ministry.

At the same time, diploma and bachelor degree on Buddha Dhamma were conferred on 78 students, Master degree on Buddha Dhamma on 12 students and Ph.D degree on Buddha Dhamma on nine students by the Master International Theravada Buddhist Missionary University last year.

Stone Inscription was entered in the register of MOWCAP.

The cultural heritage of MraukU would be submitted to the UNESCO in 2020 to be entered in the world heritage list.

Archaeological excavation

Archaeological Research and National Museum Department of the Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture has carried out excavation to survey historic records as Myanmar went through the Stone Age, the Bronze Age, the Iron Age and the Pyu Age.

Scholars and researchers could have shed light on ancient Myanmar historical legends and tales.

Antiques Collection

The ministry has been collecting antiques offering cash prizes to the people.

About 3,615 kinds of antiques have been collected from 96 people at the cost of over K233 million. So far, 1471 kinds of antique have been collected by the ministry and displayed the tangible and intangible cultural heritage at the museums.

Relaxation of rules and regulations on cultural heritage zone


The Pyidaungsu Hluttaw passed the Protection and Preservation of Cultural Heritage Regions Law on 28 February. The Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture wrote the new law as the previous law passed in 1998 no longer suited the current requirements.

The new law guarantees conservation and preservation of Myanmar's tangible and intangible cultural heritage.

Besides, the law would help ensure the local people living the zones to participate in preservation of cultural heritage of the country.

History, Research and National Library Department has collected the findings from the research and survey across the country and published books and papers on history.

Meanwhile, post-graduate diploma courses in library man-



THE Yangon Regional Government is putting up their best efforts to improve the nation's economy through Yangon's development. Global New Light of Myanmar met with the Regional Chief Minister U Phyo Min Thein to discuss the regional accomplishments in the 3rd year of the current administration.

Q: What are challenges facing the Yangon Regional Government ?

A: There are challenges to every new administration. We are facing quite a lot of floods here in Yangon from the

overflow of trenches and ditches. This was our first priority and we have managed to clear out quite a few of the waterway blockage. Another problem is trash in alleyways. We are aiming for trash-free public places. Right now, we are clearing up the mountains of trash that has accumulated over the past decade. The problem can't be solved just by clearing the existing trash – we have to change our attitudes towards throwing away trash irresponsibly in non-designated areas.

Q: What about improvements in public transportation?

A: Because Yangon is densely populated city, ease of transportation is important. We are trying to plan our city for better traffic flow since when the cities were first built (and planned yet again) by the previous governments, they didn't have Smart Cities in mind. This creates problems especially traffic jams since the infrastructures (roads, bridges) couldn't handle the extra load. Hopefully,

by urban planning, we can overcome this.

Water Buses are also an option. However, it can only be operated on the Yangon River. Safety is currently our main concern as there are a lot of old bridges on some potential routes of the Water Buses. This is why we are not able to operate on the Nga Moe Yeik side just yet. Regarding rail transportation, quite a number of railway stations were upgraded as well as connected to several roads.

Q: Can you explain to us about water management for Yangon Area?

A: Access to clean and safe water is important for our residents. The main concern is distribution which Yangon City Development Committee in charge of. We are currently using groundwater to supply the city as well as the water pumped from the streams and rivers. The reliant on groundwater is risky as if we are not careful, seawater can get into the ground water sources or we simply run out of ground water. So the

administration is trying to keep up with the changes on that.

Q: What about the rule of law and general improvement within the cities?

A: For rule of law, it is not the job of the Myanmar Police Force alone. With

a little help from technology, improvements are being made so not all the responsibility falls on the police. For example, there are traffic control centers which allows the police to monitor CCTVs from their common center. There are efforts to upgrade Yangon to become a Smart City. For example, in Dagon Lay Township, we are trying to lay out new concrete roads as much as the budget allows. There are also plans to build more roads and bridges if our new budget gets approved. The main objectives of these initiatives are to preserve our history in older buildings, keeping Yangon green while trying to elevate Yangon as an economic hub. For instance, the secretariat is currently under renovation. With the help of the Yangon City Heritage Trust, there has been around 28 buildings that got preserved and are branded a historical building that can't be demolished or modified without approval.

tire industrial zones. There are 29 industrial zones and special economic zones in Myanmar. Quite a handful is foreign investments that employs up to thousands of employees and help build their capacities. Plans to create more vocational training schools are in order. This will build the skillsets of the worker and hopefully, allow them to get them better jobs which will give them a better salary and benefits. People want food on the

table. Shelter is also another necessity. According to a report by Asian Development Bank, there will need to be 100,000 apartments that need to be built annually to keep up with the growing population. If we can't keep up, we will be facing a problem with squatters that will undermine the rule of law. The national government is giving support to the regional government as well as well the relevant ministries such as the Ministry

of Construction.

