Myanmar continues to receive verified Myanmar nationals from Thailand

AS the second day of repatriation of the fourth batch of Myanmar nationals from Thailand on 2 July 2019, 32 verified Myanmar nationals from Ban Nai Soi were welcomed by the Chief Minister of Kayah State Government at the Maese Gate in Kayah State. Moreover, two Myanmar nationals from Tham Hin camp were welcomed by the repatriation committee Members from the Taninthayi Regional Government at Hteekhee Gate in Taninthayi Region. Deputy Chief of Mission of the Embassy of Myanmar in

Thailand, Daw Ei Ei Tin and Consul-General of the Myanmar Consulate in Chiang Mai, U Thein Tin also attended the hand-over ceremonies.

The relevant Ministries and the Repatriation Committees of State and Regional Governments arranged transportation for the returnees to reach their homes and provided with the humanitarian and financial assistance. They will also provide Household Registration Form (Form-10) and issue NRC cards through the national verification process.

In addition, relevant State and Regional Governments will provide education and health-related assistance to the returnees. The repatriation process will continue with verified Myanmar nationals from Mae La, Umpiem and Mae-La Oon camps at Kyauk Lone Gyi camp in Myawady Township on 3 July 2019.—MNA

Serving as public servants were different in rich countries and countries that were not rich and were still developing like Myanmar. Although there was this difference, Myanmar public servants were level or at par with even the public servants of the richest and most developed countries in performing their duties. The main point was to dutifully perform the assigned duties. The best inheritance that Myanmar public servants could pass on to their children was this spirit of dutifully performing the assigned duties.

Public servants should be proud of the fact that they were serving the public and the country while their children should also be proud of the fact that their parents were serving the public and the country. Some thought that the income of public servants was not as high as business owners and thus was not very honorable.

profession, there should be both men and women. In some cases men outnumber women while in some it was the other way around. Individually there were strengths and weaknesses. It would be complete only when there was cooperation.

Students who had passed an important milestone in life must now choose whether to continue their education or go into life and earn a living. However and where ever it was, they should not do things for self only. It was also not practical to do things for all always. All must think for self as well as for all in a balanced way. Do note that the world was changing. Youths had fortitude and pride. In their mind they have a thought that their time was better than the past times and that they were better than the people of the past, more knowledgeable and learned. In the age of technology this was the thinking process. But this was not entirely true. Every age or time had its strengths.

As youths come of age, they were no longer young. As they were stepping into the grown up life, they should start thinking like grownups. But they also need to maintain their enthusiasm and innovation of youth. If they retain these two, they would become a matured person with balanced mind of a youth and a grownup. Becoming such a person could be designated as passing another milestone successfully.

In conclusion she would like to say that she was not only honoring the youths who had passed the examinations, who were no longer students but also the parents. She also wished to thank all the departmental personnel who helped organize the event with the spirit of comradeship, said the State Counsellor.

At the event, U Soe Yal said that Union Election Commission will hold the 2020 general elections that meet five standards: state of being independent, fairness, transparency, acceptance by majority of voters and consistency with the desire of the public. They are working in accordance with 2019-2020 strategy. He added that the purpose of the meeting is to discuss holding the elections successfully.

In preparation for the 2020 general elections, they are implementing the population data collection drawn up by Union

Election Commission, Ministry of Union Government Office and Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population for the eligible citizens not to lose their right to vote. Population data is collected by General Administration Department and monitored by Ministry of Labour, Immigration and Population. Public collaboration is important for eligible citizen not to lose their right to vote and to produce comprehensive list of voters. He also called for help of political parties and social organizations in educating public on election. Then, U Than Soe explained 2019- 2020 strategy project and State Election Officer U Kyaw San Win detailed work to produce comprehensive list of voters. General round of discussion followed. —MNA ■

Yangon air pollution still above limit: YCDC

SOME townships in Yangon Region are still recording a higher pollution rate than the set limit, said U Saw Win Maung, the deputy head of the Pollution Control and Cleansing Department of the Yangon City Development Committee.

"Air pollution is evaluated in line with the guidelines issued by the World Health Organization. The air pollution rate is monitored every 8, 12, and 24 hours. The rate is also measured every 30 days. We have found that the average rate in certain townships is higher than the set limit," he said during a press conference on YCDC's performance, held on 1 July at the Yangon City Hall.

