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Pyidaungsu Hluttaw

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw continues debate on constitution amendment bill

THE Pyidaungsu Hluttaw continued debate in its 13th day meeting yesterday on the articles and sub-articles in the second bill to amend the State Constitution.

MP U Nay Soe Aung from Wuntho constituency discussed the change of Myanmar language wording of ‘the disabled’ in sub-articles (a) and (b) under Article 32 and Article 344. He also suggested to annul Article 338 regarding the command of Defence Services on the armed forces, and Article 339 about the role of Defence Services to lead in safeguarding the Union against all international and external dangers.

MP U Thaug Aye from Pyawbwe constituency objected to the removal of wording ‘disciplined’ from sub-article (d) from the Article 6 in Chapter 1 of the Constitution.

He also opposed deletion of similar wording in Article 7, 39 and sub-article (a) of Article 405, and suggested amendments, annulments and stipulations of Constitution to be done in favour of national interest.

MP Dr Hla Moe from Aungmyethazan constituency supported amendment of sub-article (b) of Article 396 with regard

to the recalling measure of Hluttaw representative.

The amendments of sub-articles and articles were also discussed by the other 16 Hluttaw representatives.

The report on second six-months tax revenue of Union Ministries and agencies for 2018-2019 financial year sent by the Union Government and the findings and recommendations

(2/2020) of the Joint Public Accounts Committee on the report were discussed.

MP U Sai Tun Aye from Mongshu constituency discussed control for increasing exploitation of natural resources to gain more tax revenue.

MP Daw Nang Htwe Thu from Phasaung constituency supported the recommendations of JPAC to expand the

sector for tax collection.

The motion was also discussed by the other six Hluttaw representatives.

Pyidaungsu Hluttaw Speaker U T Khun Myat explained the Hluttaw office’s errors in omission of some words in the amendment bill’s sub-article (k) of Article 262 submitted by Tatmadaw Hluttaw representative Brigadier General Aung

San Chit and the correction for excluded words.

He also informed that any confusion in the bill might be directly reported to the Pyidaungsu Hluttaw office.

The 14th day of second Pyidaungsu Hluttaw will convene on 27 February.—Aung Ye Thwin and Aye Aye Thant

Union Minister for the Office of the State Counsellor delivers statement at the High-Level Segment of the 43rd Session of the United Nations Human Rights Council

UNION Minister for the Office of the State Counsellor U Kyaw Tint Swe attended the High-Level Segment of the 43rd Session of the United Nations Human Rights Council held in Geneva from 24 to 26 February 2020 and delivered a statement on 26 February 2020.

In his statement, the Union Minister stressed that cooperation with the United Nations is a cornerstone of the Foreign Policy of Myanmar. Recalling 27th anniversary of the adoption of the Vienna Declaration and Programme of Action, he highlighted that “States have the duty for promotion, protection of human rights and fundamental freedoms, thus, reinforcing the principle of exhaustion of domestic remedies”.

He added that peace and security, development and enjoyment of human rights are intertwined, so that achievement of national reconciliation and peace is the topmost priority for Myanmar, a country of internal conflicts for 70 years. He also apprised the Council of the Government's efforts in bringing the ethnic armed groups to the negotiating table as well as achievement and progress made in signing of the Nationwide Ceasefire Agreement (NCA). He further informed the Council that 4th session of the Union Peace Conference- 21st Century Panglong is scheduled to be held in first four months of 2020.

On the issue of Rakhine State, while sharing the concern of the international

community over the conflict which affects all communities, he reaffirmed the Myanmar Government's commitment in resolving the issue and pointed out that the deliberate attacks of ARSA in 2016 and 2017 not only triggered the humanitarian situation, also derailed the efforts to bring social cohesion, reconciliation, peace and development to Rakhine State. He underscored that “priority now is to expedite the repatriation of verified displaced persons to Rakhine State under voluntary, safe and dignified conditions”. In this regard, he encouraged Bangladesh to show genuine political will, committed efforts and cooperation by strictly adhering to the signed agreements.

Turning to the accountability matter, he reiterated that “the Government of Myanmar firmly stands for principles

which are cornerstone of international legal order”. Relating to the Independent Commission of Enquiry (ICOE), he informed the Council that the final report of ICOE, based not on narratives but on interviews of close to 1,500 witnesses, was submitted to the President on 20 January 2020, and subsequently, the President Office instructed the Attorney General for further investigation and prosecution. He continued, “Tatmadaw, Myanmar Defence Services have announced that the Office of the Judge Advocate General will take action with military justice procedures if there is credible evidence of any commission of offence by members of Tatmadaw”.

While celebrating the 75th year of the founding of the United Nations, he recalled that Human Rights Council was

created to address the weakness and failings of the Human Rights Commission. Moreover, he stated that the Universal Periodic Review (UPR) process is the best mechanism to address human rights challenges based on equal footing and equal voice. He further informed the Council of the upcoming third UPR review of Myanmar at the 37th session of the UPR working group.

Furthermore, he recalled the huge expectations and aspiration of member states at the time when the Human Right Council was created, saying “we dreamed of a Human Rights Council where all human rights are treated equally; where the realization of the right to development is given due priority; where sovereignty of nations are upheld; ensuring equality of action and scrupulously avoiding double standards; where unwieldy mandate or unilaterally extending its power without accompanying due diligence is not allowed; where no nation is made to feel its value is decided by the degree of material wealth and political influence it can muster”. “Regretfully this dream has not been realized”, he continued.

He concluded by stressing “Dreams do not become reality unless we work to make it happen” and called on all member states to cooperate, so that dreams will be fulfilled and Human Rights Council will truly become a beacon of hope where all can work in concert for common good - the enjoyment of Human Rights for everyone.—MNA

Union LIP Minister discusses garment sector, labour issues

UNION Minister for Labour, Immigration and Population U Thein Swe discussed garment sector and labour issues at the separate meetings with delegates from the Garment Advocacy Group of Eurochan Myanmar and the International Labour Organization at his office in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

At the meeting with a delegation Garment Advocacy Group of Eurochan Myanmar, led by Mr Serkan Tanka, the Union Minister discussed matters relating to assistances from the European Union in expansion of Myanmar's garment sector.

The Eurochan Myanmar was cooperating with Ministry of Commerce, related ministries and garment businesspersons to prevent the shortages of raw materials at the factories in Myanmar due to China's COVID-19

outbreak.