Q: Any other comments?

A: Our main aim is to go forwards. It is not guaranteed that we will reach our goals within the 3-year's mark. However, it is important to get forward compared to the previous year. We will continue to strive for providing the best we can for the development and a comfortable quality of life for our people.

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Myanmar soon to open centres for treating dog bites

WITH the number of dog-bite cases registering an increase in Yangon Region, the Ministry of Health and Sports will soon open centres for treating dog bites. The centres will be opened in Yangon initially, and thereafter, in Mandalay and other states and regions.

A meeting to discuss measures for opening dog bite treatment centres was conducted on Monday at Office No. 4 of the Ministry of Health and Sports in Nay Pyi Taw. The meeting was attended by Union Minister for Health and Sports Dr. Myint Htwe.

At the meeting, Dr. Tun Tin, the director of the central epidemiology unit, said that the number of dog-bite cases has increased slightly in Myanmar. According to official statistics, the number of people bitten by dogs crossed 190,000 in 2018.

The Ministry of Health and Sports is purchasing anti-rabies vaccines and rabies immunoglobulin annually. It spent K5.4 billion on the vaccines in 2018-2019FY.

The number of people dying of rabies has declined significantly thanks to the provision of the anti-rabies vaccines, said Dr. Tun Tin.

The government is looking at opening dog bite treatment

centres so the vaccines can be administered in an efficient manner, he added. The first meeting for opening the centres was held in February. In March, officials visited similar centres in Sri Lanka and inspected hospitals in Myanmar.

Myanmar will employ the intradermal method recommended by the World Health Organization (WHO) to administer the vaccines, instead of the intramuscular vaccination method. The Ministry of Health has decided to seek advice from the WHO on the matter.

"In order to open the dog bite treatment centres, we are preparing suitable places, staff,

medicines, and medical apparatuses, and refrigerators to store vaccines," said Dr. Tun Tin. There are plans to conduct training for staff and form specialized teams for rabies control, he said.

The Union Minister has said the government will open the dog bite treatment centres in Yangon initially. Later, such centres will be opened in Mandalay as well as in other states and regions. After the centres are ready, the government will announce their opening via television, radio, and newspapers so patients can reach out to the centres.

The anti-rabies prevention guide book, which was distributed by the Ministry of Health and

Sports, will be revised in accordance with the 2018 WHO technical report series and the WHO expert consultation on rabies, the Union Minister said. The Union Minister will also provide assistance for opening the treatment centres as soon as possible. Monday's meeting was attended by the Ministry of Health and Sports Permanent Secretary Prof. Dr. Thet Khaing Win, Permanent Secretary Dr. Thar Tun Kyaw, Public Health and Medical Services Department Director-General Dr. Soe Oo, the Deputy Permanent Secretary, Deputy Directors-General, Directors, Deputy Directors, and other officials.—GNLM

The Ministry of Religious Affairs and Culture has conducted preservation, protection and maintenance of cultural heritages to protect the country's ancient artifacts and buildings.

Scientific research and mappings were conducted to protect ancient artifacts and buildings from natural disasters. Laws were enacted to protect and preserve ancient artifacts and buildings and a new law on protection and preservation of cultural heritage regions was drawn up and enacted on 28 February 2019. The law was drawn up not only to protect and preserve cultural heritage regions but also to create livelihood opportunities for people in the region.

The country had thousands of tangible cultural heritages as well as many Intangible Cultural Heritages (ICHs). The ministry has made efforts for exposing and preserving ICHs by providing technical support to groups formed in regions and states to

systematically collect all ICHs in the respective state and region.

Results of the Reforms

Sometimes, there was a collision of conservation of cultural heritage and regional development tasks. However, the ministry could carry out reforms without damaging the cultural heritage while following the directives of the Head of the State.