The level of air pollution is higher in the industrial zones. Carbon emissions by vehicles on urban roads and PM emissions from construction sites are also contributing to air pollution.

Planting trees may help reduce pollution, and factory owners have also been directed to take measures against smoke and waste production, according to the YCDC.

"The factories are working together to reduce the use of diesel engines. Furthermore, construction wall barriers are a must to prevent construction dust from entering the surroundings. Moreover, a wheel washing system is also being used at construction sites before the trucks run on roads," said U Saw Win Maung.

"Yangon's air pollution usually crosses the set limit and the rate tends to fall in the rainy season for some reason," he added. Monitoring of air pollution in the YCDC area started in 2016, according to the committee.

Of the four equipments set up to measure air quality, three have been installed in Mingaladon, Hledan, and the city hall. The remaining one monitors air quality through mobile sensors. Evaluations are being carried out at 67 points in Yangon Region.

The equipment for measuring pollution can measure air quality in an area of up to one-and-a-half mile. The machines can measure the levels of carbon dioxide, carbon monoxide, methane, nitrogen oxide, sulfur dioxide, PM2, and PM10. ■

MoE, KfW sign agreements on funding nearly euro 10 mln for TVET reform

DEPARTMENT of Technical and Vocational Education-DTVE of Ministry of Education and German Development Bank (KfW) signed a financing agreement and other separate agreements on funding nearly euro 10 million on implementing "TVET Reform Programme Phase II" at the ministry in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

Speaking at the Signing Ceremony of "TVET Reform Programme Phase II" between Ministry of Education and German Development Bank (KfW), Union Minister for Education Dr Myo Thein Gyi said implementation of the first phase of TVET Reform Programme was underway at Government Technical Institute (Insein, Shwepyitha) and Government Technical High School (Ywama), and the second phase could be implemented soon.

It was of great assistance for TVET Reform as it was the programme assisting with modern teaching/learning materials for the institutes, schools and training centres of Department of Technical and Vocational Education-DTVE, the Union Minister said.

He then added that the ministry was developing TVET sector in Myanmar to produce human resources needed for related industries and to create more job opportunities.

Then, Dr Katharina Spiess, the Head of Development Cooperation of KfW, and Dr Christine Heimburger, the Director of East Asai and Pacific of KfW, delivered speeches.

Afterwards, Dr Aye Myint, the Director-General of Department of Technical and Vocational Education, and Dr Christine Heimburger, the Director of East

Asai and Pacific of KfW signed agreements on funding nearly euro 10 million.

With the systematic use of some euro 8 million fund for teaching and learning materials, the Ministry of Education's Department of Technical and Vocational Education will implement promoting learning opportunities and quality teaching at Government Technical Institute (Mandalay), Government Technical High Schools (Mandalay and Taunggyi), and Government Technical High School and Technical Promotion Training Centre (Baelin).

Faculties of the institutes and schools will also be trained for their promoting capacity with the use of teaching materials and learning materials. — MNA ■

Additional statistical bulletin on drug seizures, acting on information

1. In order to prevent and eradicate the dangers of narcotic drugs and psychotropic drugs, the Office of the President has formed the **Drug Activity Special Complaint Department** on 26 June 2018 to systematically accept and respond to reports on drug abuses and other related cases from the general public.
2. With orders from the Office of the President, the Drug Activity Special Complaint Department relayed information on reports on drug-related offences up to 29 June 2019 to the Ministry of Home Affairs to take action, as displayed below:

3. Out of the information sent to the Ministry of Home Affairs, so far a total of 669 cases have been opened files as of 29 June 2019. A total of 1048 people, including 882 men and 166 women had been arrested with seizures of 6398.6984 g of heroin, 73.72 g of ICE, 39726.74 g of opium, 329.6 g of low-quality opium, 19399.27 g of speciosa powder;

7833.19 g of speciosa, 1.5 liters of liquid speciosa, 303189 stimulant tablets, 8309.22 g of marijuana, 0.1 liters of opium tincture, 513.26 g of opium blocks, 60 g of poppy seeds, 28.45 g of crushed stimulant tablet powder, 0.001 g of crushed ecstasy powder, 17 firearms, different kinds of 257 cartridges and 1 grenade. Efforts for fighting the drug trafficking has been stepped up and the ministry will report on further exposed cases.