They also discussed the measures for setting minimum wages to be completed in a timely manner, skills assessment of the National Skill Standard Authority (NSSA) for workers' skill development in Myanmar and continuing cooperation on Myanmar's industrial development after seeking the advice from the Eurochan Myanmar.

At the meeting with ILO's Deputy Director-General Mr Greg Vines, the Union Minister discussed the implementation of IT reform with ILO-Korea Partnership Programme, medical reform with ILO-Luxembourg Project, management reform with ILO-Vision Zero Fund Project and legal reform with ILO-Labour Law Reform Project, and the condition of drawing a Master Plan by the ILO.

They also discussed to establish a regular office as the ILO has been long operating its liaison office in Myanmar with

14 projects and more than 80 employees, and the condition of ongoing implementation of National Complaints Mecha-

nism-NCM in accordance with the ILO's provisions.—MNA

MoHS organizes daily meeting on COVID-19 prevention

UNION Minister for Health and Sports Dr Myint Htwe presided over the daily meeting (24/2020) on prevention of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19) at his office in Nay Pyi Taw yesterday.

At the meeting, the minister discussed the spread of disease in some countries, preventive measures against it, collection of global information about COVID-19 at the Central Epidemiology Unit, doing reviews and analysis and reporting updated situations.

The Union Minister also advised to learn successful medical treatments on the positive cases in regional countries, and make an assessment on the achievement in awareness campaign at the border towns.

He added increasing momentum for surveillance and screening the visitors arrived from South Korea, Japan and Singapore, collaboration with the hotels and guesthouses they stay, coordination among the officers from the immigration department, custom departments and aviation department.

The Minister called for conducting surveillance more closely at the residential areas of Chinese visitors, and awareness campaigns on public buses, express cars and passenger ships.

He continued to say tightly control on the arrival of foreign cruise ships into Myanmar, and to check the previous 14-day travel histories of passengers onboard cruise ship as they are scheduled

to visit Myanmar on 4 March, to review free visa programmes for visitors from some foreign countries. He also discussed accumulation of medicines and medical equipment, systematic taking of specimens from the suspected patients and report on medical treatments for COVID-19 at the private hospitals and clinics.

Union Minister Dr Myint Htwe suggested the Myanmar Red Cross Society to conduct screening mainly at the border crossings, changes of norms to confirm COVID-19 in accordance with rules of the countries on the disease, while the MoHS and other relevant ministries need to utilize more human resources, budgets and equipment.—MNA

Surveillance and investigation of Coronavirus Disease 2019 (COVID-19)

Updates at 8 pm 26 February 2020

1. The Ministry of Health and Sports is closely monitoring the outbreak of COVID-19, with conducting surveillance at international gateways and at the public hospitals and private healthcare facilities.
2. A 32-year-old man from Gilbert of Arizona State in the United States, arrived in Myanmar on 22 February 2020 after his visit to Malaysia from 20 to 22 February and three-month stay in Harbin city of China. He suffered symptoms of vomit, diarrhoea, sore throat and fever on 25 February afternoon. He was taken to Yangon People's Hospital on the following morning, and he was transferred to the Waibargi Special Hospital. He is regarded as a person under investigation with medical treatments, and his specimens will be sent to the National Health Laboratory (Yangon) for tests. He is not diagnosed with acute respiratory disease until now.
3. There are two patients under surveillance at the hospitals till 8 pm on 26 February 2020, and they were in good health conditions. Results from his diagnosis will be released in real-time report.
4. Although there is no laboratory confirmed case of COVID-19 until 26 February, the ministry is conducting round-the-clock surveillance in upward momentum. As the COVID-19 is spreading in 34 countries, including China and some of its neighbouring countries, people are suggested to follow health awareness of the Ministry of Health and Sports on prevention of the disease.— MNA

Trade exceeds \$9 bln in first three months of 2019-2020FY

IN the first three months of this fiscal year, which started in October, Myanmar's total trade with foreign countries stood at US\$9.75 billion.

The country's exports were registered at \$4.76 billion, with normal exports pegged at \$2.72 billion and border exports amounting to \$2.04 billion.

For the same period, Myanmar's imports stood at \$4.99 billion, with normal imports totaling \$4.17 billion and border imports reaching \$817.33 million. Myanmar's trade deficit was valued at \$228.12 million for the October-December period, accord-

ing to the Central Statistical Organization. In the month of December in the 2019-2020 financial year, Myanmar's exports were registered at \$1.43 billion, with normal exports valued at \$870.72 million and border exports pegged at \$561.17 million.

During the same period, Myanmar's imports reached \$1.892 billion, with normal imports valued at \$1.6 billion and border imports estimated at \$291.59 million. The total trade volume for December was \$3.32 billion, with the trade deficit touching \$460.75 million. – MNA

Taninthayi VMS centre conducts surveillance of offshore fishing vessels

THE Taninthayi Vessel Monitoring System Control Centre is keeping a careful watch on offshore fishing vessels in Myanmar waters, according to the Fisheries Department.

The control centre is temporarily operating out of the Myeik District Fisheries Department as the three-storeyed building where it will be housed is still under construction. The control centre is being built with funds allocated by the Taninthayi Region government.

Vessel monitoring systems (VMS) have been installed on a total of 1,414 offshore boats and 116 fish collecting vessels so far, while some vessels have been issued warnings regarding their installation.

"The control centre is mon-

itoring fishing vessels to check whether they are complying with the law. The vessels are being inspected at checkpoints before leaving for their designated ports. The inspections are aimed at curbing illicit fish-

ing and transportation," said U Than Chaung, head of the Taninthayi Region Fisheries Department.

The Taninthayi coast is situated in southern Myanmar and it is the longest coast in

Myanmar, spanning 200 miles. More than 47,000 workers are engaged in offshore fishing on 1,530 vessels along the coast.—Khaing Htoo (IPRD)

FDC to analyse prize-winning film "Antichrist"



Corn farmers in Pwintbyu Township profit from high prices

CORN growers in Pwintbyu Township of Magway Region said they have earned a good profit due to the crop fetching higher prices this year compared with last year.

“A majority of farmers from the Mezali village-tract in Pwintbyu Township grow corn, bananas, chillies, onions, tomatoes, chick peas, and other vegetables on a commercial scale. Corn can be grown across three seasons — rainy, winter, and summer. This year, the yield of winter corn has been high and it is get-

ting a good price. Last year, corn was priced at just K50-80. This year, the price has increased to K150-200. Therefore, growers are doing well financially. I made a profit of K1 million from corn this year,” said Ma Lwin Maw, a corn grower from Mezali village-tract.