The Ministry is turning the country's cultural heritage to attractions for foreign cultural experts, scholars and tourists as the sources for smokeless businesses. The ministry is conducting works on research and maintenance of Myanmar cultural heritages according to guidelines set by the National Cultural Central Committee; to prevent national cultural heritages from being tarnished through unruly acts and urged continued cooperation to implement suggestions made at the meeting and fulfill requirements.

Abe, Macron to seek closer coordination in addressing global issues

PARIS — Japanese Prime Minister Shinzo Abe on Tuesday asked French President Emmanuel Macron for closer bilateral coordination in addressing trade and other global issues before Japan hosts a Group of 20 summit in June.

During a joint press appearance ahead of their talks, Abe also offered Japan's "unwavering support" for reconstructing Notre Dame Cathedral in Paris after last week's fire partially destroyed the World Heritage structure.

The summit comes as Japanese investigators have detained Carlos Ghosn, a former boss of France's Renault SA and its Japanese partner Nissan Motor Co., following his arrest for alleged financial misconduct at Nissan.

The two leaders did not men-

tion the situation surrounding Ghosn or the future of the alliance between the carmakers at the press appearance.

Abe chose France, which holds this year's presidency of the Group of Seven industrialized nations, as the first stop of his six-nation European and North American trip.

He hopes to rally support for a successful G-20 summit in Osaka of the world's advanced and emerging nations as Japan aims to demonstrate joint efforts toward fostering economic growth, tackling marine plastic debris and drawing up rules for the use of big data.

"I hope that the G-20 will send out a strong message that we will be united" to promote free trade and tackle global issues such as climate change.

Macron said he will visit Japan to attend the G-20 summit, his first trip to the country after taking office.

The Japanese and French

leaders were expected to discuss cooperation in coping with regional issues such as North Korea's denuclearization.

Modi casts vote on India's 'Super Tuesday'

NEW DELHI — Prime Minister Narendra Modi cast his vote on India's "Super Tuesday" when the biggest number of seats are decided in the country's marathon election.

The nationalist leader compared voting to Hindus cleansing their sins by bathing in the Ganges river after he cast his ballot in his home state of Gujarat.

The 117 seats over 15 states being fought for on Tuesday are the biggest number of any of the seven stages of voting over six weeks.

While Modi's right wing Bharatiya Janata Party (BJP) is considered the frontrunner in the vote, it faces a tough challenge from the opposition Congress party of Rahul Gandhi.

Modi met his 98-year-old mother and then waved to supporters from an open top car that took him to vote in Ahmedabad, Gujarat's main city.

The prime minister, who ruled the western state for over a decade before leading his party to national power in 2014, has stressed at rallies the need for the 900 million electorate to turn out.

"By voting, I feel the same sense of purity that one gets by taking bath at the Kumbh festival," he said, referring to the mass bathing by Hindus in the Ganges.

Modi has made national security and fighting terrorism his main campaign theme to blunt opposition attacks on his handling of the economy.

Many see the election as a referendum on his five-year rule — which has seen impressive economic growth but not the jobs that the BJP promised.

Gujarat sends 26 lawmakers to the Indian parliament and the right-wing BJP won all of those seats in 2014.

Modi voted in the constituency where his close associate Amit Shah, the BJP president and key powerbroker, is contesting his maiden election.

Gandhi is standing in Wayanad in Kerala state, taking a risk as south India is considered a stronghold of regional parties.

The opposition party leader says contesting Wayanad is a sign of his commitment to southern India. His opponents say it shows he fears defeat in his traditional seat in the northern state of Uttar Pradesh.—AFP ■

WWII Australian freighter sunk by Japanese submarine discovered

SYDNEY — An Australian freighter sunk by a Japanese submarine during World War II was located by Australian re-

searchers after being lost for 77 years, the Commonwealth Scientific and Industrial Research Organization said Tuesday. The

100-meter-long SS Iron Crown sank in less than a minute when it was torpedoed by a Japanese submarine on June 4, 1942, off the southeastern coast of Australia, the research group said in a statement.

Of the 43 crew members on board, 38 lost their lives.

Emily Jateff, chief scientist on board the research vessel "Investigator," which was used to locate the shipwreck, said in a statement that the team is honored to have discovered the wartime relic.