4. In addition to the investigations and arrests conducted on drug related complaints mentioned above, the Tatmadaw and Myanmar Police Force have also carried out separate investigations on drug complaints, search and arrests at border gates, and searches of vehicles acting upon given information.

During the previous week, multiple arrests were made in the border regions and joint-surveillance gates.

Upon acting on a tip-off, police arrested a man with 0.002 gram of heroin, near Thapyaygon market, Zabuthiri Tsp in Nay Pyi Taw. Police arrested a man with 400 stimulant tablets in Pankhin 3 Ward, Pyinmana Tsp. A man and a woman were arrested with 21 stimulant tablets and a motorbike in Thayetkone Village. In Kachin State, police searched a man and a woman with a motorcycle on the road of Mawhan Village, Mohnyin Tsp and arrested them with 5700 stimulant tablets and a motorbike. Acting an interrogation, a man was arrested with 89 stimulant tablets. In Mon State, police arrested five men and a woman together with 80 stimulant tablets, 1000 g of speciosa and two vehicles in Kyauktalon Village, Mudon Tsp. Two men were arrested with 197 stimulant tablets and a motorbike, at a rubber farm in Myoma 4 Ward. Police arrested a man with 586 stimulant tablets at a breeding zone, a woman with 255 stimulant tablets and 45 g of ICE in Aryutaung Village, in Ye Township. In Rakhine State, police patrolling in Naf River near the mouth of Ushaekya creek, Maungtaw Tsp seized 117200 stimulant tablets and a boat. In Shan State, police searched a man with a motorcycle at the 144/3 mile post of Loilem-Taunggyi road near Lwelwootoke Village, Hopong Tsp and arrested him 4800 stimulant tablets and a motorbike. A man arrested together with 150000 stimulant tablets and a vehicle on the road of Loilem-Taunggyi, Loilem Tsp. Acting on a tip-off, a man with a vehicle arrested in Panlinsein Village, Namhsan Tsp. Police arrested a man with 3 stimulant tablets and a motorbike on the Kunhing bridge, Kunhing Tsp, and acting on an interrogating, two men and a woman were arrested together with 1639 stimulant tablets in Wanpan Village. A woman was arrested with 6067 stimulant tablets in No3 Ward, Karli Town. Police arrested a man together with 2461 stimulant tablets and 101 g of heroin in Loisountout Ward, and a woman with 1630 stimulant tablets and 205 g of heroin in Konmyinthaw Ward, in Mongshu Tsp. Police seized 1700 stimulant tablets in a box drop from a motorcycle near Naungmongawrakha Village in Lashio Tsp. Police arrested two men with 955 stimulant tablets and a vehicle in Panlot Village, a man together with 2140 stimulant tablets and 14 g of heroin in Manchet Village, Hsenwi Tsp. At Yaypu check point, police searched a man with 12-wheel Heno vehicle and seized 6768 litre of sulphuric acid and a vehicle. At Tarkawat bridge check gate in Tangyan Tsp, police searched a highway passenger bus and arrested a woman with 14500 g of opium. A woman was arrested with 4875 stimulant tablets in Wanenar Village in Muse Tsp. A woman was arrested with 160 stimulant tablets and 1452 g of heroin in Mannargon 12 Ward, Namhkam Tsp. A man was arrested with 4000 stimulant tablets in Zaygon Village, Nawngkhio Tsp. Police searched a man and a motorcycle and arrested 4370 stimulant tablets and a cycle on the road of Hokho-Mogok, near Hokho Village. A man arrested with 10000 stimulant tablets, 30 g of heroin and a cycle on the road near Seinlaekantha farm. Police searched a man and a cycle at the 25/3 milepost on the road of Mongmit-Mogok, Mongmit Tsp and arrested 1000 g of opium and a cycle. Two women were arrested 780 stimulant tablets and 1.8 g of heroin in No 2 Ward, Laukkai Tsp.