Corn farmers from Nyaungpinwine Village, Pwintbyu Township, use underground water for cultivation. They grow kitchen crops and vegetables commercially. — Ye Win Naing (NyaungU)

COVID-19: Watermelon, muskmelon exports down \$55 mln

ON account of the coronavirus outbreak, exports of watermelons and muskmelons to China have dropped, with losses pegged at US\$55 million within one month (27 January to 26 February), said U Naing Win, chair of the Myanmar Watermelon and Muskmelon Producers and Exporters Association.

“At this time last year, 700 trucks of watermelons were seen at Muse gate. Only 40-50 trucks of watermelons were sent to China per day amid China’s coronavirus outbreak. It led to the decay of fruits and fell in prices. Growers and traders suffered due to this,” he said.

After China’s customs office, schools, and banks reopened on 24 February, about

200 trucks of watermelons and muskmelons were allowed to enter China’s market. But, melons are fetching a low price, said traders.

“China’s demand has increased from 50 to 200 trucks. However, watermelon exports can cover only packing costs as only 200 out of 700 truckloads of watermelons are being exported per day. The muskmelon market is not that bad,” said U Naing Win.

“At present, the price of watermelons is ranging from 10,000-28,000 Yuan per truck. Muskmelons are fetching 30,000-35,000 per truck. Melon prices have dropped by half compared with last year. Myanmar’s watermelon and muskmelon export market will return to normal only after the

COVID-19 is brought under control in China. Chinese traders are also observing the market conditions,” according to the association.

“Chinese traders are concerned about market demand. The demand is gradually increasing,” said U Naing Win.

In order to remedy the current situation, the association has asked growers and traders to look for information and hold discussions with fruit depots.

Myanmar exports more than 800,000 tons of watermelons and 150,000 tons of muskmelons every year. At present, only 330,000 tons of watermelons and 40,000 tons of muskmelons have been shipped to external markets.

Chin State Chamber of Commerce seeks tax breaks on import of old off-road vehicles

THE Chin State Chambers of Commerce and Industry (CSCCI) has forwarded a request to the Private Sector Development Committee, led by Vice President U Myint Swe, to permit importation of old-model off-road vehicles with Chin State licence and grant tax exemption on imports of budget cars for the benefit of hotels and tourism entrepreneurs in Chin State.

U Kap Khen Pau, chair of the CSCCI, made the request at the 32nd regular meeting of the Private Sector Development Committee with private entrepreneurs on 22 February at the Republic of the Union of Myanmar Federation of Chambers of Commerce and Industry.

“Chin State’s roads are not suitable for luxury vehicles. Only station wagons that are specially designed for rough roads can run in the state. At present, the import of old model cars is restricted in the country, and only latest models are allowed. Travel entrepreneurs cannot afford to buy the latest model cars,” said U Kap Khen Pau.

“In addition, Chin State sees potential in the development of small and medium enterprises. But, the grant of land by the government has gotten delayed, making it difficult for private entrepreneurs to access loans,” he said. Therefore, to help SMEs obtain loans, the CSCCI has asked the government to grant them land rights as soon as possible. (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

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Mineral exports up \$600 mln in current fiscal

MYANMAR’S mineral exports have shown a marked climb this financial year, touching US\$944.4 million between 1 October and 14 February, an increase of \$602.5 million compared with the year-ago period, according to data from the Ministry of Commerce.

Last year, mineral exports were pegged at just \$341.9 million.

Both private and public sector mineral exports witnessed an increase in the current financial year, with private sector exports valued at \$489.5 million and public sector exports estimated at \$454.87 million.

Of the seven export groups,

exports of agricultural goods, minerals, fishery, and finished industrial goods showed an increase, while the exports of livestock, forest products, and other goods declined.

Export values stood at \$1.39 billion for agricultural products, \$51.4 million for livestock, \$373 million for fishery products, \$65.4 million for forest products, over \$3.79 billion for manufactured goods, and \$132 million for other goods.

The country’s export sector relies more on the agriculture and manufacturing sectors. While export earnings from the CMP

(cut, make, and pack) garment businesses are rising, the country’s reliance on natural resources has been lessening.

Due to limited extraction of natural resources, exports of forest products and minerals dropped significantly in the previous years. Permits for mining blocks were suspended in 2016, but after a period of two years, Myanmar’s mining sector has now been opened to local and foreign investors, according to the Ministry of Natural Resources and Environmental Conservation.—GNLM (Translated by Ei Myat Mon)

CORONAVIRUS cases spread beyond the outbreak's European hotspot Italy Wednesday, as the world scrambled to contain the deadly epidemic that is fast growing outside China's borders.

New cases linked to Italy -- the hardest hit European country -- have emerged in several countries in Europe and beyond, amid warnings from health experts that nations are not ready to contain a global outbreak.

But on Wednesday the World Health Organization said more new cases were now being clocked outside China than inside the country, where the deadly virus first emerged in December.

Greece confirmed its first case Wednesday, a woman who had recently travelled to northern Italy; while a suspected case was reported in Brazil—a traveller recently returned from Milan. If confirmed, it would be Latin America's first case of the virus.

Croatia, Austria and Algeria have all reported cases linked to Italy, while a hotel in Spain remained under lockdown Wednesday after an infected Italian tourist was hospitalised with the virus.

come the first French victim of the coronavirus in the country, the health ministry announced Wednesday. The man died overnight after being rushed to a Paris hospital in serious condition on Tuesday evening, bringing the total death toll in the country to two, said the ministry's deputy head Jerome Salomon.

Addressing the meeting, Xi said the positive trend in preventing and controlling the epidemic is expanding and economic and social development is rapidly recovering, but the situation in Hubei Province and its capital city of Wuhan remains complex and grim, and the risk of a rebound of the epidemic in other regions can not be overlooked.

Public events cancelled Japan reported two more deaths linked to the coronavirus Wednesday as the government called for organisers to reconsider holding major events in coming weeks to limit the outbreak.

Xi chairs leadership meeting on COVID-19 Xi Jinping, general secretary of the Communist Party of China (CPC) Central Committee, on Wednesday chaired a meeting of the Standing Committee of the Political Bureau of the CPC Central Committee on the prevention and control of the novel coronavirus disease (COVID-19).

in the Hokkaido region of northern Japan died of viral pneumonia, the ministry said. Testing done after the death confirmed the infection of the individual, whose details have not been released at the request of the family.