"The fact that so many lives were lost in the sinking of Iron Crown was something that hit home with all scientists, staff and ship crew working on board Investigator," the Australian National Maritime Museum scientist said.

Using sonar equipment and a special drop camera, Jateff's team has concluded that the SS Iron Crown sits "relatively intact" and upright on the seafloor, roughly 100 kilometers off the coast of Victoria.

"We have mapped the site and surrounding seafloor using sonar but have also taken a lot of close up vision of the ship structure using a drop camera," she said, explaining that the data will be used to create a composite image of the site to assist in further research and conservation efforts.

Footage taken by the research team show many features of the ship remain intact including the bow of the ship, with railings, anchor chains and both anchors still in position.—Kyodo News ■

Second quake strikes as Philippines hunts for survivors

MANILA — Philippine rescuers raced Tuesday to reach some two dozen people still feared buried under a building near Manila that collapsed a day earlier in a deadly earthquake, as a powerful second tremor hit the nation.

The US Geological Survey put the second quake — on the central island of Samar — at 6.4 magnitude, stronger than the one that wrought significant damage

Monday near the capital in the north. The latest quake sent terrified locals fleeing into the streets, with images on social media showing cracked roads, crumbling church walls and shattered glass.

"No one started crying, but of course some panicked because it was really strong," said Rey Estrobo, a supervisor at a hotel in Borongan town, near the epi-

centre.

At the same time, the toll in Monday's quake rose to 16, with most of the fatalities in the worst-hit northern province of Pampanga, national disaster officials said.

More than 100 others were injured by falling rubble on Monday, including in Manila, according to police.

However, initial reports indicated relatively minor destruc-

tion in Samar given the strength of Tuesday's quake, which could be down to differences in ground composition.

"The damage is more pronounced if the houses and buildings are built on a foundation of soft soil," seismologist Myla Advincula told AFP, referring to Pampanga's soft sediment. "It enhances the shaking effect."—AFP ■

ASEAN wants RCEP negotiations concluded by Nov., signed next year

PHUKET — The Association of Southeast Asian Nations no longer expects an Asia-wide free trade deal involving 16 countries to be signed by November, but it still hopes negotiations can be concluded by then, ASEAN officials said Tuesday.

The targets for the Regional Comprehensive Economic Partnership, being negotiated among the 10-member ASEAN, Australia, China, India, Japan, South Korea and New Zealand, were discussed in two days of talks

among ASEAN economic ministers on the Thai resort island of Phuket, which ended earlier in the day.

Thai Deputy Commerce Minister Chutima Bunyapraphasara told reporters after the talks that the ministers of Brunei, Cambodia, Indonesia, Laos, Malaysia, Myanmar, the Philippines, Singapore, Thailand and Vietnam agreed to finalize the protracted RCEP negotiations by the time ASEAN leaders hold their annual summit in November.

But she said the signing of the agreement would likely have to wait until next year due to the political changes in some countries. Indonesia and Thailand recently held elections, India is currently holding one, and voters in Australia and the Philippines are due to go to the polls in May.

When the 16 RCEP nations' leaders met last November, they resolved to reach a final agreement within 2019, after missing a year-end deadline amid disagreements over tariffs

and other politically sensitive issues. The RCEP talks began in 2013 and the initial goal was to wrap them up in 2015. Covering a third of the global economy, it will be one of the world's largest free trade zones.

ASEAN Secretary General Lim Jock Hoi told a press conference that RCEP will help boost economic growth of the region and support the plan of ASEAN to double intra-ASEAN trade in 2025 from 2017's figure of about \$590 billion.—Kyodo News

China-Europe freight train cargo value surges by 106 per cent

BEIJING — The total cargo value of China-Europe freight trains rose 106 percent year on year to hit 33 billion US dollars in 2018, an official said Monday.

China-Europe freight trains have made 14,691 trips since March 2011 when they started, said Xiao Weiming with the Office of the Leading Group for Promoting the Belt and Road Initiative.

The cross-border rail network has connected

62 Chinese cities with 51 European cities in 15 countries.

China-Europe freight trains have developed since they branded under the "China Railway Express" banner in 2016.

The China-Europe rail service is considered a significant part of the Belt and Road Initiative, and is expected to boost trade between China and Europe, China's largest trading partner.