Upon acting on tip-off, two men were seized with 1400 stimulant tablets, 660 g of heroin, 275 g of ICE, 473 g of caffeine, 7 9mm pistols, one .38 pistol, one .45 gun, two M-22 guns containing scope, two .22 gun containing scope, one HL-33 gun, one 12-volt short gun, 61 .45 bullets, 472 .38 bullets, 55 .38 bullets, 25 12-volt bullets, 221 9mm bullets, 31 5.56 bullets, 541 7.62 bullets, 34 bullet chambers, one GPS, one voice recording machine, three walkie talkies, two I-Com machines, one Hummer vehicle, one Crown vehicle and two motorbikes. Upon investigation, a seizure of one RPG gun, one .22 gun, 30 .22 bullets, 100 7.62 bullets, one bullet chamber, one M-16 bullet chamber, four vehicles, one motorbike were made in Mine Lin Village. Upon acting on a tip-off, police found one .22 gun containing scope, 54 .22 bullets, one bullet chamber, one gas gun and its bullet chamber in Hwaylaylan Village. Police found ownerless 41900 stimulant tablets, 3160 go of crushed stimulant powder, 60000 g of caffeine, 22 12-volt bullets, 3 M-22 bullet chambers and one revolver in Arrsawpawmoe Village, Mongset Tsp, Shan State. A man was caught with a seizure of 40000 stimulant tablets, 18 g of heroin, 990 g of speciosa powder, one homemade pistol and its bullet chamber and 13 .38 bullets in Ayeyeik Nyein Ward, Kawthoung Tsp, Taninthayi Region. Eight men and one woman were caught with a seizure of 90 stimulant tablets, 5 g of ICE, 800 g of speciosa powder, two percussion lock firearms and 15 lead balls in Ward 1, Mawtaung Town.

There have been 244 cases being opened between 23-06-2019 and 29-06-2019. The total number of 355 people, including 304 men and 51 women, were arrested with a seizure of 951834 stimulant tablets, 3199.755 g of crushed stimulant tablet powder, 5505.465 g of heroin, 12824.24 g of ICE, 5 g of Ketamine, 1605473 g of caffeine, 23933.41 opium, 46.4 g of low-quality opium, 13635 g of speciosa powder, 1000 g of speciosa, 11 g of opium blocks, 128.74 g of marijuana, 6768 liters of Sulphuric Acid, 128 liters of Ethyl Ether, 27 firearms, 2451 bullets, 15 lead balls, 44 bullet chambers, five binoculars, one GPS, one Voice Recording machine, three walkie talkies, two I-Com machines and other equipment related with making illegal drugs.

Anti-Corruption Commission sues Shwebo Township Tax officer, staff

THE Anti-Corruption Commission (ACC) yesterday opened cases against Shwebo Township tax officer and a staff of the township office who allegedly abused their power of authority to take money from a tax payer. A complaint was filed with the Anti-Corruption Commission against U Aung Aung, Head of Shwebo Township Tax

Office and Daw Nyo Nyo Win, Upper Clark of the office, for not refunding the excess tax paid to the office.

After looking into the case, the investigation committee of the ACC found that U Aung Aung and Daw Nyo Nyo Win did not refund K1,122,000 to the tax payer who gave K3 million for a tax payment for a land and

a rice mill in Minkyaung Village-tract in Shwebo Township.

Files have been opened against U Aung Aung under section 56 of the Anti-Corruption law and Daw Nyo Nyo under section 56/63 of the same law at the Shwebo Myoma Police Station yesterday.—MNA

The rule of law and the judicial system must be transparent and must guarantee a level playing field for foreign investment, which can drive our country's development.

To underpin the rule of law and the judicial system, we need to improve the court system and the machinery of the rule of law, with a focus on eliminating corruption, improved legal training for professionals, and availability of legal counsel for the indigent.

We would like to encourage people to help uphold the rule of law and cooperate with the judicial system. All government institutions and departments must work seriously and diligently, not as a response to complaints or suggestions from the people, but out of a sense of duty and responsibility.



Bagan on its way to UNESCO world heritage status

TWENTY-THREE years after Myanmar first nominated Bagan, the UNESCO World Heritage Committee is set to decide whether the site will make it into the World Heritage List.

Bagan will be one of the 36 nominations that will be considered during the committee's 43rd session in Baku, Azerbaijan, from 30 June to 10 July.