Iranian cyberpolice have arrested 24 people accused of on-line rumour-mongering about the spread of the coronavirus in the country, semi-official news agency ISNA reported on Wednesday. The Islamic republic has been battling to control an outbreak of the novel coronavirus that has claimed 19 lives among 139 infections in the past week.

North Korea imposes 'extraordinary' measures Loudspeakers blaring hygiene messages, foreign ambassadors locked in their compounds and state media demanding "absolute obedience" to health authorities—North Korea is taking what diplomats call "unprecedented" measures as it seeks to prevent a crippling coronavirus outbreak.

South Korea said Wednesday that its total coronavirus infection cases have exceeded 1,200 as the situation rapidly worsens in the country, with the first case confirmed among U.S. military personnel. With 284 new cases reported the same day, the number of infections has reached 1,261, and the death toll has risen to 12, up from 10 on Tuesday, according to the Health and Welfare Ministry.

South Korea is on its highest alert over the outbreak of the pneumonia-causing virus, which first emerged in neighboring China, as the number of cases of infection skyrocketed from 51 a week ago.

But experts fear the measures could prove ineffective with thousands of people -- refugees fleeing violence, Shiite pilgrims, smugglers and migrants looking for work -- likely crossing the long, poorly patrolled frontiers every day. The virus has spread to more than 25 countries, killing over 2,700 and infecting 80,000, mostly in China. But new outbreaks in Europe, the Middle East and in Asia have fanned fears of the contagion taking hold in poor nations which lack the healthcare infrastructure to cope.

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Chinese robotics company showcases innovative gadgets at NYC Toy Fair

NEW YORK — Robosen Robotics (Shenzhen) Co, a Chinese tech startup, made its debut at the annual Toy Fair in New York City, aiming to bring innovative gadgets to overseas consumers.

A lineup of miniature robots called T9 has been on display during the exhibition.

Launched in China last summer, the product has entered the US market since 2020, Jerry Li, sales director of the Shenzhen-based company, told Xinhua on Tuesday.

The company hopes the gadget with a combined focus on education and entertainment could be well-received by international consumers including those

in North America and Europe.

Equipped with 22 servomotors, the programmable robot is able to perform high-speed, upright bipedal walking, while also automatically converting from robot to vehicle form.

Designed and developed in China, the robot features a full set of functions including automatic convertible movement, bipedal walking ability, racing, programmable development and robot control by either voice or via app, said Jacob Cheng, general manager of the company's US subsidiary.

"Its debut at the Consumer Electronics Show last month in Las Vegas attracted plenty of at-


tention, boosting our confidence in the prospects," he said.

China's robotics industry is advancing rapidly, buoyed by the nation's prowess in innovation and integrating different industries as well as rich human resources, noted John Engle, vice president of sales at the company's US subsidiary.

The 2020 Toy Fair New York, a four-day event starting Saturday, has drawn more than 1,000 exhibitors from around the world to showcase some 150,000 toys, games and youth entertainment products. Inaugurated in 1903, the exhibition takes place each February as a trade-only event. —Xinhua ■

First direct seismic measurements reveal a geologically active Mars

MARYLAND — Based on first reports, Mars has been found to have a moderate level of seismic activity and ground vibrations, intermediate between Earth and the Moon.

The findings are based on preliminary results from the InSight mission, which landed a probe on Mars on 26 November, 2018. An international team that includes University of Maryland geologists released data from the mission's Seismic Experiment for Interior Structure (SEIS), which provided the first direct seismic measurements of the Martian subsurface and upper crust—the rocky outermost layer of the planet. The results were published in a special issue of the journal Nature Geoscience

on February 24 this year. "This is the first mission focused on taking direct geophysical measurements of any planet besides Earth, and it's given us our first real understanding of Mars' interior structure and geological processes," said Nicholas Schmerr, an assistant professor of geology at UMD and a co-author of the study. "These data are helping us understand how the planet works, its rate of seismicity, how active it is and where it's active."

The seismic data acquired over 235 Martian days showed 174 seismic events or marsquakes. Of those, 150 were high-frequency events that produce ground-shaking similar to that recorded on the Moon by the Apollo program.—ANI ■

Higher ocean temperatures putting extreme stress on Australia's Great Barrier Reef

SYDNEY — Higher than average ocean temperatures have put Australia's iconic Great Barrier Reef on the brink of a severe coral bleaching event, the Australian Institute of Marine Science (AIMS) has warned on Tuesday.

Recording an increase of 1.0 to 2.5 degrees centigrade in recent weeks, AIMS Oceanographer Craig Steinberg said the World Heritage Listed Area is now facing an enormous threat.

"Our knowledge and long-term understanding of northern Australian waters tell us warming oceans place enormous pressure on the reef's ecology," he explained.

"If heatwave conditions persist or worsen, we can expect corals to exhibit stress and experience some level of regional bleaching."

Causing the corals to expel algae from their tissue and turn white, the process can then lead to stagnant growth rates, decreased reproductive capacity, increased susceptibility to diseases and a decline in genetic and species diversity.

Using satellites, weather stations and even an in-water autonomous robot to monitor ocean temperatures in real time, there is also a network of 170 electronic temperature loggers which have been deployed across the 350,000 square km reef.


"We have re-deployed an Integrated Marine Observing System (IMOS) underwater glider to areas of concern in the waters north-east of Townsville," Steinberg said.

"With its on-board sensors, the glider provides our scientists

with information about ocean properties at different depths

of the water column including temperature and light, to help

explain any observed levels of coral bleaching."—Xinhua ■

IAEA chief says Fukushima water release plan meets global standards

TOKYO — The head of the International Atomic Energy Agency said Wednesday that Japan's plan to release radioactive water from the Fukushima Daiichi nuclear power plant into the environment meets global standards of practice in the industry.

The comment by IAEA Director General Rafael Grossi made during a tour of the facility that was devastated by a powerful earthquake and tsunami in 2011 comes amid strong opposition to the plan from local fishermen and neighboring South Korea.

"Whatever way forward must be based on a scientific process, a process which is based on a scientifically based and proven methodology," Grossi told reporters after the tour.

"It is obvious that any methodology can be criticized. What we are saying from a technical point of view is that this process is in line with international practice," he said.

This is a common way to release water at nuclear power plants across the globe, even when they are not in emergency situations, he said.