Indonesia looks to higher GDP growth next year as consumption ticks up

JAKARTA — The Indonesian government has set a stagnant or higher economic growth target next year as consumption and investment are looked to stay afloat.

The government assumed the economic growth will hover 5.3-5.6 per cent next year, Indonesian

Finance Minister Sri Mulyani Indrawati disclosed on Tuesday.

"President expects we can achieve 5.6 per cent," Minister Mulyani said, referring to Indonesian President Joko Widodo. That compares with 5.3 per cent growth's expectation for this year. Consumption

accounted for over a half of the growth is projected to drift higher 5.2 per cent next year from this year's expectation of 5 per cent, said Mulyani.

On investment, Mulyani said, it is projected to accelerate at 5.6 per cent in 2020, nevertheless the president wants invest-

The May delivery of West Texas Intermediate crude finished at \$65.70, up \$1.70 from Thursday, the highest level since 30 October last year. The New York crude oil market was closed Friday for the Good Friday holiday. The United

States announced the end of sanctions waivers for importers of Iranian oil on 2 May as part of its strategy to pressure Tehran to end its nuclear programs and what it has been describing as Iran's "malign behavior."—AFP ■

Sterling calls for nine-point racism penalty

LONDON — Raheem Sterling has called for clubs whose fans racially abuse players to be hit with a nine-point penalty, saying current punishments meant the issue was “nowhere near being sorted” by football authorities.

The Manchester City forward has become increasingly outspoken on racism in football, having received abuse on the

pitch while playing for both his club and on England duty.

Recently, he cupped his hands to his ears in response to derogatory chants from Montenegro fans while playing for England last month.

Now Sterling has become one of the signatories to a manifesto published in Tuesday's edition of Britain's The Times

newspaper calling for more black, Asian and minority ethnic (BAME) people in positions of power within football, more severe punishments for racist abuse and greater action by social media organisations, sponsors and traditional media.

“When I was a boy growing up in London, going to school and playing football, I didn't know what racist abuse was because I never suffered any,” Sterling wrote in The Times.

“So it seems crazy that, in 2019, I feel the need to write a piece in a newspaper calling for radical changes to the game that I love.

“But I do because the racism problem in football is so bad, runs so deep and is nowhere near being sorted.”

He added: “You will all have read about the various high-profile racist incidents in recent months: the abuse I received playing for Manchester City away to Chelsea; the booing that the black England players were subjected to in Montenegro; the nastiness that Moise Kean of Juventus endured in Italy and the endless insults thrown at players on social media.

“But that is sadly just the tip of the iceberg. Up and down the game, across the world, black and

Asian players, fans and coaches are subjected to racism. Every day, from park football to the Champions League.

“In my opinion, the people who run the game are doing nowhere near enough to solve the problem. And that's not good enough.”

'Fines do no damage'

Sterling said punishment for racist abuse should start with an automatic nine-point deduction for clubs and three games behind closed doors rather than the current system of fines, which he said were an insufficient deterrent. “It sounds harsh, but which fan will risk racist behaviour if it might relegate their team or ruin their title bid?”

“Small fines do no damage to clubs and countries, but one group of people who do have the money to make them take notice are sponsors. The next time that a club or governing body fails to act appropriately against racism, I would love to see that company pull its money out and make a moral stand.

“I don't know how long it will take for things to change but we have to start now. I don't want the next generation of black players to have to put up with this evil.” — Xinhua ■

Wednesday could be decisive in Spain's La Liga

MADRID — Wednesday promises to be another key day in this season's La Liga, and this season's title could possibly be decided by this evening.

If league leaders Barcelona win away to Alaves on Tuesday night, a victory for Valencia away to second-placed Atletico Madrid would see Barca crowned as this season's champions.

Fifth-placed Valencia will be without top striker Rodrigo Moreno, who was sent off towards the end of last weekend's 2-1 win away to Real Betis, while Atletico are still without Diego Costa, who is suspended until the end of the season following his recent sending off against Barca.

Antoine Griezmann returns after suspension for the home team, who will have to be wary of Valencia's excellent run of form which has seen them lose just one of their last 22 games in all competitions. A win for the visitors would take them up to fourth and into a position which would assure them of a spot in next season's Champions League, ahead of Getafe who are to entertain Real Madrid on Thursday night.— Xinhua ■