The Ministry of Culture and Religious Affairs has been working with domestic and foreign experts since 2013 to formulate a management system to put Bagan on the World Heritage List.

Bagan has an exceptionally good chance of entering the list due to its unique cultural value and architecture, boasting over three to four thousand structures in one place.

If Bagan is included in UNESCO's World Heritage List, it will contribute to strengthening our national integrity, besides promoting tourism. It will also allow Myanmar to get the necessary technological assistance to preserve Bagan, in line with international standards.

Tourists mainly come to Myanmar to visit Bagan and upgrading it from a national heritage to a world heritage ranking will boost tourism significantly. This, in turn, will create more jobs for local residents and promote businesses related to tourism.

The authorities have been seeking Bagan's inclusion on the World Heritage List since 1996, but their applications have been dismissed on grounds of not meeting certain standards or requirements.

But, the Department of Archaeology and National Museum applied again in 2018, after en-

suring that all the requirements were met.

Background

Considered one of the most important archaeological and monument sites in Asia, the city of Bagan was the centre of an economic, socio-political and cultural network in an extensive Buddhist empire that had its peak between 11th and 13th centuries CE. On the Ayeyarwady River in the central dry zone of Myanmar, Bagan includes more than 3,500 surviving stupas, temples, monasteries, fortifications and other monuments.

Process of World Heritage inscription

Myanmar first submitted Ba-

an for the World Heritage List in 1996 after the completion of an inventory of monuments and a zoning management plan with the support of UNESCO. Due to the high risk of inappropriate commercial development in the protected area, the requirements for inscription were not fulfilled initially. Myanmar authorities decided to try again more than 20 years later, within the framework of an overall renewed commitment towards the implementation of the 1972 World Heritage Convention.

For the last six years, UNESCO has supported Myanmar's effort to nominate Bagan through a series of capacity-building activities. Maps and the inventory of monuments have been updated and site conservation has been strengthened in line with international standards. In particular, a comprehensive set of guidelines for the conservation of Bagan has been developed, including conservation of mural paintings, in-depth condition assessment for bricks monument. After the earthquake that heavily damaged the monuments of Bagan in August 2016, special attention was given to the development of a strategy which addresses assessment of damages, post-earthquake stabilization, and post-disaster rehabilitation.

A detailed management plan for Bagan was also produced to enhance the legal and institutional framework for protecting the site, especially to address pressures from uncontrolled development in a protected area that is still an imminent threat.

World Heritage Nomination of Bagan

In February 2018, the Myanmar Government submitted the completed nomination to the UNESCO World Heritage Centre and later received feedback from the International Council of Monuments and Sites (ICOMOS), the professional and scientific advisory body for cultural heritage nominations.

The final decision on the nomination is expected on 5 or 6 July when the review of the

inscription on the World Heritage List will be carried out by the 21 members of the World Heritage Committee.

If the application is successful, Bagan will become Myanmar's second entry on the World Heritage List. UNESCO added the Pyu Ancient Cities - Hanlin, Beikthano and Sri Ksetra - to the list in 2014.

Significance

To be included on UNESCO's World Heritage List, sites must be of Outstanding Universal Value, meaning that their cultural significance is so exceptional that it transcends national boundaries and are of common importance for present and future generations of all humanity. As such, the permanent protection of this heritage is of the highest importance to the international community as a whole. A comprehensive protection and management plan is crucial to make sure that if the site is included in the list, the proper mechanisms - legal, institutional, managerial, etc - are in place so

that the site will be preserved and passed on to future generations.

While the cultural and historical significance of Bagan is beyond doubt, the inscription in the World Heritage List will also bind all the involved parties to a shared responsibility for the safeguarding of the site. The inscription would also bring additional benefits by raising the visibility of Bagan, galvanizing technical and financial assistance, supporting the sustainable development of the area, and helping to maintain and nourish the site to thrive.

Three ancient Pyu cities were entered into the UNESCO World Heritage List in 2014.

If Bagan makes it into the list, authorities say they will campaign for including MraukU Region into the list in 2020.

Flood management in Yangon has improved 75%: YCDC member

FLOOD management measures are being undertaken in Yangon Region and there has been a 75-per cent improvement in the urban drainage system compared to last year, said U Min Han, Yangon City Development Committee member in charge of drainage and sewage management.