The government and Tokyo Electric Power Company Holdings Inc., the operator of the crippled complex at the time,

are considering ways to safely dispose of the more than 1 million tons of water contaminated with radioactive materials after being used to cool the melted fuel cores at the plant that straddles the towns of Okuma and Futaba.

The water, which is increasing at a pace of about 170 tons a day, is being treated using an advanced liquid processing system, or ALPS, to remove most contaminants other than the relatively nontoxic tritium. The water is being stored in tanks on the facility's premises but space

is expected to run out by summer 2022. Methods being discussed include releasing the water into the Pacific Ocean and evaporating it, both of which the government says will have minimal effect on human health. But local fishermen have voiced strong opposition to such plans for fear that Japanese consumers would shun seafood caught nearby. South Korea, which currently bans imports of seafood from the area, has also repeatedly voiced concern about the environmental impact. —Kyodo News ■

Why coronavirus could help save China's endangered species

BEIJING — The novel coronavirus outbreak in China may end up saving one of the world's most trafficked animals after Beijing announced a total ban on the sale and consumption of the pangolin.

The scaly mammal — listed by the International Union for Conservation of Nature (IUCN)

as threatened with extinction — is a traditional delicacy across China and much of southeast Asia.

Following research linking the critters with the transmission of coronavirus to humans in the outbreak epicentre of Wuhan, Chinese officials on Monday

slapped a ban on eating wild animals. The measures, intended to halt the spread of the virus that has infected over 80,000 people worldwide and killed more than 2,700, could end up helping a number of endangered species — but only if the ban holds long term.

"I applaud the ban, as we see that the Chinese government is determined to change a thousands-year-old tradition which is so inappropriate in today's society," said Jeff He, China director at the International Fund for Animal Welfare. "I think the ban is an important Step One for wildlife conservation in China." He called for "stronger and more progressive revisions" of China's existing wildlife protection laws. Beijing implemented similar measures following the SARS outbreak in the early 2000s, but the trade and consumption of wild animals, including bats and snakes, made a comeback. — AFP ■

'Plastic police': Qatar market promotes sustainability

DOHA — In Qatar, not often associated with zero-waste initiatives, one weekend market is bucking the trend and encouraging visitors to ditch plastic for more sustainable choices.

At the Torba Farmers' Market in northwest Doha, shoppers are encouraged to shun plastic bottles, cups, cutlery and plates in favour of reusables.

"People didn't necessarily have the means or the place to do it before," the market's creative director, Ghada al-Khater, told AFP on a recent sunny Saturday afternoon.

Nearby, expats and Qataris

rubbed shoulders among stands selling locally grown produce, buying artisan coffee served in reusable cups brought from home and filling stylish tote bags with hand-baked sourdough bread.

For forgetful shoppers, a stall manned by volunteers hands out free porcelain mugs on condition they are returned, after which they are washed and reused.

Single-use plastic bottles are entirely banned in favour of water stations that provide free rehydration to visitors and their canine friends. — AFP ■

Environmentalists dressed as canaries protest UK coal mine

LONDON — Activists from environmental campaign group Extinction Rebellion, some dressed as canaries, blocked the entrance to a British open-cast mine on Wednesday to protest against plans to expand it.

The activists have promised three days of action at the Bradley mine in County Durham, northeast England, which belongs to The Banks Group.

One of the few open-cast coal mines left in Britain, the site has been operational since 2018 despite plans for the polluting fuel to be totally phased out by 2025.

Four "human canaries" in wire cages joined scores of other campaigners at the site.

"If things got unsustain-

able for life underground, the canaries down the mine used to peg it (die) before the miners did," said one protester, who wished to remain anonymous.

"Here we are, trying to stop the coal mine because there's no need for coal."

Others wore yellow hats and scarves, chanting "we are non-violent".

They are demanding that local authorities and the government reject The Banks' request to expand the mine.

The company responded by saying coal was needed for certain industries, and that if Britain stopped producing coal, it would have to be imported from Australia and Russia. — AFP ■

SAS sees limited impact from coronavirus as Q1 loss widens

STOCKHOLM — Scandinavian airline SAS said Wednesday its net loss widened in the first quarter and forecast that the economic impact from the novel coronavirus would be limited, while noting the outlook was “uncertain”.

SAS said in a statement that it booked net loss of 861 million Swedish kronor (\$88.6 million, 81.5 million euros) for the three months to January, compared with a bottom-line loss of 469 million kronor a year earlier.

At midday local time (1100

GMT), SAS shares were down more than 11 per cent on the Stockholm stock exchange.

In late January, the carrier had said it was suspending flights to Beijing and Shanghai following the outbreak of the coronavirus COVID-19.

It subsequently announced that the suspension would remain in place until the end of March.

Presenting its first-quarter earnings, the company estimated that the cancelled flights would result in a loss in revenues of 200

million kronor.

“As long as the COVID-19 outbreak is contained in scope and the suspension of flights is isolated to the winter season, this should only have a marginal impact on our earnings,” said chief executive Rickard Gustafson. But Gustafson also pointed out that “the economic outlook remains uncertain,” and that the outbreak of the new coronavirus added “additional concerns regarding a slowdown in key economies.”

Speaking to news agency

TT, Gustafson also noted that if the situation did not stabilise before the “important summer season,” it could have “major consequences for the industry

and SAS.” First-quarter revenues increased by 3.2 per cent to 9.7 billion kronor, driven primarily by an increase in passenger numbers.— AFP ■

Belgium’s Solvay to cut 350 jobs worldwide

BRUSSELS — Belgian chemicals giant Solvay, facing difficulties linked to the coronavirus and the Boeing 737 MAX scandal, on Wednesday announced plans to cut 350 jobs around the world by the end of 2021.

The company said in a statement it would axe 500 posts including some in senior management, but create 150 in the advanced materials sector, which supplies compounds to the aviation industry.

Turning to its 2019 results, Solvay announced a 1.0-percent decline in bottom-line net profit to 1.075 billion euros (\$1.2 billion) last year, while revenues stagnated at 10.244 billion euros.

And the group warned of challenges in the months to come. Results for the first three months of 2020 were “expected to be down by high single digit as a combined result of the 737MAX

production halt, the impact of the COVID-19 virus, and the increasingly challenging oil and gas market,” Solvay said.

The chemicals giant has ramped up its target for reducing costs by 2024, aiming to cut more than 350 million euros a year.