He made the remarks at a press conference on YCDC's performance, held on 1 July at the Yangon City Hall.

"We have been making efforts to improve the urban drainage system in 33 townships of Yangon Region. This year, there has been a 75-per cent improvement in the drainage system," said U Min Han.

"We need machines for flood management. Machine purchases were previously handled by YCDC's Engineering Department (Roads and Bridges). Now, the Yangon Mayor and our department

are planning to purchase the machines," he added.

A long-term flood management plan is being implemented with the assistance of the World Bank, said Daw Hlaing Maw Oo, secretary, YCDC.

"The drains in flood-prone wards in Yangon Region release untreated water directly into rivers and streams. We need to be prepared for any possible rise in rainfall, sea level, and tide. Therefore, we are implementing

flood management in line with the changing climate conditions, with the assistance of our development partner, World Bank," she said.

YCDC to spend K17 mln to tackle stray dog problem

THE Yangon City Development Committee will spend K17 million to deal with the problem of stray dogs in Yangon Region, said U Min Aung, the head of the Veterinary and Slaughter House Department of the YCDC.

"We allocate a budget for stray dogs every year. This year, K17.8 million will be disbursed," he said during a press conference on YCDC's performance, held on 1 July at the Yangon City Hall.

Over 7,000 pet dogs are registered in Yangon Region, while the region's stray dog population is estimated at about 150,000, according to the YCDC.

"There are six options to deal with the increasing stray dog population in Yangon Region — sheltering, killing, vac-

inating, spaying, neutering, and non-governmental rescue actions and programs," said Daw Nan Su Shwe Sin, a YCDC member. The YCDC tackles the stray problem using the option decided upon by each township, she said.

"Our Veterinary Department is dealing with stray problems as per the request of the public in each township," she added. Last May, about 7,000 stray dogs in some townships were sent to shelters, according to the YCDC.

"Whatever options are used, I wish the authorities deal with the stray dog problem in a systematic way. There are many stray dogs roaming freely in South Dagon Township, and this is a serious concern for the public," said a resident of 55 ward in South Dagon Myothit Township.

Mandalay factories asked to submit EMP reports by July-end

TO control the environmental impact of businesses, factories in the Mandalay Industrial Zone have been asked to draw up and submit EMP (Environmental Management Plan) reports to the Environmental Conservation Department by the end of July, the general secretary of the Industrial Management Committee told iMyanmarHouse.com.

There are more than 1,200 registered industrial businesses in the Mandalay Industrial Zone and 76 factories, including alcohol and beer factories, which produce wastewater.

"Earlier, businesses in nine sectors — manufacturing of alcohol and beer, dis-

tilleries, food and beverages, pesticides processing and packaging, textile dyeing and printing, cement, smelting and moulding (metal work), leather work, pulp and paper mills, and sugar refineries — needed to draw up EMP reports. Now, all types of factories, except small and medium enterprises, have to forward EMP reports," the IMC general secretary said.

Businesses need to lay down EMP guidelines for wastewater release, and air and noise pollution, and submit them to the Environmental Conservation Department by the end of this month, he added.

Domestic investments touch K1,333 bln in current fiscal

BETWEEN 1 October, 2018 and 28 June, 2019 in the current fiscal year, domestic investments by Myanmar citizens reached K1,333 billion and US\$393 million, including expansion of capital by existing enterprises, according to a press release issued by the Myanmar Investment Commission.

During the nine-month period, 126 local enterprises were allowed to invest in various sectors, with estimated capital of over K915.18 billion and \$326.8 million.

The investments flowed into the real estate, manufacturing, hotels and tourism, construction, industrial estate, energy, mining, livestock and fisheries, agriculture, and other services sectors, according to figures from the Direc-

torate of Investment and Company Administration.

At a recent MIC meeting, 13 domestic enterprises with estimated capitals of K73.9 billion and US\$17.6 million received MIC permits and endorsements from the investment committees of Yangon, Mandalay, Ayeyawady, and Sagaing regions. The companies will execute projects in the manufacturing, hotel businesses, and other services sectors, creating over 2,500 jobs.

To simplify the verification process of investment projects, the Myanmar Investment Law allows the Regions and States Investment Committees to grant permissions to local and foreign proposals, where the initial investment does not exceed K6 billion, or \$5 million.