Previously, it had set itself a goal of 300-350 million euros.

Of the job losses, CEO Ilham

Kadri said “it is never easy but it is necessary for the company’s competitiveness”.

She said it was too early to assess the full impact of coronavirus on the company’s business, but that precautions had been taken to protect employees in affected areas including China, which accounts for 10 percent of sales.— AFP ■

French carmaker PSA defies sales slowdown with record profits

PARIS — French car giant PSA Peugeot-Citroen, currently in the process of merging with rival Fiat Chrysler, said Wednesday it shook off a drop in sales to notch up record profits in 2019.

“We have achieved record results in 2019,” chief executive Carlos Tavares said in a statement.

The group, whose brands include Opel in Germany and Vauxhall in Britain, booked bottom-line net profit of 3.2 billion euros (\$3.5 billion) last year, an

increase of 13.2 per cent over the figure for 2018.

Despite a 10.3-per cent drop in unit sales to 3.5 million vehicles worldwide, revenues inched up 1.0 per cent to 74.7 billion euros.

PSA said its operating margin — which measures underlying profit as a proportion of sales — increased by 0.8 percentage points to 8.5 per cent.

In terms of vehicles sold, PSA suffered from its absence from the key US market and

a shrinking market share in China.

But the group attributed the modest increase in revenues to an improved product mix and higher prices, which it said helped offset negative exchange rate effects and falling volumes.

Looking ahead to anticipated market developments in the current year, PSA said it forecast a decline of around 3.0 per cent in Europe but no change in Latin America.— AFP ■

Coronavirus to cut Diageo drink sales by up to £325 mn

LONDON — British drinks group Diageo, the maker of Guinness stout and Smirnoff vodka, on Wednesday said the coronavirus would slash annual sales by up to £325 million (\$422 million, 388 million euros).

Diageo, which produces also Baileys liqueur and Johnnie Walker whisky, said sales for the group’s financial year ending June 30 would be impacted by between £225 million and £325 million owing to the spreading virus.

Operating profit would be hit by between £140 million and £200 million, it added in a statement.

Diageo said “significant disruption since the end of January” to its business in China was expected “to last at least into” next month. “Thereafter, we expect a gradual improvement with consumption returning to normal levels towards the end of fiscal 2020.”

Diageo added that in other Asian countries affected by the outbreak, notably Japan, South Korea and Thailand, it expects a gradual improvement in trade throughout the group’s final quar-

ter of 2019/20.

“The COVID-19 situation is dynamic and continues to evolve and these ranges exclude any impact of the COVID-19 situation on other markets beyond those mentioned,” Diageo said.

“We remain confident in the growth opportunities in our Greater China and Asia Pacific business. “We will continue to invest behind our brands, ensuring we are strongly positioned for the expected recovery in consumer demand,” it added.

The new coronavirus epidemic swelled on Wednesday with cases in South Korea surging past 1,000 after deaths soared in Iran and infections appeared in previously untouched countries, prompting dire warnings that the world was not ready to contain it.

The virus has rapidly spread in parts of Asia, Europe and the Middle East, even as the number of fresh cases and deaths decline at the disease epicentre in China.

Diageo shares slumped 2.5 per cent to £28.85 in early trading on London’s benchmark FTSE 100 index, which was down 1.5 per cent overall.— AFP ■

Japan supermarket sales remain weak in January as tax impact lingers

TOKYO — Japan's supermarket sales showed a fourth consecutive monthly fall in January, remaining pressured since the consumption tax hike last year, while a warmer-than-usual winter caused many vegetables to grow faster and their prices to decline, an industry body said Wednesday.

Sales in the reporting month declined 2.0 per cent from a year earlier on a same-store basis, according to the Japan Chain Store Association.

Sales at 10,543 supermarkets operated by

55 companies totaled 1.00 trillion yen (\$9.1 billion), the association said. The data reflected the country's sluggish personal spending since the consumption tax was raised in October to 10 per cent from 8 per cent and the effect of the warm winter on sales of food, the main revenue source for supermarkets. Food sales in January declined 0.1 per cent from a year earlier on the same-store basis. Sales of clothing fell 8.0 per cent, and those of household goods sagged 6.2 per cent, the association said. — Kyodo News ■

CCEA approves creation of national technical textiles mission

NEW DELHI — The Cabinet Committee on Economic Affairs (CCEA) on Wednesday approved setting up a national technical textiles mission with a total outlay of Rs 1,480 crore.

The aim is to position the country as a global leader in technical textiles. The mission will have a four-year implementation period from FY 2020-21 to 2023-24. Technical textiles are used for various applications ranging from agriculture, roads, railway tracks, sportswear and health on one end to bulletproof jacket, fireproof jackets, high altitude combat gear and space applications on another end of the spectrum.

The Indian technical

textiles segment is estimated at 16 billion dollars which is six per cent of 250 billion dollar global technical textiles market, according to an official statement.

The penetration level of technical textiles is low in India varying between 5 to 10 per cent against the level of 30 to 70 per cent in developed countries.

"The mission will aim at an average growth rate of 15 to 20 per cent per annum, taking the level of domestic market size to 40 billion to 50 billion dollars by 2024 through market development, market promotion, international technical collaborations, investment promotions and 'Make in India' initiatives." — ANI ■

Hong Kong's budget to fall into red amid virus outbreak, unrest

HONG KONG — Hong Kong on Wednesday unveiled a record budget deficit as it dishes out a HK\$120 billion (US\$15.4 billion) relief package to shore up an economy battered by the China-US trade war, lingering social unrest and the coronavirus epidemic.

Announcing the annual budget at the legislature, Financial Secretary Paul Chan said HK\$37.8 billion deficit was expected for the 2019 fiscal year, which spans from April to March, marking the first budget deficit since 2005, while a record high deficit of HK\$139.1 billion was estimated for the 2020 fiscal year.

"I forecast a deficit for the next five years as well," Chan said. "Although a record high deficit is envisaged in next year's budget, I believe that only

with such a budget can we help our community and local enterprises ride out their difficulties." On top of HK\$30 billion earmarked for job-saving and economy-boosting measures, a HK\$30 billion anti-epidemic fund will ease the financial

burden for businesses and individuals caused by the new coronavirus epidemic, including tax breaks, social welfare handouts, rental subsidies for public housing, utilities subsidies and a healthcare funding hike.