While some projects no longer need MIC approval, businesses that are strategic to the government require a permit from the commission. In addition, those businesses that have large capital investments exceeding \$5 million and may have a possible impact on the environment and the local community need to

be approved by the DICA proposal assessment team.

With a fast-track way to set up a business in Myanmar having been introduced, investors can apply to the MIC or the State and Regional investment committee for endorsing investment proposals, depending on the business type. — GNLM / (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

Trading on YSX dips in June

IN the month of June, 233,994 shares of five companies listed on the Yangon Stock Exchange, worth around K1.32 billion, were traded on the exchange, according to the monthly report of the YSX. The trade volume was lower than May, when 275,325 shares were traded on the exchange.

The value of shares traded was the highest this year in May at K1.4 billion, according to the YSX report. In January, 89,576 shares worth K526 million were traded on the exchange, and the trade value slid to K409 million and K396 million in February and March, respectively, as share prices decreased. In April, 102,682 shares worth K506 million were traded on the YSX.

At present, shares of five listed companies — First Myanmar Investment (FMI), Myanmar Thilawa SEZ Holdings (MTSH), Myanmar Citizens Bank (MCB), First Private Bank (FPB), and TMH Telecom Public Co. Ltd. — are be-

ing traded on the stock exchange.

In June, the shares of FMI closed at K11,500, MTSH at K3,400, MCB at K7,900, FPB at K24,000, and TMH at K3,050. While the volume of trade was lower in June compared to May, the price of shares registered an increase.

“The YSX was launched three years ago to improve the private business sector. We will disseminate the rules and regulations of the stock exchange at the upcoming Monywa Stock Investment Seminar, which will be held on 9 June,” said U Thein Tun Oo, executive senior manager, YSX.

The YSX has increased the matching time of stock trading from two to four per day. In addition to this, it also held a promotional event to attract new investors and encourage existing investors to trade more actively. The YSX has also sought the government’s support to get more public companies to participate in the stock market and to

help more institutional investors, such as financing companies, investment banks, insurance companies, to emerge.

In 2016, shares of only three companies were traded on the YSX — First Myanmar Investment, Myanmar Thilawa SEZ Holdings, and Myanmar Citizens Bank. One more public company, First Private Bank, was listed on the YSX in 2017. Last year, TMH Telecom Public Co. Ltd debuted on the exchange.

In 2016, more than 2.5 million shares of three listed companies were traded on the YSX, and their value was estimated at K70 billion. In 2017, despite an increase in the stock trading volume to 2.6 million shares, the trading value was only K22 billion. In 2018, 2.3 million shares of five companies, worth K11.5 billion, were traded on the exchange, according to the annual report of the YSX. — GNLM

AMCHAM Myanmar presents recommendations to government officials on Improving Ease of Doing Business in Myanmar

YANGON, Myanmar, 26 June 2019 — The American Chamber of Commerce in Myanmar (AMCHAM Myanmar) today hosted a forum under the theme of ‘Improving the Ease of Doing Business in Myanmar’. Held at the Melia Hotel Yangon, the forum provided a platform for AMCHAM’s leadership committee to engage in intimate discussions with senior Myanmar Government officials on ways to improve the ease of doing business in Myanmar, lower the cost of doing business and ultimately attract more US investment.

The forum discussions were guided by a Policy Recommendation Paper developed by AMCHAM Myanmar which outlines specific recommendations on business opportunities and ways to tackle immediate challenges to enable businesses to thrive. A range of topics were discussed including taxation, employment, financial services, and trade across a number of sectors.

Among the attendees of the forum were U Soe Thein, Deputy Governor, Central Bank of Myanmar; Dr Ye Myint Swe, Deputy Union Minister, Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation; U Aung Htoo, Deputy Minister,

Mr Scot Marciel, US Ambassador to Myanmar, delivered the opening remarks for the forum, sharing, “American businesses do business the way Myanmar people tell us they want business done. In terms of trade, investment and tourism, AMCHAM is a great partner, doing a lot not only to promote US business but to improve the business environment in Myanmar.”

Discussions at the forum were focused on three key themes which AMCHAM Myanmar identified as areas for improvement to encourage greater investment in the country.