Cash handouts of

HK\$10,000 will be given to some 7 million people aged 18 or above, Chan said, to hopefully boost spending and relieve people's financial burdens caused by social unrest in the past months and the epidemic. — Kyodo News ■

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Malaysia in turmoil as Mahathir, Anwar vie for power

KUALA LUMPUR — Malaysia was plunged into a bitter power struggle Wednesday as Mahathir Mohamad sought to form a unity government following his shock resignation, but old foe Anwar Ibrahim also pushed to become premier.

The shock developments deepened a crisis that began when the ruling coalition — which included both men when it stormed to a historic poll victory in 2018 — fell apart after a failed weekend bid to form a new government without Anwar.

Anwar was Mahathir's designated successor, but he would likely have been pushed out and blocked from becoming leader if the weekend's bid had succeeded.

Their notoriously stormy relationship has shaped Malaysian politicians ever since Mahathir — during a first stint in office in the 1990s — sacked Anwar as his deputy, and he was jailed on dubious sodomy and corruption charges.

They reconciled ahead of the 2018 polls to oust a corruption-plagued coalition led by Najib Razak, but many were sceptical

Mahathir would stick to a vow to hand power to Anwar.

Mahathir, at 94 the world's oldest leader, was appointed interim leader following his resignation Monday, and he appeared initially to have strong support to return as premier.

But backing fell away early Wednesday and rumours swirled Anwar had garnered enough support from MPs for the top job.

Expectations rose that Mahathir might finally cede power

— only for the elderly leader to announce in a televised address to the nation that he wished to establish a unity government, and was willing to return as premier.

"Party politics must be put aside for now," said Mahathir. "If allowed, I will try to form an inclusive government, not siding with any political parties."

"If I still have the support I will return. If not I will accept whoever is chosen," he added. —AFP ■

Qatar eyes diplomatic win with US-Taliban deal

DOHA — Providing neutral space for talks on ending Afghanistan's 18-year conflict has boosted Qatar's international profile and helped it defy a painful embargo enforced by neighbours and former allies.

After quietly brokering dialogue between the warring sides in Afghanistan, Qatar is on the verge of reaping a major diplomatic dividend if a deal is signed in Doha this Saturday that would see the Pentagon withdraw thousands of troops.

The negotiations have created incongruous scenes of Taliban fighters-turned-dealmakers rubbing shoulders with guests in revealing outfits in the lobby of a luxury Doha hotel, to strains of pop classics played by the resident pianist.

And Qatar has undertaken the ambitious project during a period of major regional challenges.

Saudi Arabia, along with the United Arab Emirates, Egypt and Bahrain cut ties with Doha in 2017, closing their airspace,

borders and ports, and severing all trade.

Talks to resolve the wider rift have stalled, after a flurry of diplomacy late last year raised hopes of a breakthrough.

But if it all goes to plan, when the embargo hits the 1,000-day mark on Saturday, Qatar's emir, Sheikh Tamim bin Hamad Al-Thani, will be riding high on the success of the mediation efforts, at a time when he is shoring up alliances and forging new ones. —AFP ■

Modi calls for calm as Delhi riots kill 22

NEW DELHI — Indian Prime Minister Narendra Modi called for calm Wednesday after Delhi's worst sectarian violence in decades left at least 22 people dead and calls for a military curfew.

This week's battles between Hindus and Muslims have seen mobs armed with swords, guns and acid raze parts of a northeastern district of the Indian capital. The clashes, which also left almost 200 injured, were triggered by protests against a citizenship law seen by many critics as anti-Muslim and part of Modi's Hindu nationalist agenda.

They exploded into brutal violence on Monday and Tuesday, with residents forced to flee their homes after seeing dwellings destroyed, a mosque attacked and a tyre market and two schools set ablaze.

"I appeal to my sisters and brothers of Delhi to maintain peace and brotherhood at all times. It is important... calm and normalcy is restored at the earli-

est," Modi tweeted on Wednesday.

Delhi's chief minister, Arvind Kejriwal, a political opponent, called for the army to be deployed and for a curfew to be imposed.

"Police, despite all its efforts, (are) unable to control situation and instil confidence," Kejriwal tweeted.

Fear, anger

Sunil Kumar, the director of the hospital where many of the wounded were taken, told AFP on Wednesday that almost 60 had gunshot injuries and that 16 new patients were admitted on Wednesday. On Wednesday morning residents cleaned out the blackened interior of a trashed mosque, including a charred Koran, burned out during the violence in the Ashok Nagar area.

A video circulated on social media and verified by AFP showed men ripping off the muezzin's loudspeaker on top of the mosque's minaret and installing a Hindu religious flag.—AFP ■

Chinese court hands Hong Kong bookseller to 10-year sentence

HONG KONG/BEIJING — A Chinese court said Tuesday that Hong Kong bookseller Gui Minhai has been sentenced to 10 years in prison for "illegally providing intelligence to foreign entities."

The Intermediate People's Court of Ningbo Municipality in the eastern province of Zhejiang said in a statement that Gui, a naturalized Swede who was detained in mainland China in 2018, will not appeal the sentence handed down on Monday.

Gui was a major shareholder of the parent company of a bookstore in Hong Kong named Causeway Bay Books that published and sold gossipy titles about Chinese leaders.

He was one of five booksellers in Hong Kong who suddenly

disappeared in 2015, prompting fear that one or more had been kidnapped by Chinese agents and taken to the mainland to be punished for selling books banned in China. Four of the five later returned to Hong Kong after being investigated by the authorities, but Gui served time in China for a traffic accident he was accused of causing in the early 2000s. Even though he was released in October 2017, Gui was not allowed to leave China and was detained again in January 2018. He was seized aboard a Beijing-bound train while accompanied by Swedish diplomats who were said to be taking him to seek medical treatment abroad, according to his daughter Angela, who is in Britain.—Kyodo News ■

UK, France and Germany intensify bid to save Iran nuclear deal

VIENNA — Western European powers stepped up efforts on Wednesday to try to save a 2015 deal to curb Iran's nuclear ambitions — on life support since a 2018 decision by the US to withdraw and reimpose sanctions.

Officials from Britain, France and Germany began a meeting in Vienna — the first since they launched a dispute process over alleged violations by Iran — aiming to persuade the Middle Eastern country to fall back into line with the deal.

The other parties to the deal, China and Russia, are also taking part in the talks overseen by the European Union, with Russian Foreign Minister Sergei Lavrov saying on Twitter there was still a chance “to stop escalation before it is too late”.