Optimization of Processes

AMCHAM Myanmar suggested ways to streamline procedures and implement clear standard operating procedures (SOPs) to make day-to-day transactions easier and more efficient. Specific recommendations that were discussed included establishing a one-stop

Visa Center to process business and work visas for foreigners working at local companies and streamlining the required documentation for commercial tax.

AMCHAM Myanmar also proposed for SOPs to be publicly available with clear guidelines and timelines, and that SOPs are cross-referenced between related ministries to avoid duplication and roadblocks.

Said Dr Ye Myint Swe, Deputy Union Minister, Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation on

improving government SOPs — “We are working towards improving our SOPs and to establish a better understanding between the central and local governments. We aim to establish stronger relationships with local authorities and to consult them for recommendations on implementing SOPs.”

Regulatory Clarity and Consistency

AMCHAM Myanmar recommended ways to improve drafting, dissemination and implementation of laws. For

example, AMCHAM Myanmar suggested that the interpretation of labor laws be clarified and standardized across all township offices to ensure consistent implementation.

In addition, AMCHAM Myanmar proposed for an institutionalized process to develop new legislation which includes a reasonable period for broad public consultation, and which takes into account feedback from the private sector and the foreign investment community.

Shared U Aung Htoo, Deputy Minister, Ministry of Commerce, on working closely with the business community to share information and address feedback — “We appreciate the efforts of AMCHAM Myanmar to share their recommendations and we plan to engage more regularly with members of the foreign business community moving forward.”

U Soe Thein, Deputy Governor, Central Bank of Myanmar on improving transparency in policy development for the finance industry — “Over recent years, we have published many documents, directives and regulatory updates on our website for companies to access. We will soon publish additional market data such as statistical indicators of GDP and inflation rate, along with our latest monetary policy and sustainability report.

During the process of drafting regulations, we typically distribute our first draft of the policy to stakeholders such as banks, auditor generals and law firms to request for their recommendations. We take their feedback into account when finalizing the regulation and provide detailed responses to address questions received.”

“We are looking at introducing best practices of neighboring countries to support our reform agenda. Recently, we launched an online system to

facilitate easier and paperless applications of trade licenses. We conducted a successful pilot project of the online system with more than 100 garment factories located in different industrial zones and now, these companies do not have to visit our office to submit a license application,” said U MinnMinn, Director General, Ministry of Commerce.

Getting Sufficient and Reliable Electricity:

While power generation projects have accelerated recently, AMCHAM Myanmar highlighted power supply as a key focus area to meet the growing demand and as a vital requirement to sustain business operations.

“We are encouraged by the positive economic reforms implemented in Myanmar in recent years and today’s forum allowed us to share not only our understanding about the needs of businesses on the ground but objective reforms and procedural changes which will improve the business environment. Beyond this forum, AMCHAM Myanmar would like to support the Myanmar Government with their existing plans to improve the ease of doing business.

We believe our contributions will help to strengthen investor confidence from the US and other markets. I wish to thank the AMCHAM Myanmar team for supporting the development of the Policy

Recommendation Paper and to the government officials for engaging in dialogue with us,” said U KhinMaung Win, President, AMCHAM Myanmar.

Following today’s forum, AMCHAM Myanmar will publish the full Policy Recommendation Paper in the coming weeks and engage with the relevant government ministries and departments about possible implementation of the recommendations. — AMCHAM Myanmar ■

Gauff made no bones about her ambitions at the tournament. "My goal is to win it," she said. "I said this before: I want to be the greatest. "My dad told me that I could do this when I was eight. "I'm still, like, not 100% confident. But you never know what happens." Gauff said she was determined to make the

most of her opportunities.

"I mean, like my motto is just like wing it," she said. "I've said that before. This is kind of a sad thing, we're all going to die one day, I just want to make the most of it." Gauff, who revealed Rihanna and Beyonce were her role models off the court, said she had not allowed her admiration of childhood idol Williams affect her play. However, she did have a slight wobble at the end when she let slip three match points.

Williams, whose exploits along with her younger sister Serena inspired Gauff to take up the sport, made no secret of how far Gauff could go. "I think the sky's the limit, it really is," said Williams. "Just have fun. Enjoy life. That's all you can do."