In its last announcement in early January, Tehran said it would no longer observe limits

on the number of centrifuges used to enrich uranium.

It was its fifth step away from the deal since US President Donald Trump's withdrawal, and

led to Germany, Britain and France triggering the dispute process on 14 January.

The process spells out several steps, the last one of which

is notifying the UN Security Council. UN sanctions would then automatically “snap back” after 30 days unless the Security Council voted to stop it.

‘Far from a result’

A diplomat who asked no to be named told AFP that no timetable had been fixed for solving the dispute, adding “we are still far from a result”. “We all want to save the JCPOA (Joint Comprehensive Plan of Action, as the deal is known) so that the inspectors can continue their work in Iran,” the diplomat said, referring to the inspections by the International Atomic Energy Agency (IAEA). The Vienna-based UN nuclear agency has been tasked with monitoring the deal's implementation and issues regular reports, the latest of which is expected within days. Western diplomats believe Iran is highly unlikely to heed calls to come back into full compliance without substantial concessions in return — such as an end to US sanctions or Europe taking measures to offset their economic impact.— AFP ■

Greek islanders strike as migrant camp row intensifies

LESBOS ISLAND (Greece) — The Greek islands of Lesbos, Chios and Samos staged a general strike Wednesday, as protests against the construction of new migrant camps intensified.

For a second day, protesters on Lesbos faced off against riot police near the town of Mantamados, close to the site of a planned camp for up to 7,000 people.

Small groups of protesters threw stones and firebombs at the police, who responded with tear gas and flash grenades.

“You're going to die here,” a protester shouted as police, as others screamed obscenities at them.

“We are in a wartime situation,” local priest Father Stratis told AFP. “(The police) have the weapons, we have our heart and

soul.”

The regional governor's office has called a 24-hour strike, rejecting the government's plans to build the new camps to replace currently overcrowded facilities where asylum-seekers live in dire conditions.

On Chios, hundreds gathered in a protest at the main square of the island's capital.

There are more than 38,000 migrants crowded into camps on the islands of Lesbos, Samos, Chios, Leros and Kos despite an official capacity of just 6,200.

The islanders, who have long complained that the presence of thousands of asylum seekers threatens safety and public health, oppose government plans to build new camps for them there.— AFP ■

Trial opens for US students over Italy police death

ROME — Two US students appeared in an Italian court on Wednesday on the first day of their trial over the fatal stabbing last year of a policeman during a botched drugs bust.

Finnegan Lee Elder and Gabriel Natale-Hjorth are charged with killing newlywed Mario Cerciello Rega, 35, who was stabbed 11 times last July.

The Californians, who had been on holiday in Rome and were teenagers at the time, face life sentences if convicted.

In Italy, the slaying aroused an outpouring of public sympathy for Cerciello, who had just returned from his honeymoon when he was killed. Huge crowds attended his funeral — which was broadcast live on television — where he was hailed as a hero.

“His murder cannot and must not go unpunished,” his wife, Maria Rosaria Esilio, said in a statement on the eve of the trial.

“My family has ended with Mario's death because our unborn children and dreams were buried with him,” she said.

But the case has also been marked by major blunders — especially the blindfolding of Natale-Hjorth during his police interrogation — and contradictory statements made by the key

prosecution witness, Cerciello's police partner Andrea Varriale.

In the aftermath, Varriale said he and Cerciello had been attacked by men of North African descent. He also initially claimed he had been armed.

Both officers were in fact unarmed and acted without backup, in violation of police procedure.

Amid the intense media focus in the case, comparisons have been made to the high-profile trial of Amanda Knox, a US student convicted and later acquitted of a 2007 murder in Italy.

As Elder was led out during a break he looked at his parents and held up crossed fingers.

Elder has admitted to stabbing Cerciello with a 7-inch (18 cm) serrated-edge combat knife he had stashed in his sweatshirt but told investigators he thought he and his friend were being set upon by drug dealers.

The young men and Varriale have given opposing versions of what happened during the 32-second attack in the early hours of the morning, which followed a botched drug deal.

Hours earlier, the young men from the San Francisco Bay Area had gone looking for cocaine in the popular night-life area of Trastevere. Intermediary Sergio Brugiatelli introduced them to a dealer who sold them aspirin instead.— AFP ■

Arsenal must keep Aubameyang, says teammate Lacazette

LONDON (United Kingdom)—Alexandre Lacazette says it is crucial that Arsenal keep hold of fellow forward Pierre-Emerick Aubameyang, who has been linked with a move away from the Emirates.

Arsenal's results have picked up since Mikel Arteta took over from Unai Emery in December but they are still seven points off fourth-placed Chelsea in the Premier League.

Winning the Europa League would offer the club an alternative route into the Champions League next season.

Arsenal take on Olympiakos on Thursday with a 1-0 lead after last week's first leg in Greece.

Qualifying for the Champions League would be a major boost to their hopes of keeping Premier League joint top-scorer Aubameyang, who has been linked with a move to Barcelona or Inter Milan. "It's really important (to keep Aubameyang)," Lacazette said at Arsenal's pre-match press conference on Wednesday. "He's one of the best or maybe he's been the best player this season for Arsenal. Obviously I hope he's going to stay."

He added: "I think people should talk more about Auba and what he is doing in the game because he is more than a goalscorer. "He is working a lot for the team defensively and making space for the other striker, Eddie (Nketiah) or me, and I think

if we start to win more trophies, people will talk more about what he is doing for the team."

Arteta acknowledged after Arsenal's 3-2 win against Everton on Sunday that Aubameyang had not found it easy to cope with Arsenal's reduced status since he arrived from Borussia Dortmund and he hopes a surge up the table will show the club's potential. Lacazette has been struggling for form in recent weeks and has lost his place to youngster Eddie Nketiah for the past two Premier League games.

He scored off the bench in the recent win over Newcastle before netting the only goal in the 1-0 Europa League round-of-32 victory in Greece last week.

They are his only two goals since mid-December and he has been linked with a move away from the Emirates Stadium.

But the Frenchman said he would not push to leave Arsenal at the end of the season even if they do not qualify for the Champions League. Despite reports he has an agreement with the club that he can leave if they are unable to secure a return to Europe's top club competition, the 28-year-old said he has no desire to move. "I didn't know about this," Lacazette replied when asked about the reported exit clause. "I did not know. Yes, I have a contract with the club so there is no point for me to leave. Everybody is happy with me at the club." — AFP ■
